Phone-A-Visit Campaign Set for October 25-November 23

The loyal sponsors of Michigan Christian College are to be commended for having kept their commitments to the Salary Sharing program during these economically difficult times. A few have been unable to continue with pledge payments, but have notified the College of their problems and intentions. The institution appreciates that kind of dedicated spirit.

It is time again for the Salary Sharing program. This activity is the fall fund-raising thrust designed to assist in underwriting the operating budget of Michigan Christian College. Approximately 23 percent of the budget is met by gift income; a little less than onehalf this total amount is raised through the Salary Sharing campaign each fall.

In the past, the supporters of Michigan Christian College have been most responsive. The format of this year's campaign will involve three basic steps. The present Salary Sharing contributors will be requested to make an advanced commitment to renew their pledges for 1983. A brochure explaining the program and requesting commitments will then be mailed to everyone on the College mailing list. From October 25 through November 23, the Phone-A-Visit program volunteers will be contacting those not having responded to the mailings.

Last year, there were 87 volunteer callers, approximately onehalf of whom were students, who worked during the one-month Phone-A-Visit campaign. There were 11,041 calls attempted, 6,567 of which were completed. Of the completed calls, 1,755 were successful in generating Salary Sharing commitments. Because of the mailing and the Phone-A-Visit responses, the clientele of Michigan Christian committed \$213,007 to the 1982 Salary Sharing program. It is hoped that the upcoming campaign will be just as successful

Michigan Christian College receives the gift income part of the operating budget by way of: (1) the Salary Sharing campaign in the fall of each year; (2) the Partnership Dinner in the spring of each year (proceeds from which have been dedicated to debt retirement for the past 11 years); and (3) the project contributions of the Associates and Men's Club.

Beginning this year, an additional fund-raising program is also being attempted, namely the conducting of eight or nine out-ofstate dinners annually. This effort will assist in underwriting the gift income portion of the operating budget. The first of these dinners was hosted in Abilene, Texas on June 12, 1982.

The Salary Sharing program continues to be the most prolific fund-raising effort attempted by Michigan Christian College.

Total Enrollment Up as Twenty-Fourth Session Begins

A special chapel service and program on August 25, 1982 marked the official beginning of the twenty-fourth academic vear at Michigan Christian College. Students, faculty, and staff were gathered for the inspiring occasion which opened with introductory remarks by President Milton B. Fletcher.

Following the invocation, offered by MCC Alumni Association Vice President Randy Coss, the audience joined in singing three hymns of praise led by Randy Gill, Director of Musical Activities. Selections included 'All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name", "Hallelujah Praise Jehovah", and "Praise the Lord". Dr. Larry Jurney, Academic Dean, then read the words of Paul in the twelfth chapter of Romans where the apostle challenges his readers to be "transformed by the renewing of your mind" and provides practical suggestions for living in harmony with one's fellow men. The devotional segment of the program closed with the MCC A Cappella Chorus singing "God of Our Fathers", and a prayer of thanks offered by MCC Men's Club President Duane Harrison.

Several special guests were present for the occasion and were introduced by President Fletcher. These included Earl Borden, Avon Township Supervisor; Gwen Orr, President of the MCC Associates; J. Robert Utley, Chairman of the MCC Board of Trustees; Randy Coss; Duane Harrison; and Tony Russell, President of the Student Body Association.

Mr. Utley then extended a welcome to the students and expressed wishes for a successful year. Tony Russell followed by welcoming his fellow students and stressing the total learning experience offered by Michigan Christian College.

As the program drew to a close, the A Cappella chorus and audience joined in singing the Alma Mater. This was followed by a reading of the Preamble to the Constitution by Dr. Larry Jurney as the Chorus provided background music. Just prior to Dr. Fletcher declaring the twenty-fourth session officially in motion, the audience recited the "Pledge of Allegiance" and joined the A Cappella in singing The Star Spangled Banner'

During the week prior to the official opening of school, several on-campus meetings and workshops were held to equip college personnel to better serve the students. Faculty members engaged in a variety of activities regarding new policies, academic advising, teaching skills, etc. Resident supervisors and assistants participated in a workshop designed to help them in their relationships with students in a dormitory situation. Counseling techniques, discipline, etc. were among the discussion topics. All Student Services personnel were also required to be certified in first

A general staff meeting was

held Thursday, August 19. At that time, new faculty and staff members were introduced and the 1982-83 revision of the college handbook was presented. President Fletcher then challenged the faculty and staff to give their best efforts in being accountable to the institution and the clientele which it serves.

Orientation sessions for new students and parents were held August 20-22. Under the direction of Dr. Leonard Knight, Dean of Students, incoming freshmen and their parents were introduced to college policies and services. Sessions to help students choose a major and plan their course selections were directed by Academic Dean, Dr. Larry Jurney. Math and reading placement tests were also conducted to help faculty advisors determine the level at which students were most capable of enrolling.

Campus improvements and beautification programs conducted over the summer gave the facilities and grounds a fresh appearance as students returned to campus. Projects included clean-up of maintenance and storage areas, new upholstery on lobby furniture, a new chapel roof, and clean-up of the lake area.

At the close of the registration period, 346 students had enrolled for the fall semester. This number included 312 full time and 34 parttime students. Seventeen states and two foreign countries were represented in the student body. These included: Alabama, Connecticut, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Hong Kong, and the West In-

Message from the President



Dear Friends,

In this letter I want to sing the praises of the Associates of Michigan Christian College. Later on, we will be applauding the Men's Club.

