"The Christian Family" to be Bible Lectureship Theme

Continuing an annual tradition started the year before the institution began operating, Michigan Christian College will conduct the 25th annual Bible Lectureship October 4, 5, 6, and 7, 1982.

This year's theme will be "The Christian Family." With all the strain and stress being placed on the family today, there probably is no theme that could be more beneficial to the Church and the families of the Church.

The program is complete with the exception of one presentation, which should be confirmed shortly. Plans are to have full details of the program announced in the Lectureship brochure which is scheduled for mailing in August.

Dr. John C. Stevens, Chancellor of Abilene Christian University, will keynote the Lectureship on Monday evening with the subject, "The Family Faces the '80's'."

Betty Muns will conduct a two-hour class for women on Tuesday and Wednesday, October 5 and 6, from 9-11 a.m. on the "Constant and Changing Role of Woman." Dr. Loren Gieger, MCC Bible professor, will conduct a class for men during the same time frame regarding "Challenges to Fathers."

Tuesday, October 5 will be Preachers' Fellowship Day with preachers of the Midwest invited as guests of the College to the Preachers' Fellowship Luncheon

at 12:30 p.m. Tickets for the luncheon are complimentary, but reservations are necessary. Dr. John C. Stevens will speak on the topic "Preacher-Husband-Father." The Preacher-Elder Dinner at 5:30 p.m. will be "Dutch-treat." James Muns will speak on the subject, "Elders, Preachers, and Their Children." All elders and preachers should make advance reservations with Diane Foster in the Development Office.

Tuesday at the 11 a.m. Chapel session, James Muns will speak on "The Church's Role in Family Relations." The first full day of Lectureship activity will close Tuesday evening with Dr. Prentice Meador speaking on "Priorities in Spiritually Centered Homes."

Wednesday, October 6, has been designated as Parents' Day. The two-hour classes conducted by Betty Muns and Dr. Loren Gieger will meet from 9-11 a.m. Dr. Prentice Meador will address the 11:00 a.m. Chapel service on "Our Debt to Parents (Honor to Whom Honor)." Parents will be honored at the "Dutch treat" Parents' Day Luncheon at 12:30 p.m. Dr. Jim Bill McInteer will address the gathering with a presentation entitled, "Mom and Dad - Our Role Models." All parents are urged to make luncheon reservations with Diane Foster in the Development Office.

"Family Financial Planning"

will be the subject of a lecture presented by Roger Wood on Wednesday from 3-5 p.m. The Wednesday evening lecture, "Godly Women," will be presented by Dr. Jim Bill McInteer at 7:30 p.m.

Thursday, October 7, will be the annual MCC Friends' Day. Dr. Carl Brecheen will conduct a combined class of men and women from 9-11 a.m. on the subject "Building Strong Christian Families in Times Like These." The 11:00 a.m. Chapel lecture, "Peer Pressure," will be presented by Jerry Tallman. The annual Friends' Luncheon will be highlighted by the presentation of the second "Artist of the Year" and his or her painting. President Milton B. Fletcher will then present a "State of the College" report. On Thursday evening, just prior to the closing lecture, the MCC A Cappella Chorus, under the direction of Randy Gill, will present their first concert of the year. Dr. Carl Brecheen will finalize the Lectureship activities, speaking on the subject, "God's Family Plan Works."

Make plans now to attend the 1982 MCC Bible Lectureship. Some congregations are already committed to bring buses. Watch your mail for the Lectureship brochure which will contain full details of the program, as well as information regarding area restaurants, hotels, available child care, etc.

Associates Establish

Mary Monroe Endowed Scholarship

Because of their love and respect for Mary Monroe, the Associates of Michigan Christian College established the Mary Monroe Endowed Scholarship on May 28, 1982, with a gift of \$10,000. This contribution represents the largest single endowed scholarship gift ever received by Michigan Christian College.

Mary Monroe, long-time Treasurer of the Associates and a charter member since 1959, suffered a fatal heart attack on April 16, 1982. Her love for her family, young people, and Michigan Christian College was surpassed only by her love for God and the Church. Mary Monroe was truly a great lady whose Christian influence will live on in the lives of students who benefit from the proceeds of this scholarship.

An endowed scholarship is

permanent in the sense that the "corpus" or "principal" will never be spent. Only the income that the principal earns will be used to make scholarship awards. The scholarship agreement stipulates that the Scholarship Committee of Michigan Christian College must select students who exemplify the highest principles of Christianity and have achieved a 3.0 grade point average.

The Associates would like to encourage others to join them in honoring Mary Monroe by making a memorial contribution to the Mary Monroe Endowed Scholarship Fund. Hobart Ashby, Former Board Member, Dies June 19

Hobart E. Ashby, 64, minister of the Church of Christ in Garden City, Michigan for 17 years, died Saturday, June 19 following a brief illness.

