
Student Union Building Under Construction

Ladies Associates Undertake Another Major Project

Ground has been broken for a new Student Union Building on the campus of Michigan Christian College. This muchneeded structure has been in the planning stage for a long while.

Situated just east of the Multi-purpose building, it will have two floors below present campus-ground level facing on Lake Norcentra and, ultimately, two floors above campusground level facing south toward Avon Road. The Architect's drawing (right) is looking at it from the lake shore side.
