Plans Made to Evangelize the World

LUBBOCK, Tex.—History is destined to be written Sept. 26-28 as elderships from across the nation and missionaries from around the world meet for the second World Evangelism Forum at the Sunset church here.

The forum will seek to evangelize 80 nations that now have no missionaries and no known plans to send the Word. Such a goal will plant New Testament Christianity in every nation of the world.

Of 120 unevangelized nations, 40 were subscribed during last year's forum. Some of the programs are underway. Others are in the planning stages with actual work to begin later.

Missionaries will be present to serve as counsellors in the sectional meetings to be conducted for the benefit of churches planning mission programs. Panels, classes and outstanding reports are scheduled by men who have returned from the unevangelized countries.

Unusual tools of evangelism will be explained. Included are merchant marine, foreign visitors, radio, and mission seminars.

Several missionaries already committed to a field will report to the forum, and there is planned an exchange of ideas session so that questions can be answered and suggestions made by those in attendance.

Stanley Ship will begin the forum Friday evening with an address on "The World Is Yours." Bob Hare, will explain how "No Nation Is Closed to Evangelism."

Saturday the program will present Harlon Overton, Waymon Miller, Guy Caskey, Richard O. Rogers, Ed Wharton, and from Madras, India, James A. Johnson.

The elders of the Sunset church, who are sponsoring the forum, are on record that this is not a project with a code name. The World Evangelism Forum is not the project of any one congregation, but a project of many congregations accepting the challenge of planting New Testament Christianity in virgin fields.

They point out that "duplication of efforts, as well as duplicity of mistakes is the costly price we have paid for unilateral action. Congregational autonomy does not demand that we act independent of others, or worse still ignorant of the labors of others."

Of the 18,000 congregations of the brotherhood, 120 are asked to be responsible for an unevangelized country, with other congregations helping.
