During the course of the 1968 Bible Lectureship at Michigan Christian College, it was announced that Lucien Palmer, president of the college, would make another visit to the country of Nigeria. The Board of Directors of the college has released him for one month to make this trip with plans to leave about January 2, 1969. Travel expense is being provided by several interested individuals and churches. The survey trip is very important to the future of the Nigerian work, in particular. Mr. Palmer will attempt to determine how churches and individuals can best assist

the people of war-torn Biafra. Such an on-the-spot inspection will provide valuable information relative to methods and (Continued on Page 2)

ACCREDITATION DRIVE PROGRESSES

Michigan Christian has now attained "Correspondent" membership in the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities, the oldest and most prestigious regional accrediting group in the United States. Assisting the college in attaining "Candidate Status" and finally full membership in the Association is Dr. E. K. Williams, Dean of Westminister College in Fulton, Missouri. He has been assigned as consultant to the college by the North Central Association and has visited the campus several times within the last several months.

In addition to the counsel by Dr. Williams, the Association sends Inspection teams periodically to determine the actual progress the college is making toward accreditation. MCC has just experienced its first of several subsequent inspections. Two fine educators in the persons of Mr. Martin Koehneke, President of Concordia Teachers College in River Forrest, Illinois, and Dr. Parker Lichtenstein, Dean and Acting President of Denison University in Grandville, Ohio, made up the first NCA Team. These men, highly respected in their fields, looked objectively at MCC in view of submitting a written report to the Association and to the college describing both the good features of the college and phases of the college operation which need

(Continued from Page 1) procedures of giving more assistance to the missionaries in Nigeria and surrounding countries and more relief to the people who are suffering as a result of the war. With these intentions in mind, the trip's itinerary also includes Ghana, Liberia, Sierre Leone, the Cameroons, and Ethiopia. The University Avenue church in Gainsville, Florida has arranged with Mr. Palmer to look in on the work they are supporting in Zambia. This congregation is underwriting this portion of the travel expense.

Lucien and Ida Palmer and their two children, Edward and Patsy, lived among the Efik people of Biafra (Nigeria) as missionaries from 1954 to 1958. Mrs. Palmer will accompany her husband on this visit, her first return to Nigeria since 1958.

As President of the Nigerian Christian Schools Foundation and even after resignation from this post in 1966, President Palmer's personnal interest in the people of Africa has been manifested in many ways. In 1960 and again in 1962, he escorted the aging Marshall Keeble to Africa,

the Holy Land and around the world. In 1966 he was commissioned by the Nigerian Christian Schools Foundation to finalize a very important land agreement with the Nigerian government. The 100-year lease involved a 75-acre tract of land located in Biafra just 25 miles from the main battle area where 15 million Nigerian people now

suffer from the ravages of civil war. The land site, selected by Mr. Palmer on the visit in 1962, is in use now by Nigerian Christian College which was established in 1964. It is part of the Christian school system which serves approximately 7000 Nigerian Children. Mr. Palmer played a maior role in the founding of this system and though having resigned from the presidency of the Foundation, remains on the Board of Directors and close to that work in an advisory capacity and continues to be very personally interested in these people. He and Mrs. Palmer plan to return to Rochester in February, 1969.