Brother Ashby had served as a board member of Michigan Christian College; the Shults-Lewis Children's Home in Valparaiso, Indiana; and the Michigan Christian Youth Camp in Lapeer. Before coming to this area, he had worked with congregations in St. Louis, Missouri; Flint, Michigan; Aberdeen, Mississippi; and Toledo, Ohio.

He and his wife, Mattie, were recently honored during the Michigan Missions Forum in Midland for their outstanding service and dedication to spreading the Gospel.

In addition to his wife, Brother Ashby is survived by three daughters, Sherry Bohler, Clarice Sparkman, and Nancy Dawson; two brothers; and five grandchildren.

MCC Hosts Fund-raiser in Abilene, Texas

Saturday evening, June 12, 1982, was the occasion for the first Abilene, Texas Fund-Raising Dinner on behalf of Michigan Christian College. Dr. William J. (Bill) Teague, President of Abilene Christian University, and Dr. John C. Stevens, ACU Chancellor, both served on the steering committee to plan and conduct this fund-raising event to benefit MCC.

Other steering committee members were Cleve Cullers, Dr. John L. Estes, Jr., W. L. Fletcher, Jr., C. D. Holmes, and Dr. Jack Turman. The Administration of Abilene Christian University was most gracious in allowing Michigan Christian College to conduct the dinner in the McGlothlin Campus Center. Ninety persons were present representing forty-seven households. To date, forty-four gifts have been committed totaling \$16,600.

A quote from President Fletcher expressing gratitude stated, "We are deeply appreciative to all those who attended this first fund-raising dinner in Abilene. Dr. Teague and Dr. Stevens were most gracious in allowing us to have an event on their campus. Their unselfish spirit is expressive of their ability to see the 'big picture' in relation to the total concept of Christian education. We compliment and thank the members of the steering committee for their interest, concern, and guidance in conducting the Abilene event."

The program for the dinner included a musical presentation by Autumn, an audio-visual presentation, an address by Dr. John C. Stevens, and a "State of the College" address by Dr. Milton B. Fletcher.

The Abilene steering committee has already conducted a critique of the event and is planning a similar program for 1983.

Caswell Estate Planning Workshop Explains Latest Estate Tax Laws

During the second week of July, 1982, (July 12-15), Michigan Christian College hosted its second Gordon Caswell and Associates Estate Planning Workshop. Mr. Caswell conducted the intense eight hour per day workshop which featured techniques related to the marketing of estate planning concepts in the areas of wills and bequests, charitable remainder trusts, gift annuities, and life estates.

The 1981 Economic Recovery Tax Act made drastic changes in estate tax laws, thereby making it mandatory for people involved in estate planning services to update and equip themselves with the very latest information.

Mr. Caswell is a nationally known estate planning consultant with some twenty-five years experience in this type of work. Seventeen participants representing eight charitable institutions attended the seminar.

By hosting such workshops, MCC seeks to serve the institutions represented and their clientele.

Church Leaders Workshop July 30-31

Michigan Christian College hosted a Church Leadership Workshop on campus July 30 and 31, 1982 in the Westside Central Chapel. Some 248 men representing 75 congregations across the Midwest participated. Friday and Saturday were chosen to encourage a greater number to take advantage of this opportunity.

Three specialists in the field of Church leadership participated: James Baird, Chancellor of Oklahoma Christian College; Cline Paden, President of Sunset School of Preaching; and David Burks, Dean of the Harding University College of Business. Serving with these three lecturers were several additional men from the Midwest who are uniquely qualified in specific subject areas. They were: Chuck Lee of the Flanders Road congregation in Toledo, Ohio; George Oliver of the Royal Oak, Michigan congregation; John Flowers of the Detroit Northwest congregation; John Cox of the Bristol Road congregation in Flint, Michigan; Bob Utley of the Rochester, Michigan congregation; Robert Threlkeld of the Detroit Strathmoor congregation, and James Thompson of the Mt. Clemens, Michigan congregation. Loren Gieger, Jesse Clayton, and Milton B. Fletcher of Michigan Christian College also conducted segments of the program.

Youth Leaders Workshop Plans Tentatively Set

September 17 and 18, 1982 are the dates tentatively scheduled for the third annual Michigan Christian College Youth Leaders Workshop. To have the program, however, seventy persons must be registered to attend by Friday, August 20. A form for this purpose is provided below.

The two-day seminar is designed to train both volunteer youth workers and full-time youth ministers to work more effectively with the young people they service.

Key speakers scheduled to participate are Wally Wilkerson of Fort Worth, Texas; and Paul Blankenship of the Broadway congregation in Lubbock, Texas. Brother Wilkerson will be returning to the program for the third year.

A registration fee of \$20 per person will be assessed workshop participants. The registration form below should be returned to the Development Office by August 20, or reservations can be made by phone at (313) 651-5800, extension 24.

A Cappella Chorus Completes Extended Tour in Northeast

History came alive for members of the MCC A Cappella Chorus as they visited such cities as Boston, Philadelphia, New York, and Washington, D.C. on their May 8-22 spring tour. The tour included sixteen performances in Michigan, Ontario, New York, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Ohio.

