## Grows in China and Producer <br> A consular report upon the trade of

 tails regarding the tallow tree. Thi curious tree (Stillingia sebifera Roxk.) is largely cultivated near Wenohow.and still more widely within Ch'u-cho profecture to the west. It is not gen
orndy known that the fruit of ths troo produces oil as well as tallow. beans in appearance and size, are firy
stmamed and then pounded in an ordioary rice trough.
By pounding, the soft, mealy meso carp is partially reparated from tha bamboo sieve, the meshes of which are just large enough to allow the
mealy matter to be scrubbed through and small enough to keep back tho sernels which are ha
about the size of peas.
From the mealy matter the tallow in exprossed in primitive wooden pressee.
The oil is dirived from the kernels in the following manner. They aro stones held at such a distance apart by means of a bamboo pivot as to crush the hard shells of the kernels without injuring the white interiors.
The whole is then passed through a shells from the solid matter. The latter is thereafter placed in a deep
iron pan. and roasted until it beging 0 assume a brownish color, the pro
