

Artist of the Year Paints bridge scene

"A photograph can more accurately show the beauty of God's handiwork, but a picture can depict the way the artist feels," said 1985 Artist of the Year Mrs. LaJuana Gill about her oil painting.

Her painting of the wooden bridge at the north end of campus was unveiled at the October 8 Parents' and Friends' Luncheon during the Fall Lectureship.

"This picture is a reflection of my love for MCC," Mrs. Gill

"I chose to paint a picture of the bridge because it symbolizes to me what Michigan Christian is all about. MCC is the bridge that spiritually prepares students to go on to bright futures in God's service."

The Artist of the Year program was begun in 1981 as a means of recognizing artists

who are alumni or friends of the college.

Each year, the artist is commissioned to paint an MCC campus oil scene, copies of which are reprinted and sent to Century Club donors as a thank you gesture. Century Club members are those individuals or families who during the preceeding year contribute \$100 or more to MCC.

The painting becomes the property of MCC for display in college facilities and for reproduction.

Mrs. Gill lives with her husband Randy and their son in Malibu, California.

Mr. Gill was MCC's music director before moving to California in 1984 to begin work on his doctorate in music. Mrs. Gill taught art and interior design as a part-time faculty member at MCC between 1982 and 1984.

New Chairman Elected

At the recent annual board meeting of Michigan Christian College, Royce Dickinson of Trenton, Michigan, was elected chairman to succeed Robert Utley, who has held the position for the last five years.

Mr. Dickinson, formerly vicechairman of the board, is secretary-treasurer of Power Process Piping, a Trenton specialty mechanical contractor. From 1972 to 1977, he served as vice president of finance at MCC. He is currently the minister at the Trenton Church of Christ.

The Dickinsons have long been supporters of MCC. Both Betty Dickinson and the three Dickinson children, Royce Jr., Edward and Kathryn, are alumni.

Mr. Dickinson holds a bachelor's in business from Benjamin Franklin University in Washington, D.C., and a mas-

ter's in religion from Alabama Christian College of Religion.

Mr. Utley, in stepping down as chairman, cited the burden of his work as president of Utley Brothers Inc., a specialty printing firm of Troy, Michigan, and as an elder at the Rochester Church of Christ. He credited Milton B. Fletcher, president of MCC since 1980, for the improved academic and financial growth of the college during the past five years.

In his resignation letter to the board, Utley said: "The one achievement of which I am most proud is the role I was able to play in bringing Dr. Fletcher here as our fifth president. His coming has marked a real turning point in the fortunes of the college."

About Mr. Utley, President Fletcher said: "James R. (Bob) Utley has served with distinction as chairman of the Board of

Trustees. His leadership will continue to have its impact for years to come.

"He is truly one of the great volunteers who has served and continues to serve Michigan Christian College."

Dr. Steven Eckstein added to MCC Bible Department

Jan Eckstein is married to Kevin Skidmore who is the campus minister at the University of Cincinnati. The Skidmores have two daughters.

Effective this fall, Michigan Christian College will begin offering an Associate in Science degree with a major in preengineeing.

Though the program will facilitate transfer to any engineering school, it is specifically designed to provide the first two years of Oklahoma Christian College's new programs in electrical, computer and mechanical engineering.

Of his children, Dr. Eckstein said they have all been very active in the Bible Chair at ENMU and have written many articles for The Voice, the Bible Chair's monthly publication. All have also studied Greek.

Bible with a heavy concentration of science, mathematics and engineering courses.

New courses being added to the MCC curriculum in conjunction with this program include Physics I, Physics II, FOR-TRAN for Engineers, engineering graphics and design, and engineering economics.

The College Board reports engineering as third in demand among college majors on a nationwide basis.

Projections by the Michigan **Employment Security Commis**sion for the Detroit area indicate job growth rates ranging from 17.8 percent to 64 percent by 1990, depending upon the various engineering fields being discussed (electrical, mechanical, etc.). A job growth rate of only 8.4 percent is estimated for other occupations.

