Effective January 1, 1967, Dan H. Woodroof became the Director of Student Life at Michigan Christian College. In this position he will have the responsibility of the non-academic affairs of the college that relate particularly to student life. He will fill the vacancy left by Cylde Balderson, Jr., who resigned as Dean of Students in the summer of 1966.

Brother Woodroof will be responsible

for planning and executing various oncampus student activities such as banquets, outings, and programs of various kinds. Most non-academic counselling of students will be handled by his office. He will also serve as chairman or emcee of Chapel exercises each day. As Director of Student Life on campus, he will also maintain a closer relationship with MCC Alumni as Director of Alumni Relations.

Since 1963, Brother Woodroof has served the college in the Public Relations Department and will continue, as Director of Public Relations, to edit Administrative and Student publications, design and process all printed brochures, and disseminat information about the college by way of news releases and announcements.

He is an alumnus of David Lipscomb College and married to the former Jane Harris of Nashville, Tennessee. They have four children at home: Robert (16), Danny (10), Laura (9) and Susan (3). Their oldest daughter, Mrs. Sandra Milholland, lives in Dallas, Texas. Her husband, Tom Milholland is one of the ministers of the Skillman Ave. Church of Christ. They have one other "daughter", Janet McCloud, who came to live with the Woodroofs when she was a student at MCC. She is now a senior at Harding College majoring in elementary education.



### Music Department NEW LISTENING EQUIPMENT

Among the many wonderful and useful gifts to MCC from the Ladies Associates is the new recording and listening equipment recently installed in the Music Department.

It will be used to great advantage as an academic aid in Music Appreciation, Music Theory, Church Music, and in private voice and piano courses. The equipment, including four new tape recorders, will assist Mr. Downey, the Director of the A Cappella Chorus, in developing the chorus by simultaneous sectional rehearsals,

In describing the use of the equipment, Mr. Downey said that it will greatly increase the repertory of the chorus and that the number of works listened to and learned through the new devices will far exceed what the students are able to do without it.

Most of the work, including the re-

modeling of the equipment room, was done by students with the help and under the direction of Mr. Downey. The equipment room is a maze of electronic devices with all kinds of connections available by means of "jacks" and "jumpers" to make full use of the recording and listening equipment.

This is a fine addition to the Fine Arts Department and to the general academic development of the college.