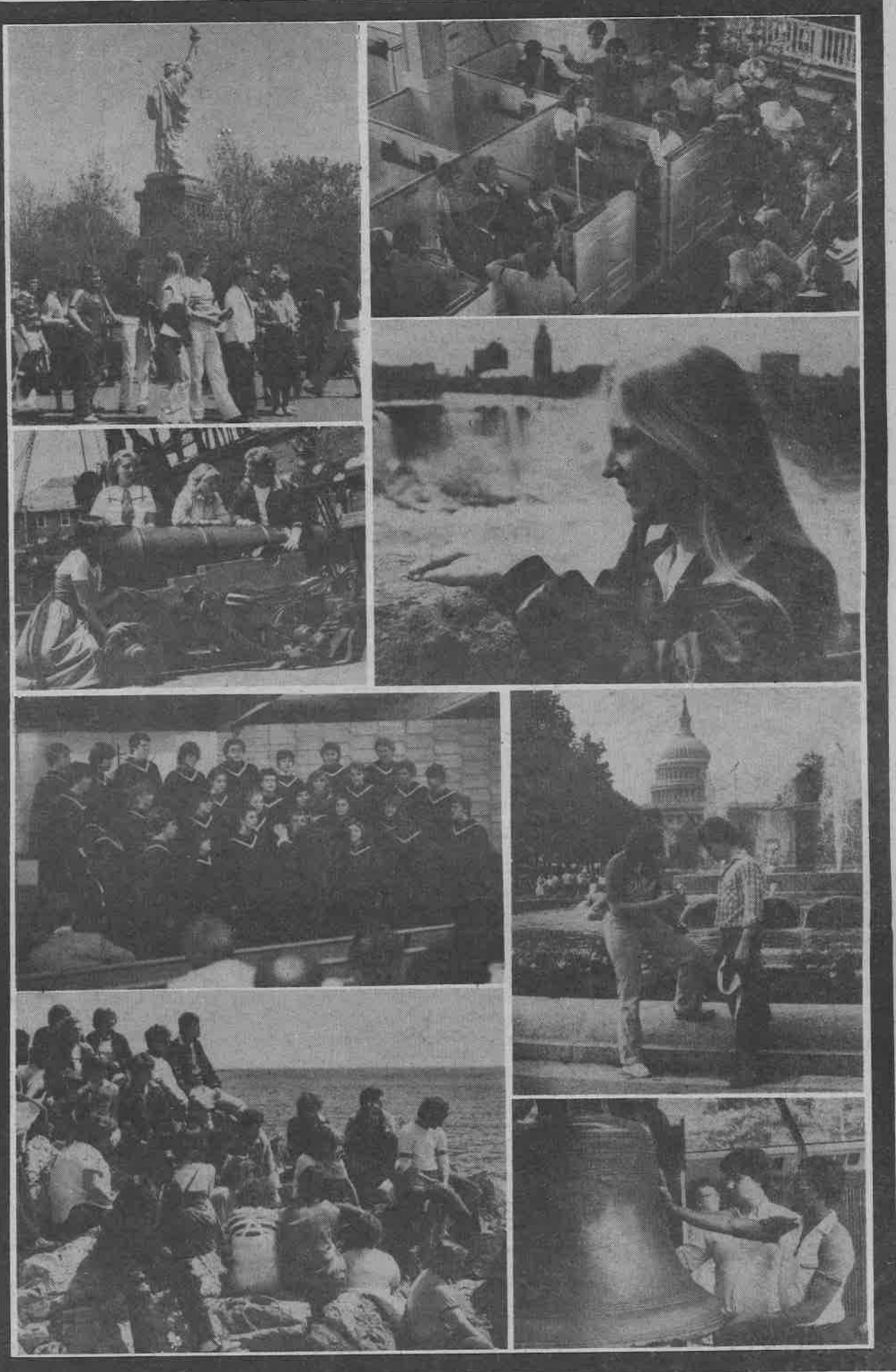
Near the beginning of their tour, the chorus performed at Great Lakes Christian College in Beamsville, Ontario. The following day allowed time for several hours in Niagara Falls. A tour of the Eastman Kodak Company in Rochester, New York highlighted the next day.

After arriving on the East Coast, the group spent a morning exploring the old coastal town of Marblehead, Massachusetts. They then drove into Boston for a tour of the U.S.S. Constitution and the "Old North Church", where Paul Revere had lights placed to signal the beginning of the Revolutionary War.

A ferry ride to the Statue of Liberty highlighted a Saturday stop in New York City. The next afternoon allowed for a tour of Independence Hall and the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia. Before leaving the nation's capitol on Tuesday, the group visited the Capitol Building, Lincoln Memorial, and Jefferson Memorial.

As the Chorus drove down Rochester Road toward campus on May 22, a spontaneous verse of the MCC Alma Mater filled the bus. Although the group had a tremendous time in a lot of exciting places, it was great to be back home.
