A Ray of Hope for the Handicapped

The Student Volunteer Program of MCC was recently expanded when thirty students volunteered to participate in the hourly "patterning" manipulation of the palsied body of little Ronnie Shuffett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Shuffett of Shelby Township.

The patterning requires five people to work on the child at a time, bending the limbs and head back and forth to simulate crawling. It is hoped that these forced movements will eventually reach the brain, enabling the boy to crawl by himself. The patterning takes five minutes and is performed each hour for eight patterns a day. It is estimated that approximately 280 different people could be used each week in Ronnie's case.

MCC students have always responded well when some good work needs to be done. Ministering to homes for the aged, gathering clothing for distressed areas at home and abroad, and participating in neighborhood canvass work for evangelistic campaigns has been a part of the extra-class activities of MCC students since the college began in 1959.

MCC Professor Translates Greek Tragedy

On May 19 and 20, the MCC Drama Department will present "Oedipus the King" written in the 5th century, B.C. by the Greek dramatist Sophocles.

The drama, based on the ancient tale of the hapless king of Thebes, who unknowingly killed his father and married his mother, is considered by many to be the finest of Greek tragedies. Aristotle seems to have this work most clearly in mind in his POETICS.

Professor Douglas Marsh, of the MCC faculty, will direct the production using his own translation. Mr. Marsh also teaches Greek and French at MCC.

The role of Oedipus is played by Larry Smith of Pontiac. Sandra Hughes of Waterford Township is Jocasta, wife of Oedipus. Others in the cast are: Wayne Narey as Creon, Tony Hawkins as Teiresias, Jum Mellott as the priest, Alan Sturdivant as the First Messenger, Kenneth Handley as the Headsman, and David Case as the Second Messenger.

The chorus is made up of Joy Montgomery, Jan Cason, Fred Liimata, Joan Paul, and Joyce Whitaker. The mute persons are Kathy Marsh as Antigone, Dianna Covell as Ismere, Nancy Julian as a child, and Midge Lear as a maidservant.

Curtain time both evenings is 8 p.m. Admission is \$1.00.