A study by Michigan State University lists engineering

fields in five of the top six spots for estimated starting salaries in 1986.

Since its founding, MCC has pre-engineering served students.

Former MCC students are now serving in such positions as product development engineer for the Chrysler Corporation, mechanical engineer for Wright Patterson Air Force Base, distribution engineer for Southern Bell Telephone, industrial en-gineer for AC Spark Plug, and electrical engineer for General

The new coursework included in the pre-engineering major will make preparation at MCC even stronger.

Southerns' "retirement" means more work ahead

Dr. Paul and Mrs. Margaret Southern have packed more into one lifetime than most people could into ten.

And they aren't finished yet. True, they have now officially "retired" from MCC after trying to do so for the last five years, but their retirement has only freed them from one position of servanthood so that they might soon venture into another.

When Michigan Christian College persuaded these great friends to come out of retirement from Abilene Christian University where Dr. Southern had worked for 37 years, the last 17 as head of the Bible Department, MCC expected to reap the benefits of the Southerns' services for one

ONE YEAR soon turned into two and eventually into five and a half.

'We had retired from Abilene, and Margaret had retired from the public school, and we had done this Australia bit, and MCC sent Jesse Clayton (former MCC Director of Development) to see us," Dr. Southern explained.

"MCC was trying to get this BRE program and they didn't have anyone in Bible with a doctor's degree, so we told them we'd just give our time if they would bear our expenses.

"We were only going to come one year. We still have our home back there," Dr. Southern said.

The "Australia" bit Dr. Southern mentioned hints at just one of the many reasons why MCC has been so fortunate to have the Southerns on board.

A WEALTH of experiences preceded their years at MCC.

Besides Dr. Southern's years as a professor at Abilene Christian University, he has a lifetime of experience as a minister in the Church of

The Southerns met in 1926 and after Margaret's father, an elder and minister in the church, performed their wedding ceremony 31/2 years later, the Southerns lived in several places in Texas while Dr. Southern taught school, worked on his master's degree, and preached on the weekends.

Mrs. Southern especially remembers when Dr. Southern quit his teaching job and they moved to Weatherford so he could preach full time during the Depression years.

"THIS SOUNDS terrible," she said, "but we got \$25 a week and even rented our own home. I went two years and didn't buy a pair of shoes or a dress or anything. That was really rough. The only thing was that nobody else had anything either."

At the time, Mrs. Southern also had a bachelor's degree but was not allowed to teach because only one salary was allowed per family during the Depression.

She spent her time giving private speech lessons, supervising a Girl Scout troup, and caring for her son Paul, born in 1932, and daughter Sylvia Ann, born in 1936.

Mrs. Southern later began working on a master's degree in education and ran a private school for first graders, the children of professionals in the Abilene area.

Over the years, the Southerns' love of travel and of teaching others about Christ eventually led them to begin doing mission work and visiting mission schools worldwide.

IN SYDNEY, Australia, they taught for five terms at the Macquarie School of Preaching (now Macquarie School of Biblical Studies). They also worked in gospel meetings all over the

Other ventures led them to work in a school in Brazil and to the European Christian College in Vienna, Austria.

They also taught at Columbia Christian College in Portland,

Upon retirement from MCC in December, the Southerns headed back to their home in Texas, where Dr. Southern is scheduled for cataract surgery Jan. 20.

They then hope to be able to go to New Zealand to begin teaching in the South Pacific Bible College.

NOT ENOUGH can be said about the good the Southerns have done over the years.

"Dr. Southern has served as a counselor for years and has helped untold hundreds of families to work out their problems," President Fletcher said.

For 12 years, Dr. Southern was a member of the Board of the Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center in Abilene.

He also helped organize the first Abilene Counsel of Alcoholism and was both local and state president of the Texas Mental Health Association.

