Michigan students John Debelak of Skandia; Lydia Wright of Detroit; and Marie Harlick and Richard Fuller of Hazel Park.



95% of student body averages over \$2,300 in financial aid

Figures released by Kent Hoggatt, MCC Director of Financial Aid, reveal that \$470,678 in financial aid has been awarded to MCC students for the 1979-80 academic year. Ninety-five percent of the full-time students are receiving aid, each student averaging over \$2,300. This average covers over two-thirds of the expenses for a full-time, boarding student.


Federal funded aid programs account for \$276,751 of the awards. Basic and Supplemental Grants make up well over half of this figure, while loans and work complete the remainder.

Michigan residents are receiving \$152,350 in aid from the state funded programs. \$124,784 of this amount is grant aid available to state residents only when they attend a private school in Michigan. The latter figure includes the new Differential Grant of \$500 per year, which is available regardless of financial need.

College sponsored programs, consisting of various types of achievement awards and scholarships, total \$41,977. Profits from the MCC Bookstore provide funding of these college sponsored programs.

Students interested in receiving financial aid for the 1980-81 academic year are encouraged to apply for aid during the months of January and February. More information about financial aid programs and application forms may be obtained from MCC.
