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# Dr. Joseph F. Jones Appointed Academic Vice President



Effective January 1, 1967, Dr. Joseph F. Jones will become the Academic Vice President of Michigan Christian College. In this position he will have the responsibility of leading the "Academic Affairs" of the college. His duties will bring him close to the faculty, curriculum, library, and the academic life of the students. He will also work very closely with the Dean, Registrar, Director of Admissions, Athletic Director and other academic offices as they may be developed in the future.

President Palmer, in making the announcement of the appointment stated, "Dr. Jones, by age, academic training and scholarship, by experience, and by personality is especially suited to assume the leadership of the academic affairs of MCC. He holds the junior college diploma from David Lipscomb, the M.A. degree from Pepperdine College, a second M.A. degree from the University of Michigan, and th Ed.D. degree from Oklahoma University. For seven years he taught at Oklahoma Christian College and, in addition, served as Dean of Students and for a time as Acting Academic Dean of the college. #### Moving Toward Goal

In a recent News Letter to Planned Expansion Campaign workers from Campaign leaders James E. Thomas, Chairman, Paul Lutz, Cochairman, and Jack Hoover, Chairman of Zone 1, it was announced that as of November 7, 31.6% of the possible contributors in Zone 1 to the Million Dollar Campaign had been contacted. Reports in as of that date showed \$226,395.48 had been raised toward the \$1,000,000.00 goal.

The West Dearborn church of Christ, as one group with 117 family unit prosspects, is leading the Zone 1 area so far in contributions with \$26,000.00 reported. The Rochester congregation, with 57 family unit prospects, is running a close second with \$20,795.00 reported. It is the only group that has completed 100% solicitation.

Zone 1 includes areas as follows: Jackson-Ypsilanti, Lansing, Flint, Macomb County, Pontiac, Oakland County, Toledo (Ohio), Wayne County-Central, Wayne County-East, Wayne County-Downriver. Zone II Areas (Western Michigan and Northwestern Indiana) are now being organized. Zone I represents only "Phase I" of the Million Dollar Campaign.

On Thursday night, October 13, more than 1,000 people crowded into the gymnasium to climax the four-day Bible Lectureship, the ninth of these annual events in the school's history.

"Convictions In Crises" was the theme as good men developed it with lectures throughout the week. Morton Utley began the series on Sunday night, October 9, with "The Source of Christian Conviction" and A. C. Pullias delivered the final lecture on the subject "He Who Lacks Conviction"


