NORTH CENTRAL ANNOUNCES MISSIONS FACULTY FOR 1959-1960



MAURICE HALL

Faculty of the Missions Department was announced jointly by the President and Dean of North Central Christian College on July 23, 1959 and will comprise these persons:

Head of the Department of Missions, directing the Post Graduate course in Missions, will be Maurice C. Hall, Abilene Christian College, BA, 1949; The Sorbonne, Paris, France, (special study in French and Religion) and Harding College of Bible and Religion, MA, 1959. Mr. Hall will be teaching Missions 102 and 112. He will also teach Missions 405 which is listed as The Experienced Missionary. He has spent one year in the Philippine Islands (1945), two years in Germany, (1946-1948), and eight years in France (1949-1958).



OTIS GATEWOOD

President Otis Gatewood, Abilene Christian College, BA, and George Pepperdine College, MA, will teach Missions 325, Methods and the Work of the Missionary. President Gatewood spent many years in mission work in the Southwest and in the West, and was the first missionary to enter Germany after the war. He has traveled thousands of miles in America and throughout the world in the interest of world-wide evangelism. His latest efforts have been directed toward Russian and Alaskan evangelism.

Dean Lucien Palmer, George Peabody College, BA, MA, (candidate for Ed. S), will teach Missions 442, Social Aspects of Mission Work. Dean Palmer has been connected closely with missionary endeavors in Nigeria, having gone to this land as missionary and teacher in 1954. He

actively continued this association until 1958.

NORTH CENTRAL CHRISTIAN COLLEGE - A LITTLE UNITED NATIONS

The campus of North Central will truly be a little United Nations in itself as students salute one another in the language of Russia, France, India, Germany and Mexico. Professors and student instructors (who will be in accent correction labs) will be effective and capable in the language in which they will be concerned. Student instructors will be natives of the country. All Professors of languages will have spent considerable time in the countries of the language they teach.

Other missionary activity will include a film and a written library of the missionary activities of the world.

This year, numerous returning missionaries are expected to participate in lecturing and giving personal counseling to students.

A feature of this program that makes it of special Interest to all future and returning missionaries is that we are located in the Detroit area where the church is comparatively strong, yet within a few miles of a veritable mission field—Canada, Northern Michigan and Illinois.

SPECIAL LECTURERS WILL ADDRESS MISSIONS CLASSES. Special Lectures in the Missions Programs will include Dr. George S. Benson, President, Harding College, former missionary to China; Mr. A. R. Holton, former missionary to Korea and well-known minister and lecturer on missionary activities of the world; Miss Irene Johnson, for several years missionary in Germany and Director of Children's Camps in Germany and Mr. E. W. McMillan, formerly President, Ibaraki Christian College, Japan, and widely known in the field of missionary activity.

SCHOLARSHIP POLICY. Some scholarships and loans are available in the Department of Missions to Post Graduate Students or to students who are making preparations to enter the mission field and to missionaries who are on furlough and who feel the need of more training before returning to the field.

"We write to seek your help in supplying some workers for this area . . . Have a fine physical plant and a need for some workers . . ."


FROM U.S.A.:

Mr. Stephen Bilak, Institute Biblique, Paris, France, and David Lipscomb College, BA, will teach Missions 313, History of Missions. Mr. Bilak was born in the Ukraine, and has lived in Germany and France where he was actively engaged in study and in mission work.

Miss Kathleen McGehee, John B. Stetson University, BA, and University of North Carolina, BSLS, and graduate study at Columbia University, will teach in the Missions Department. Miss McGehee will lecture on the work of the woman in the mission field and teach by means of visual aids on the development of the work in the field.

Mr. Morris Womack, Butler University, BA, BD, will teach Missions 413, Comparative Religions. Mr. Womack is minister of the Church of Christ in Allen Park, Michigan. He is very interested in encouraging all missionary efforts.

Professors in other courses in missions will include Dr. Howard L. Schug, University of Michigan, BA, MA, George Peabody College, PhD, who has spent many years in active participation in missions in Mexico and Germany and Mr. Hugh Mingle, Harding College, BA, who has spent nearly a decade in Germany.