After World War II, Dr. Southern had a radio program called "Question, Please," where people would send in questions that he would answer on the air in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

And, before there were Christian homes for unwed mothers. the Southerns also helped pregnant girls through their pregnancies.

'We'd find them a place to stay, and I'd make them maternity clothes," Mrs. Southern said. "Then I had to go into the labor room with them like I was their mother.'

Over the years, the Southerns

have been the recipients of numerous awards for their service to others.

At the annual Lectureship at Abilene Christian University, Dr. and Mrs. Southern will be honored at the Feb. 16 luncheon.

There they will receive the Christian Service Award for their lifetime of service to the church, to Christian education, and to those in need.

In reflecting upon his years of friendship with the Southerns and of their service to MCC, President Fletcher commented:

"As Solomon said in Proverbs 27:17, 'As iron sharpens iron, so one man sharpens another.

"Paul and Margaret Southern, as solid, stalwart people, have the ability to mold and sharpen the lives of all of us who have worked with them.

"You can't associate with them on a day-to-day basis without being positively affected for good because of their strong influence.

"Christian people sharpen each other's lives by the power of their influence. The Southerns have sharpened all of us who have worked with them."

Salary Sharing Campaign a success

"The Annual Salary Sharing Campaign is well over the \$200,000 mark and it looks as if we can make the goal," President Milton B. Fletcher said. "We are so pleased with the great response. Many people help make this campaign successful."

This year's Salary Sharing/ Phone-A-Visit Campaign for Michigan Christian College has realized over \$208,000 in pledges. These were solicited via the direct mail program that began in early October and the Phone-A-Visit program that ran from the last week in October until Thanksgiving.

The money raised during the Salary Sharing Campaign goes into the general operating budget of the school. The funds are used to offset regular expenditures and help balance the budget.

The campaign is the largest single fund-raising effort the college is engaged in each year. Along with money raised from the Partnership Dinner and out of state Annual Fund Dinners, and money donated by the Associates and Men's Club, these funds help keep the school operating in the black.

Well over half of the money pledged comes through the Phone-A-Visit portion of the campaign. On each night of calling, students, faculty and friends of the college man 20

The callers ask donors and potential donors to pledge \$5 or \$10 a month or send a one-time gift of \$25 or more during 1986. They explain that the money is used to help keep tuition costs as low as possible and build a stronger Michigan Christian College. Approximately 90 percent of the Phone-A-Visit callers are students.

"I don't know how we could run this campaign without you," President Fletcher explained as he thanked the student volunteer callers. "You do such an outstanding job. We can't thank you enough.".

The largest single gift to the campaign came during the last night of the phoning. Utley Brothers Inc., the company owned by board member Robert Utley, donated \$7,500.

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Fall Festival Queen's votes fund breaks record

Donna White, of the Lincoln Park chapter, was crowned queen of Michigan Christian College's annual Fall Festival September 8.

Hundreds of area women helped raise funds during the summer months to apply toward the queen's votes. Friends of Mrs. White, Mrs. Linda But-terfield (Flint), Mrs. Judy Miller (Oregon, Ohio), and Mrs. Margaret Southern (Rochester) were responsible for generating \$21,984.48 for the college. This is the largest amount raised in the 23 years since the contest

The Fall Festival is sponsored each year by the Associates of MCC, a group of women who this year passed the \$2 million mark raised on behalf of MCC. Thousands of supporters across the country look forward to the festival each year.

"I'll tell you, I was surprised," Mrs. White said after being crowned. "I said beforehand that I was a winner even if I didn't win — you can't be a loser here."

FRIENDS of Mrs. White hosted dozens of events to raise the funds. "It's been one grand conspiracy, that's what it was,' she said.

There were garage sales, an estate sale, Queen's Way, Princess House and Tupperware sales, hamburger fries, a pancake supper, salad suppers and dinners galore.

