Spring semester academic courses focus on current social issues

Guest speakers from various professions have been scheduled throughout the semester in a sociology course entitled Social Problems. Mrs. Birgie Houston, instructor of the course, made these arrangements so students could benefit from the experience of individuals who deal with social problems on a daily basis.

The course is designed to familiarize students with current social problems confronting American society and how to treat and prevent those problems. Topics being discussed by guests include child abuse, counseling the elderly, domestic violence, the need for adequate housing for the homeless, post-abortion stress, substance abuse, incest, and teenage pregnancy.

Other topics include crime and the judicial system, covered by

Joyce Todd, Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for Oakland County and former MCC student, Norm Christman, a MCC Trustee and retired Vice President for Finance of General Motors Acceptance Corporation, will deal with social problems in the business community. Art Williams, an inner-city teacher and former MCC student, discussed racism early in the semester.

In another class, Honors Composition II, one group chose to research and write about AIDS for their semester project. Under the direction of their instructor, Dr. Fawn Knight, the group surveyed the student body and staff to assess their knowledge and viewpoints about the disease, printed the survey results, and hosted a simulated talk show to discuss related issues.



Warriors participate in national tournament

Sporting a 22-5 season record, the men's basketball team of Michigan Christian College received an invitation to the National Finals of the National Little College Athletic Association (NLCAA) held in Madison, Wisconsin on March 7-11. Participation in this year's tournament marked the Warriors' sixth trip to the national finals in the past seven years.

Although the team did not return from the nationals with a trophy, William Sayles of Detroit was selected to the All-American Team. Sayles, who led the Warriors in scoring by averaging 24 points per game during the season, will have the opportunity to compete against Russian teams when the All-American Team travels to Moscow this summer.
