- A film, as well as a written Library, will be developed at North Central. We plan to make films on many nations and make them available to congregations and various groups of interested people. It is planned to keep this library up-to-date at all times.
- Many returning missionaries will be invited to visit North Central and lecture as well as give personal counsel to students.



- Board of Directors faithfully working for four years.
 Officers: Wheeler Utley, Chairman; James Thomas, Vice-Chairman; George Ford, Secretary; Lester Allen Treasurer.
- \$150,000 Campaign in 1956 resulted in a total of almost \$250,000.

 - Sophomore year will be added in the Fall of 1960.
- All indications are that 150 freshman students will enroll in September, 1959.