A birthday party for one of the women where people were charged admission was even

ONE FRIEND, Mrs. Marcia Drumhiller of Grosse Ile, gave French lessons and donated the proceeds. Others sold hundreds of craft items at an art and crafts fair at the Southgate Shopping Center. Another friend sold a litter of puppies to raise funds.

When the ceremony ended, Mrs. White was anxious to get back to work at the Lincoln Park chapter's booth. This year the women were selling pastel parasols that could be personalized with the buyer's name and choice of artwork.

Mrs. White's husband Ronald is the minister of the Lincoln Park Church of Christ. The Whites have three children: Kent, 26, and Gerald, 22, both MCC alumni, and a daughter Jeanne, 16. ·

All of the Associates' chapters had successful booths this year.

AS USUAL, the food booths offered something for everyone. Salads, Mexican nachos, chili dogs, cotton candy, pies and other desserts were among the treats offered. Business teams win 2nd, 4th

Each year, Michigan Christian College's top business students compete in the Harding Business Simulation National Competition.

This year, MCC sent two teams to the November 23 presentation held on the campus of Harding University in Searcy, Arkansas, with financial and technical sponsorship by the Louver Manufacturing Company (LOMANCO) of Jacksonville, Arkansas.

MCC has established herself as a leader of intercollegiate business gaming by being the only Christian college to always have a team finish in first or second place in the Harding-Lomanco Invitational.

By entering two teams in this year's competition, MCC became the first institution to do so in the history of that competition.

"We had such an outstanding group of talented students this year that we asked Professor David Johnson, coordinator of the games, for permission to enter two competing teams," Mr. David R. Briggs, MCC head sponsor, said.

All the students were enrolled in MCC's Business Simulation class and met together for three weeks to hear lectures on business terminology, strategic theory and presentation techniques.

Then students met for six more weeks during which each one-week period equaled one quarter of a business' operation.

Weekly decisions were made involving price, advertising, inventory, and salaries, for example. Financial statements and a cash flow analysis were also determined for each quarter.

After a year and a half (six weeks of class time) of company operation, the team then prepared itself for the extensive November 23 presentation.

Mr. Don Tate, MCC's accounts receivable clerk, sponsored the team known as "Free-Air Inc." He advised students while they prepared for both the decision-making and presentation phases of the competition.

Mr. Tate was a member of the first MCC Business Team, which took first place at the Inaugural Harding Invitational in 1983. He guided his team this year to a fourth place in the competition.

Faculty News

Mr. Charles Babb, assistant professor of computer science and mathematics, completed a second master's August 15, 1985. He received a Master's of Science in Computing Science Education from the University of Evansville, Indiana.

Mr. Babb also participated in the Sixth Annual Small College Institute in Data Processing during a week-long workshop at the U. of E. He was one of a panel of six who discussed the retraining of people in computer science.

Mr. David R. Briggs, registrar and business instructor, has written a paper titled "Sensitivity Analysis in Multiple Attribute Utility Theory" which was published in Applied Decision System Models, a book released in October by Academic Decision Systems Company of Ypsilanti.

Oakland University faculty members recently recommended the dissertation of Dr. Fawn Knight, an MCC English instructor, for consideration as one of the ten best dissertations in Reading and Language submitted during 1985 in the United States. Dr. Knight completed her Ph.D. at Oakland University in October.

Mr. Coy Roper, associate professor of Bible and Greek, has written 13 expository sermons on the epistles of James and Jude. The sermons were published in the July issue of Preacher's Periodical.

In October, Mr. Roper presented a three-session class on the home at the Great Lakes Christian College Lectureship. He also lectured at the October World Missions Workshop held at Freed-Hardeman College in Henderson, Tennessee.

Financial Aid - facts, fiction

FICTION. Federal and state budget cuts have practically wiped financial aid out of existence.

FACT. Although there have been some changes in eligibility requirements, there is still available aid. In fact, the Pell Grant recently increased from \$1,800 to \$2,100 and the State Tuition Grant from \$1,300 to \$2,100 per year.

