

Guiding Principles and Recommendations

- Make the agreement simple and easy to understand
- Increase completion rate of associate's degrees by incorporating MTA requirements
- Keep the agreement student focused
- Promote transparency among institutions to ensure accurate transfer information

MTA Course Requirements-30 cr.

- One course in English composition
- A second course in English composition or one course in communications
- One course in mathematics
- Two courses in social sciences (from two disciplines)
- Two courses in humanities and fine arts (from two disciplines, and excluding studio and performance classes)
- Two courses in natural science (from two disciplines) including one laboratory experience
- Each course included in the MTA must be completed with a 2.0 or better. Macrao required an overall GPA of 2.0

MTA-What it is and what it is not

What it is

- Lower-level core college courses; breadth, not depth
- Minimum of 30 credit hours must be taken in approved disciplines
- A more rigorous distribution of disciplines that reflects the majority of lower-level general education at the receiving institutions
- Two-year to four-year transfer
- A roadmap for undeclared/undecided students

What it is not

- A roadmap to self-advising
- A certificate that is transferable to any four year institution
- The best fit for every student (example: Applied Science degrees)

MTA Facts

- The new normal for Gen Ed requirements
- State Mandated Legislation for 2/4yr. Public institutions
- 2/4yr. Colleges/universities must accept all 30 credits / not optional
- 2/4 yr. institutions will look for MTA endorsement on a transfer transcript first
- Not having MTA endorsement may require a transfer student to complete additional Gen Ed Requirements at the 4yr.
 Institution
- MTA gives students a track to follow that allows students time to explore transfer schools and pathways

Things To Consider

- Current OCC transfer degrees require additional credits not utilized by 4 yr. institutions. This can have a potential impact on degree completion rates
- Potential impact on Financial Aid
- MTA/OCC transfer degree alignment allows for seamless transfer of most Gen Ed requirements
- MTA/OCC transfer degree alignment allows students to enter a 4yr. Institution at the junior/3rd yr. level.
- Data supports more than 50% of OCC transfer degree students transfer to public colleges/universities. These percentages increase when including private institutions.
