

KEEBLE-PALMER MISSIONARY TRAINING FUND ESTABLISHED

By official action of the Board of Directors on June 3, 1967, the Keeble-Palmer Missionary Training Fund was established at Michigan Christian College.

The fund will be used to defray college tuition and fees for worthy men and women of all nationalities who desire to be missionaries. Although some students, carefully selected and sent to Michigan Christian by missionaries on the field, will receive the benefit of this fund, it will also aid young men of this country who intend to preach the gospel overseas or in mission areas in the United States.

In establishing the Keeble-Palmer Fund, Chairman Wheeler Utley said, "It seems fitting, in view of the close association over the years between Marshall Keeble and Lucien Palmer, to honor both men because of their equal interest in the people of all races, and because of their unique relationship in serving others together."

President Palmer said, "It is a great honor to me to have my name linked with the name of Marshall Keeble in any endeavor for good; especially as it relates to preaching the gospel of Christ. Brother Keeble has served so many for so long and so well that it would please me that only he be so honored."

When Marshall Keeble was asked by phone for his approval of such a fund in his name and Lucien Palmer's, he simply said, "Brother Palmer and I have been partners a long time and whatever we do for the Lord we do it together. It would be hard to separate us!!"

Keeble and Palmer have made two around-the-world mission trips together. Both men have served as President of Nashville Christian Institute and Palmer has served two different times as a missionary to Nigeria. He is still active in promoting and giving leadership to the Nigerian Christian Schools Foundation which he founded in 1958.

Michigan Christian College from the very beginning has led out in areas of missionary training, having established the first Missions Department of any of our Christian colleges. Regular Missions courses are offered for credit on the college level and the Missions curriculum coincides with the more recently established degree programs in Missions of our senior colleges.

President's Vital Interest In Mission Work Gives Emphasis To Missions Department


NIGERIA