On Tuesday evening, September 7, 1982, I had the privilege of welcoming the ladies who were present at the first 1982-83 Associates meeting on campus.

Some of you may not be aware of the tremendous asset the Associates have been to Michigan Christian College since its beginning in 1959-60. All of us at Michigan Christian continue to be amazed at the energy, the dedication, and the organizational ability of these great women. They are an inspiring group and are applauded by those interested in Christian education all over this nation.

On an annual basis, the Associates request from the Administration a list of proposed projects which they consider in establishing their revenue budget each year. Recently we forwarded a list to them of 1982-83 challenges totalling \$110,000. These project items are drawn from our annual operating projects which in turn become their revenue budget for the year.

At their first meeting on September 7, I was delighted to hear Catherine Sadurski, their treasurer, report some very interesting figures. She had searched their records and tallied some cumulative project contributions across the years. She particularly highlighted three areas that the Associates contribute to annually. They were:

- 1. Total contributions to debt retirement \$307,790
- 2. Total contributions to purchase the \$125,060 Gierok 54-acre tract of land (this is the farm area where the athletic fields and President's home are located. It fronts on Avon Road and is adjacent to the original 37-acre campus
- 3. Total contributions to the library \$104,485

Since the school began in 1959, the Associates have contributed a total of \$1,420,748 through May 31, 1982. You can see that hundreds of thousands of dollars have been contributed in addition to the three annual projects shown above. We are continually thankful to some 1,500 members of the Associates. Without a doubt, Michigan Christian College would not exist today had it not been for the constant and prayerful work of these great ladies, who are many times assisted by their husbands.

Besides all of the financial benefits that accrue to Michigan Christian College because of the Associates, there are many additional benefits and blessings that have developed across the years. From my vantage point, I believe some of them are:

- The organization has been the vehicle for hundreds of great ladies to put to use their many talents, which were not being fully used in some instances.
- 2. The Associates organization has furnished the avenue for ladies in many congregations to become acquainted and have close Christian fellowship.
- 3. The Associates organization has enabled many women possessing valuable leadership techniques to use them.
- 4. In general, I believe the Associates organization has drawn men and women closer together within the clientele area of Michigan Christian College.
- Through their individual chapter projects and through the organization-wide projects, many thousands of people have become keenly aware of the concept of Christian education.
- The Associates have become a valuable public relations arm of Michigan Christian College, the services of which we could never have paid for budget-wise.

It is a real inspiration each month and at every function to see the faces of those marvelous women who have tirelessly and faithfully worked for so many years for the cause of Christian education. They have proven their love for Michigan Christian College over and over again.

Hats off to you, Associates. May God continue to bless you in your work for Michigan Christian College.

Optional Major Added to Associate Program in Secretarial Science

Students pursuing an Associate in Applied Science degree in Secretarial Science may now choose between three majors at Michigan Christian College. The



Executive Secretarial major, which has enjoyed an excellent placement record since its inception, has been joined by General Secretarial and Legal Secretarial majors.

The Secretarial Science department offers four levels of typing and four levels of shorthand as well as such courses as Clerical Skills, Business Communications, Word Processing and Machine Transcription, and Secretarial Procedures. The secretarial degrees also include selected courses from the business and legal assistance departments. Students may obtain extra elective hours in their program through advanced placement in the skills courses.

MCC's Applied Science degrees are designed for students who wish to enter the employment world immediately after two years of college. Students planning to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Secretarial Science may also obtain the proper foundation courses with an Associate in Arts degree from MCC. Further information about any of these programs may be obtained by requesting a catalog from the Admission's Office.

MCC Hosts Academic Deans' Conference

Michigan Christian College hosted the annual Conference of Academic Deans of Christian Colleges on Thursday, September 30, and Friday, October 1.

Dr. Larry Jurney, Academic Dean, coordinated plans for the event. Deans of all the sister Christian Colleges had been invited to attend. In addition to general meetings and discussions, the guests reviewed the MCC developmental skills program. This program has developed a reputation for outstanding results in helping students achieve their scholastic goals.

Guest speakers for the seminar included Dr. Jerry Miller from the Center for the Study of Higher Education at the University of Michigan; and Dr. Carl Berger, Associate Dean of the School of Education at the University of Michigan.





Profits Provide Scholarships

MCC Family Tours Meadowbrook Hall

Meadowbrook Hall, one of the finest examples of residential architecture in the country, hosted a tour and devotional for approximately 215 members of the MCC family on September 2.

The 100-room, Tudor-style home was built in 1929 at a cost of four

The 100-room, Tudor-style home was built in 1929 at a cost of four million dollars. The structure was the home of Alfred and Matilda Dodge Wilson. Mrs. Wilson was the widow of the late John Dodge, a pioneer in the automotive industry. As their children married and moved away, the Wilsons arranged for Meadowbrook Hall and the surrounding 1,400 acres of land to become the foundation for Oakland University. A sum of two million dollars was also donated. The gift represented one of the largest by a private donor in American history. The Hall is now operated as a conference and cultural facil-

ity.

Meadowbrook Hall was reserved for Michigan Christian College students and staff, and touring was allowed from 7-9 p.m. During that time, Bernard Leshly, music instructor at MCC, filled the hall with music as he played several selections on the pipe organ. Following the touring, everyone gathered in the Great Hall on the lower level for a devotional. Voices blending in a medley of devotional songs could be heard throughout the house and in the outside courtyard. Paul Stinnett, a freshman Bible major from Watervliet, Michigan, and Kent Hoggatt, of the MCC faculty, gave brief remarks.
