Is working with the Auburn Hills Chamber of Commerce, local industry, Oakland University, Avondale School district and Baker college on several initiatives:

With the Rochester Chamber of Commerce and the Rochester School District we are working to create internships and service learning opportunities for our students. Interns have been placed in the service area which has been very successful.

Southeast/royal oak

In November 2012 we surveyed the SE community to identify one broad area of focus that would contribute to student success. The committee received 63 responses with 52.4% determining Academic Support as a priority. This has been defined though several continuing initiatives:

The SF ASC has expanded twofold its offerings of Student Success Seminars. Both the SF and RO ASC faculty are working with Library and ESL faculty to identify skill needs to further develop new Success Seminars that would provide supplemental support to developmental students.

- Work with classified staff to support additional staffing and flexible hours to increase availability of student services, and offer training to other areas and staff to assist students.
- Staff and administration continue to work together in expanding hours for service areas.
- In collaboration with its faculty, the RO Library, ASC, and SF Info Commons are now open 9-5 on Saturdays during the Fall and Winter semesters.
