



#### Warriors Take Second in National Tournament

Sporting a 22-4 season record and the North Central championship in the National Little College Athletic Association, the MCC Warriors headed for Marion, Ohio during Spring Break for the national tourna-

After a twenty-point victory over Draughons Junior College of Knoxville, Tennessee in the tournament opener, Coach Garth Pleasant's basketball squad went on to defeat last year's national champion Blackburn College team from Carlinville, Illinois.

An overtime victory over Sullivan Junior College of Louisville, Kentucky put the Warriors in the championship game to face Webber College of Babson Park, Florida. The Warriors' leading scorer, Hank Woodmore, sprained his ankle in the game against Sullivan.

Without his services, the Warriors were unable to gain the momentum necessary to bring home the national title. They did, however, return home with a huge trophy for their second place finish.

With the taste of victory so close, Coach Pleasant and the Warriors are looking forward to their fourth try at the national title next year.

Dr. Paul Faulkner will be the featured speaker. He is most well known for his work with Dr. Carl Brecheen in the highly acclaimed Marriage Enrichment Seminars and Film Series. He is a professor at Abilene Christian University, teaching Bible, personal counseling, and marriage counseling. He has completed two Master's Degrees and a Doctorate Degree in education. Dr. Faulkner is the director of the Marriage and Family Institute at ACU and also serves as a member of several professional organizations. He and his wife, Gladys, have four children.

## **Madison Teachers to Conduct** Bible School Workshop at MCC

July 25-27, 1984 will mark the largest Bible school workshop in this part of the country. The MCC campus will host the event as the teaching team from the Madison Church of Christ in Nashville, Tennessee comes to campus to conduct some forty different courses.

Larry Bridgesmith, MCC alumnus and current Bible School Coordinator at the Madison congregation is directing the efforts with the Madison teachers.

Program plans call for eight sessions on teaching preschool, eight on teaching the elementary grades, five on Bible school art and visuals, eight on teaching and working with teens, and eleven on the work of the congregation.

Sessions will begin with a morning devotional at 8:30 and conclude at approximately 9:30 each evening.

Cost for the workshop will be \$12.00 per person. Congregations may send an unlimited number of their teachers for a flat rate of \$160.00. Dorm rooms will be available, first come-first served, at \$15.00 per person regardless of how many nights they are used. Each person is asked to bring their own linens.

"This will be the culmination of our Twenty-Fifth Anniversary celebration," stated President Milton B. Fletcher. "A lot of effort is being put into this event to make it as rich as possible. We trust that everyone who is interested in teaching God's word will make every effort to take advantage of all that these teachers will offer. This will be a great three days.

#### College Credit Available to **Church Leaders** in Spring Term

Two one-week sessions, May 21-25 and May 28-June 1, will make up the 1984 Spring Term for Church Leaders at Michigan Christian College. Each of the six classes to be offered is worth one credit hour of regular college credit (\$80.00 per course) or two units of Continuing Education Credit (\$40.00 per course). Only one class may be taken each week. The single class plus its required readings and papers represent full-time college work for one week.

Registration for all students will be held by mail beginning immediately. Advance registration will close on April 16. If there is any space in the classes, late registration will be held on Monday of each week of classes in the Registrar's

Classes will meet from 12 noon to 4:00 p.m. each Monday (including Memorial Day) and 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon Tuesdays through Fridays. Residence hall housing will be available for \$20.00 per week per person. Students must provide their own linens and meals.

Course offerings include Daniel, Amos and Hosea, I Thessalonians, II Thessalo-nians, and Psychology of Counseling I and II.

Dr. Loren Gieger will teach the Thessalonians classes, Coy Roper will teach the classes dealing with prophetic literature, and the counseling courses will be taught by Dr. Len Knight.

Hobart Ashby Memorial Scholarships will again be provided for leaders in congregations of the Churches of Christ to attend this special Spring Term for Church Leaders. The scholarships will be awarded for one class at either regular or continuing education credit on a first comefirst served basis. #### Financial Aid — Facts and Fiction

Fiction. Recent federal and state budget cuts have practically wiped financial aid out of existence.

Fact. Although there have been some changes in eligibility requirements and funding levels, there is still a lot of aid available. In fact, a large majority of current MCC students are receiving aid, including various forms of grants, scholarships, loans, and work programs. The average aid package still covers nearly two-thirds of the cost for a full-time boarding student at MCC!

Fiction. Families must have a very low income level in order to qualify for financial aid.

Fact. Naturally, the lower the income, the more aid a student can receive. However, some current MCC students with a family income over \$38,000 are receiving some federal and state assistance to attend MCC.

Fiction. It is wiser to live at home and commute to the community college since this option only involves tuition costs.

Fact. The College Board News reports an average annual cost of \$3,400 at the community college. Many fail to take into consideration the cost of owning and operating a car on a daily basis, the usage of extra utilities at home, and those grocery bills! In addition, community colleges usually do not offer as much financial aid.

Fiction. It makes no difference when one applies for financial

Fact. Sure, some types of aid are available regardless of date of application, but many are not. Students should apply immediately to receive maximum consideration in aid programs for the 1984-85 academic year. Later applicants still receive aid, but their packages include a smaller proportion of grant aid.

## Keith Wellsted Receives National Attention as Michigan Homemaker of the Year

Keith Wellsted (Class of 1977) is a construction worker, outdoorsman, athlete, and Homemaker of the Year in

Keith left MCC to pursue opportunities in the roofing and construction industry, but difficult economic times soon dwindled the number of jobs available, forcing Keith's unemployment. At about the same time his opportunities in construction were decreasing, his wife's job opportunities in the computer hardware industry were increasing. Andra Randall Wellsted (Class of 1979) graduated from Central Michigan University in 1981.

So, six weeks after Seth's birth, Andra returned to work fulltime and Keith remained at home to care for their son. "Neither one of us really liked it at first. It wasn't planned, it was economics. It's no big deal now. Now we depend on my income and his is for extras — exactly the opposite of what people call 'normal'," said Andra. Keith works with his father in occasional construction jobs and is establishing a mail order business from their home.

Keith commented, "It's becoming more and more common. He'll (Seth) probably be more exposed to it (house-husbands). He won't see me as not being macho. I play basketball, tennis, I hunt... the only difference is I do more around the house than most men."

Keith's road to Homemaker of the Year in Michigan began when Andra nominated him for county-wide honors. He won in Genesee County (the Flint area) and then went on to state competition. "I believe that Keith exemplifies the new homemaker of the 1980's. He is proving that a homemaker doesn't have to be a woman. A

man can make a house a home if he has the courage to break out of the stereotype that society has molded for him . . . I am extremely proud of his accomplishments and feel that if he were to win this award it would be a great inspiration to other men and their families in this area who are also struggling with the problems of unemployment and economic strife," Andra wrote in her nomination.

Keith's award has received national attention. United Press International picked up the story and more than 180 major newspapers across the country have published it. Keith has been asked to appear on three television programs, including the Detroit ABC affiliate Channel 7's Good Afternoon, Detroit. An article in the May issue of Glamour magazine will also feature Keith.


