TAB SPONSORS BOB-LO EXCURSION

For several years the teenage boosters and supporters of Michigan Christian College have sponsored an annual trip down the Detroit River to BOB-LO Island. This is the major project of TAB for raising money for the college.

This year's outing will be Saturday, July 24. Sailing time is 11 A.M. Destination is BOB-LO Island on the Canadian side.

The cost for adults is \$1.50; children aged 6 through 11, 75¢. There is no charge for children under 6 years old.



This is a great FAMILY Excursion on the Detroit River to the lovely picnic grounds and amusement park of BOB-LO Island. The boat (left) will accommodate 2000 people or more. We can have the boat to ourselves if enough families will go. Sailing time for the return trip is 6 P.M.

Food is available on the island. However, it is customary (price-wise and otherwise) for each family or person to bring his own basket lunch. It is planned that the MCC group eat together in the area that has been reserved.

A program has been planned for the boat ride to and from the island. Games, competition events and prizes are planned for the time spent at BOB-LO for those who desire to participate.

OUTSTANDING STUDENTS RECEIVE AWARDS AT GRADUATION EXERCISES

Each year, students from MCC who have done outstanding work are honored with awards in their respective fields.

The college provides awards in the area of Missions, Science and Mathematics. The college also gives the Dean's Award which recognizes the student's all around ability.

Rebecca Nicks of Fort Worth, Texas and Valedictorian of the graduating class, was given the Missions Award.

The Science Award went to Margaret Mangion of Lincoln Park, Michigan.

Kim Bailey of Birmingham, Michigan won the award in Mathematics.

The Dean's Award, the recipient of which is selected by all the faculty, went to Noel Wilson.

Two other awards, the Earl West Bible Award and the Baker Book House Award went, respectively, to Edward Work of Trenton, Mich., and Karen Kay Pullins of Pontiac, Mich. Karen was Valedictorian of the class in the Junior College Certificate Program.

FINANCING EDUCATION AT MCC NOW NO PROBLEM

There is now no reason for any person desiring a college education to be denied it. This is especially true of a Christian education at Michigan Christian College.

MCC has participated for several years in the National Defence Student Loan Program (NDSL). Under this program students are able to borrow money from the Federal government at low (3%) interest rates to pay for education. Repayment of the loan does not begin until 12 months after the student ceases to be in school. Interest on the money borrowed does not begin until the person ceases to be a full time student.

In the case of future teachers, one half of the loan is cancelled immediately if the student agrees to teach for five years.

The MCC Student Loan Fund through the NDSL Program is \$60,000 for the 1965-66 academic year.

In addition to the Federal Loan Program, MCC also participates in the Michigan Higher Education Assis. Authn which the college has an allotment of \$20,000.
