## CONSIDERATIONS IN IMPLEMENTING MANDATORY PRE-ENROLLMENT ASSESSMENT AND REQUIRED LITERACY COURSE REGISTRATION Lawrence J. Gage February 2002

# The following vignettes incorporate mandatory policies into actual new student counseling/advisement appointments.

#### Thomas L.

57 year old Farmington Hills resident. Owns and operates a home- remodeling business. Wants to take PHO 170 – Digital Photography to build an advertising brochure. Told he must take ASSET, does so and places into ENG 106. Is informed he must first take ENG 106 before he can enroll in PHO 170.

#### John F.

20 year old high school graduate, operates his own landscaping/snow removal business. Wishes to enroll in fifteen week spring PER 254 – Medical First Responder course since he has opportunity to train as a part-time, paid-on-call Farmington Hills firefighter. ASSET placement of ENG 105. Reads well but admits he is a poor writer, verified by review of his high school transcripts and ACT profile. Told he is ineligible to enroll in four credit PER 254 until eight credits of ENG 105 is completed.

#### Jodi E.

good Such

19 year old, with one semester at Eastern Michigan University, during which she contracted a viral infection. Completed nine of thirteen credits with C's or better. Left Eastern for one semester for medical treatment. Wishes to take six credits spring and seven credits summer at OCC to make up for "lost" term. Places into ENG 106 and is informed she cannot take thirteen spring/summer transferable EMU Basic Studies requirements (POL 151, SOC 251, PSY 251, CIS 105) until non-transferable ENG 106 is completed.

#### Suzanne R.

26 year old recently divorced single parent of seven and four year old daughters. No financial aid eligibility. Would like to be certified for home day care facility and is able to take ECD 1404 (Intro. to Early Childhood Careers) one night per week. Arranges for sitter in order to take ASSET, places in ENG 106, and is informed she must complete the six credit literacy course before enrolling in ECD 1404.

#### Delbert M.

24 year old married father of two. Commercial bakery employee applies to complete Bakery and Pastry Arts Certificate Program. Employer will pay for all culinary courses. Wife is enrolled at Wayne County CC in LPN program. Delbert takes ASSET and is placed in ENG 105, is an effective but very slow reader. Informed he must complete eight credit ENG 105 before he can enroll in the two credit CUL 1050 – Beginning Cake Decorating course his employer specifically wished for him to complete.

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#### Robert D.

17 year old Harrison High School senior admitted for second enrollment as a high school guest student. Attended OCC spring term after junior year as high school guest student with one term ASSET exemption, and completed MAT 171 (Calculus I). Wishes to enroll for Calculus II, takes ASSET and receives ENGP of 2. Is informed next enrollment at OCC is restricted to ENG 106 and other courses on a Directed Studies list that does not include Calculus II. Has been admitted to Western Michigan University and plans to major in Computer Engineering.

#### Margaret S.

38 year old with a GED, expresses anxiety about attending college but feels comfortable with suggestion to start with a Jewelry (ART 161) or Ceramics (ART 154) course since she enjoys crafts and has some experience with both areas. Her ASSET placement in ENG 105, however, requires enrollment in a mandatory literacy course.

#### Tommy B.

20 year old, employed full-time at a car dealership performing oil changes and tire servicing and mounting. Wishes to complete the eight course specialization in Automobile Servicing to qualify for the Michigan Auto Mechanic Certification Tests. Tommy has rebuilt and restored two cars since age sixteen and has worked a season as an assistant stock car race mechanic. Takes ASSET and receives an ENG 105 placement and is informed he must first enroll in the eight credit Literacy I course.

#### "DIRECTED COURSES"

The Developmental Education Task Force Report's fourth recommendation is to "require <u>directed courses</u> for developmental students. A list of recommended directed courses is in existence and is used by counselors to advise students." In August 2001 the Highland Lakes Campus Counseling Department compiled a list of courses to be used for advising students based on ENGP Level Scores. Informal discussion of the list by the counseling discipline has occurred on several occasions but no specific list of courses has yet been officially established.
