The Church at Shepherd, Mich. J. M. POWELL



Fifteen years ago, two Christian famlies moved from West Virginia to Central Michigan to work in the oil fields. They began worshiping in their homes. Today in Shepherd stands a small but attractive white frame church house in which thirtysix men, women and children worship after the New Testament order. The building has a vestibule, classroom, rest rooms, bap-tistry and full basement. The water in the baptistry is heated by an unusual plan originated by Brother Bigham, a member of the congregation.

Of the thirty-six members of the church only eight are men. Each of the men takes a public part in the work and wor-ship of the church. Two of the men are members of the faculty of Central Michigan College of Education. The professors are Dr. R. P. Cuff of the department of English and Dr. C. P. Poole of the Psychology department. These and their families attend all the services of the church and otherwise lead in the activities of the con-gregation, though they live ten miles from Shepherd.

In many ways the congregation is re-markable. For one thing there is perfect peace in the church and all have a mind to work. Two families come from Clare,

Mich., twenty-five miles away. They at-tend both services on the Lord's days. Hence, they drive one hundred miles each Sunday to worship God. For another thing the church contributes between fifty and sixty dollars per Sunday. Is not that a splendid record for a group of thirty-six with only eight wage earners? The church sends fifteen dollars monthly to an orphan home. In addition they contribute month-ly to the African work. Recently they have sent contributions to the Flushing (N. Y.) work and the Alaska work.

Each month the church sets aside a certain amount to be used later to construct a preacher's home. They hope eventually to locate a preacher in Shepherd to de-vote his full time to the work in Central Michigan.

In the past few years two congregations have been started from the church in Shepa herd; one at Mt. Pleasant with a member-ship of some eight or ten one at Marion with eight members. The Marion church is the northernmost congregation in the state of Michigan.

The writer recently closed a meeting with the Shepherd church. While there were no additions the interest was high
