## Business Department expands to three-year curriculum

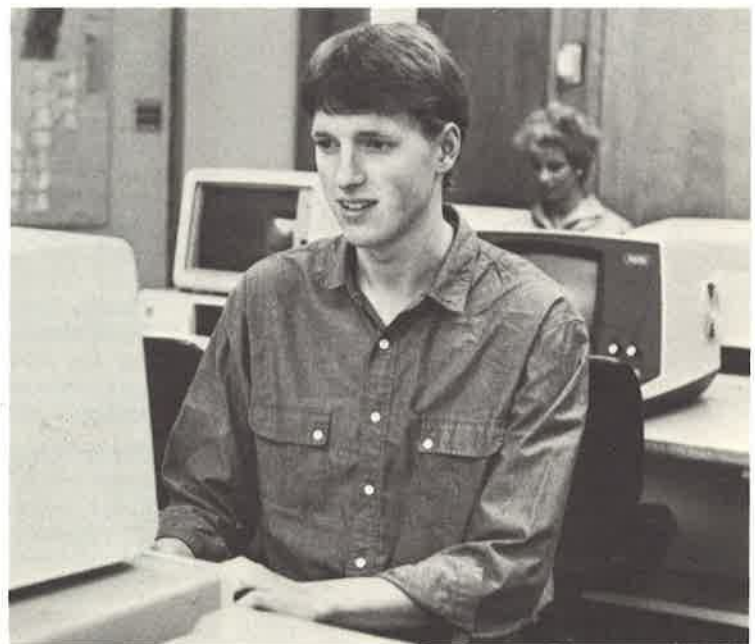
Moving toward implementation of a Bachelor of Business Administration (B.B.A.) degree at Michigan Christian College, the college will begin a major expansion of the business curriculum this fall. This expansion will allow MCC students to complete one additional year beyond the Associate in Arts degree toward a bachelor's degree in business.

Through cooperative arrangements with other colleges, students who complete MCC's three-year program will be able to enter those colleges with senior level standing and complete a bachelor's degree with approximately one year of additional work at the cooperating institution. To date, those arrangements have been finalized with Abilene Christian University and Harding University. Similar arrangements with several other colleges are expected by fall.

Students interested in a variety of majors such as Accounting, Economics, Computer Information Systems, Finance, Management, and Marketing can be served by the new three-year program. In addition to the restructuring of current courses into upper-division classes, new courses will be added to the MCC curriculum to support the new business program.

MCC is currently taking the steps required to obtain State approval and North Central accreditation of the full B.B.A. program. Until that process is complete, the third-year program will serve students through their junior year of college.

## At a Glance

Honors Composition students presented "A Crime Without a Name" to the entire student body in chapel at the end of last semester. The class developed the program after a semester of research and writing about the Jewish Holocaust. Their research included a visit with author and Holocaust survivor Yaffa Eliach at the new Holocaust Center in Southfield.

Cross Country runner Joe Meredith of Detroit received All American honors from the NLCAA in January. Meredith led the MCC team in performance this past season. MCC's Cross Country Coach, Michael Light, has himself qualified for the Boston Marathon by placing 230 out of 2,733 runners in the Free Press Marathon.

Business students from MCC attended a lecture by John Naisbitt at Oakland University. Naisbitt, an economist and author is best known for his best-selling books *Megatrends* and *Reinventing the Corporation*.

Mobilizing to reach the students of nearby Oakland University, about 20% of the MCC student body is now involved in personal evangelism on the campus of OU. MCC students are setting up Bible studies after making contact with OU students in the public areas of their campus.

Chemistry students now have use of a Varian EM-300X nuclear magnetic resonance spectrometer. The instrument is used by chemists to analyze and study the structure of organic compounds. The spectrometer, considered the workhorse of organic chemistry, was acquired from the UpJohn Company.

MCC Chorus members joined over 500 choral singers from thirteen Christian Colleges at the twenty-first annual Christian College Choral Festival in Searcy, Arkansas. The festival, which will be held in Oklahoma City next year, highlights the Chorus's annual Winter Tour.

## Fiction and Facts about Financial Aid

**Fiction.** Federal and state budget cuts have practically wiped financial aid out of existence.

**Fact.** Although there have been some changes in eligibility requirements, there is still a lot of aid available. In fact, the Pell Grant recently increased from \$2,100 to \$2,300 and the State Tuition Grant from \$2,100 to \$2,350 per year. A large majority of MCC students are receiving aid, including various forms of grants, scholarships, loans, and work programs. The average aid package still covers over two-thirds of the cost for a full-time boarding student at MCC!

**Fiction.** Families must have a very low income in order to qualify for aid.

**Fact.** Naturally, the lower the income, the more aid a student can receive. However, some current MCC students with a family income over \$51,000 are receiving some federal and state assistance to attend MCC.

**Fiction.** It is wiser to live at home and commute to the community college since this option only involves tuition costs.

**Fact.** The College Board reports an average annual cost of \$3,768 at the community college. Many fail to consider the cost of owning and operating a car on a daily basis, the usage of extra utilities at home, and those grocery bills! In addition, community colleges usually do not offer as much financial aid nor the benefits of a Christian college environment.

**Fiction.** It makes no difference when one applies for aid.

**Fact.** Sure, some types of aid are available regardless of application date, but many are not. Michigan residents should apply for aid immediately in order to receive the \$2,350 Tuition Grant. Out-of-state students should apply for aid during the spring months. Later applicants receive aid, but their packages include less grant aid.
