## **Capacity Crowd Attend Anniversary Banquet**



### STUDENT PROGRAM CALLED MCC's BEST

The banquet hall at MCC was filled to capacity on May 8 to celebrate the Tenth Anniversary of Michigan Christian College. Most of those present were from the Michigan and northern Ohio area. Banquets in other areas are also planned during this tenth year for the benefit of the many friends of the College who live out of the state, of Michigan.

"Michigan Christian College in Review", presented by the students of the college, was the program of the evening. It was acclaimed as "at least one of the

best programs the college has ever had." The professional manner of presentation and the talents of the students were impressive.

The program, produced and directed by Freshmen Rick Watson of Toledo, Ohio and Bob Woodroof of Rochester, was narrated by Eric Fletcher, a freshman from Rochester, Michigan. Much of the script was written by Sophomore Bruce Kilmer of Pontiac, Michigan. Faculty advisors were Professors Donald Bone and Edward Ditchie. Dan Woodroof, Director of Stugent Life and Public Relations at the College served as Toastmaster. The banquet arrangements and program concept were under the leadership of Milton Fletcher, Vice President of the College.

The total contribution on this occasion was \$7,003.30. The money will be used toward the daily operating cost of the College. Mr. Fletcher said, "On behalf of the Board of Directors and the President deep appreciation is expressed to all who had a part in this generous gift. Tax allocations make up the difference in public education. Were it not for people who are willing by their gifts to make up the diference in Christian education, private schools could not exist. We are so very grateful."

The school colors of gold and white dominate the creation, acentuated by a touch of red, blue, purple, and bronze in the college seal outlined in black. The brass pole, topped by a 9" polished brass eagle, was donated by the 1969 Student Boly Council.

#### Dr. Williams Delivers Commencement Address

On the morning of May 31 and surrounded by the natural beauty of the MCC campus the Ninth Graduating Class of Michigan Christian College received diplomas representing Associates in Arts or Associate in Science degrees or the Junior College Certificate.

Ethelene Bruce of Bad Axe, Michigan and Judy Phillips of Midland, Michigan find their place in and prepare for the Commencement procession. In addition to many other student activities, Miss Bruce served as assistant editor of the student newspaper THE NORTH STAR and Miss Phillips served as assistant editor of the TOTEM POLE yearbook.

Dr. E. K. Williams, Dean of Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri and North Central Association consultant to Michigan Christian, delivered a uniquely relevant and thought proviking address on "The Grief of Learning". He commended the College for Christian principles and strongly maintained that academic excellence and Christian ideals go hand in hand. He noted the refreshing atmosphere on the MCC campus as compared to the campuses over the country which are torn by student revolt and riot. As to the student cry for "relevance in education", Dr. Williams noted that the relevancy described in many student "demands" would not serve the large majority of students because no one can predict the future. "What is relevant today is not necessarily relevant tomorrow," he said. "Real education, in the formal sense, involves the grief of irrelevance. But the educational process and the mental exercise gained by the student enables him to meet the relevance of each day long after his days of formal education are over."

Upon the recommendation of Dr. Joseph Jones, MCC Academic Dean, MCC President Lucien Palmer conferred the degrees on the members of the graduating class. College Registrar Ralph Burris placed the junior college hood on each graduate.
