Bible School Honor Roll

Class of 1978 holds Ten Year Reunion

On July 8-10, 1988, approximately 100 people gathered at the College for the ten year reunion of the Michigan Christian College Class of 1978. Fifty-seven of those present were actual class members.

The group stayed in the Alma Gatewood Dormitory, on Friday evening, and began the weekend's festivities with a devotional in the Westside Central Chapel. After a "midnight basketball" game, in the gymnasium, a chapel service was held early Saturday morning, followed by a "Who I Am and What I've Been Doing" videotape session.

On Saturday afternoon, all attendees enjoyed a dutch-treat luncheon at a local restaurant, which preceded an afternoon of softball, volleyball, and reminiscing. Later that evening, a banquet, prepared by the Rochester Chapter of the Associates, highlighted the weekend's festivities.

Fifty-six congregations represented at third annual Jim Wood Church Leaders' Workshop

On June 3-4, 1988, in MCC's Westside Central Chapel, the third annual Jim Wood Church Leaders' Workshop was held. Present at the Workshop were 103 attendees, representing 56 congregations throughout Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, and Canada. Mrs. Hellen Wood, widow of Mr. Jim Wood, was also present at the Opening Session of the Workshop, on June 3, 1988.

The Workshop, bearing the theme "Planning for the Year 2000 and Beyond," featured general lecture sessions and smaller classes on such subjects as "Opportunities for Church Growth in the 1990's," "Converting Friends, Not Strangers," "Use of Computers in Church Growth," "Encouraging Persistence and Leadership in Smaller Congregations," "Vision Canada for 2000 and Beyond," and "The Preacher's Accountability."

General Session speakers included Dr. Flavil Yeakley, Director of the Institute of Church Growth, in Abilene, Texas; Dr. Mac Lynn, Chairman of the Bible Department at David Lipscomb University; and Mr. Jerry Tallman, Minister at the Rochester Church of Christ.

On May 7, 1988, under the pine trees in front of Gallaher Center, 46 graduates participated in commencement exercises. Valedictorian Kali Ponder was recognized for being only the eighth student in the history of the College to graduate with a perfect 4.0 grade point average. In a moving speech, Kali spoke to fellow graduates of special friendships they had to cherish forever, and closed her address by offering future students the advice that being involved with the lives of fellow students would enrich their own lives. Dan Beaudoin, having earned a 3.77 grade point average, was honored for his academic standing as Salutatorian. Dan addressed graduates, and the entire audience, on "The Importance of Making An Impact As a Christian."

Platform guests, other than President Milton B. Fletcher and Academic Dean Leonard Knight, who participated in the program were Mr. Royce Dickinson, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, who greeted the graduates; Mr. Leonard Blake, Class of 1961, who led the invocation; Dr. Jim Mankin, Director for the Center for Christian Leadership, in Abilene, Texas, who addressed graduates on "Developing the Christian Spirit Within Yourself;" Mr. Joe Bentley, who directed the

A Baccalaureate Service was held for the graduates on May 1, 1988, at the Rochester Church of Christ. President Milton B. Fletcher presided over the service, and Academic Dean Leonard Knight spoke briefly to graduates on "Ways We Know That God Is At

Hand." B.R.E. graduate Andy Peper led the group in several hymns; Pete Sexton led the opening prayer; Mark Brackney, 1987-88 Student Body Association President, addressed graduates with a lesson on "Being Your Best," and Vic Bliss closed the service with a prayer.

The College's final chapel service for the 1987-88 school year took place the next morning, at 11:30 a.m., in the Westside Central Chapel. Mr. Bruce Black, Minister for the Bristol Road Church of Christ, in Flint, Michigan, addressed graduates, employees, and underclassmen on "Appreciating the Blessing of a Christian Education."

The Troy, Michigan resident plans to attend Oakland University, in the fall, and work toward a Pre-Law/Pre-Engineering degree.

Adults Are Going Back to School!

Adults are going back to school in record numbers every year. In response to this trend, Michigan Christian College is in the process of increasing its services for adult students. This fall, every course will be offered for both regular credit and for continuing education units (CEU). Please note the difference between the two.

Regular Credit. Courses taken for regular credit are applicable to college degree programs, and are transferable to other colleges. The number of credits offered for each class is listed with its cost.

Continuing Education Units (CEU). If you wish to take a course without required assignments or testing, you may enroll in the course for continuing education units. Continuing education courses are usually taken for enrichment purposes or for job training. They normally do not include such faculty services as the grading of papers. However, you may receive one CEU (Continuing Education Unit) for each ten hours of class attendance. The maximum number of CEU's offered for each class is listed with its cost.

BIB 3533 Principles of Teaching. A study of the principles and methods of teaching. Designed to help classroom teachers of all groups improve instructional skills. Taught by Mel Storm. Tuesday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 in Associates Campus Center 6. 3 credits/\$342 or 4.2 CEU/\$240.

BIB 3822/3823 World Religions. A survey of the major religious movements around the world. Special attention to current topics in their cultural context. Taught by Steve Eckstein. Thursday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00 in Associates Campus Center 8. 2 credits/\$228, 3 credits/\$342 or 2.8 CEU/\$160.

BUS 2113 Accounting I. Elementary accounting theory, practice, and simple analysis; applications to single proprietorships. Taught by Andy Borchers. Monday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 in Associates Campus Center 6. 3 credits/\$362 or 4.2 CEU/\$260.