A large majority of MCC students are receiving aid, including various forms of grants, scholarships, loans and work programs.

The average aid package still covers over two-thirds of the cost for a full-time boarding student at MCC.

FICTION. Families must have a very low income in order to qualify for aid.

FACT. Naturally the lower the income, the more aid a student can receive. Yet some current MCC students with a family income over \$44,000 are receiving some federal and state assistance to attend MCC.

FICTION. It is wiser to live at home and commute to the community college since this option only involves tuition costs.

FACT. The College Board reports an average annual cost of \$3,627 at the community college.

Many fail to consider the cost of owning and operating a car on a daily basis, the usage of extra utilities at home, and grocery bills.

In addition, community colleges usually do not offer as much financial aid or the benefits of a Christian college environment.

Warriors aim for Nationals

The 1985-86 Warriors are off to one of the finest starts in the school's history. As the first semester ended, the team, coached by Garth Pleasant, was

The season has been highlighted by victories over Macomb Community College, Alpena Community College, Ohio Valley, and the junior varsity team from Adrian.

In past years, a balanced scoring attack has characterized Coach Pleasant's teams. This year is no exception, with four players currently averaging double figures a game.

The Warriors are led in scoring by freshman Steve Boyd. Boyd, a 6-foot-3 swingman from Ann Arbor, is averaging 19.1 points per game as well as pulling down 7 rebounds a game.

Steve McClurg, a 6-foot-2 Madison freshman from Heights, averages 16 points per game. Errol Anglin and Dave Lyerla are averaging 14.8 and 11 points per game respective-

ly.
The 6-foot-6 Anglin, who is from Jamaica, is the team's leading rebounder. Lyerla, a 6-foot-4 sophomore from Lapeer, was selected as one of the tri-captains.

Anthony Strickland rounds out the starting lineup as the team's point guard. Strickland, a 6-foot-3 sophomore, is a transfer from Concordia College in Ann Arbor.

Strickland also was selected as a tri-captain along with Lyerla and 6-foot-5 freshman Dennis Spier. Spier, from Suriname, South America, is a tremendous rebounder and is described by Coach Pleasant as "the ultimate team player."

The Warriors have also benefited from the play of sophomore Todd Grizzell from Pleasant Ridge; Steve Riche, a 6-foot-5 forward from Huntsville, Alabama; and freshman Ken Hollie from Detroit.

The squad is rounded out by sophomores Matt Bugg from Troy and Rob Oldham from Cleveland, Ohio; along with freshmen Dean Winski, Troy; Dan Haught, Abilene, Texas; Dan Hryckowian, Holly; and Brad Hoover, from Anderson, Indiana.

Although the Warriors are currently 9-1, Coach Pleasant does not believe the team members have played to their capabilities.

I feel this group is extremely talented, but because of their youth we have been very inconsistent," Pleasant said.

"We do not have any starters returning from last year's squad, and I do not believe I have found the right chemistry as of yet. We seem to be improving every day and that is a vital characteristic to our team's success.

Baseball season ends

After only two weeks of practice, the Michigan Christian College baseball team opened its fall season with two disappointing, at-home losses to Concordia Lutheran College in Ann Arbor.

The team's first victory came when a tenth-inning single by sophomore Ken Jamison (Royal Oak) drove in freshman Dave Kirkpatrick (Swartz Creek) to break a 6-6 tie with St. Mary's College September 10. MCC lost the second game with St. Mary's 5-3.

Then after losing the first game in the September 17 double-header against Great Lakes Bible College, the Warriors defeated GLBC 11-1 in a game which featured 11 strikeouts by sophomore Ron Duguay (Howell). This put the team's record at 2 and 4.

After splitting the September 19 double-header with St. Mary's, the Warriors traveled to Parkersburg, West Virginia, September 21. There they dropped the first of two to Ohio Valley but bounced back with 14 hits and a win in the second game.

The team's final four games were played in Lansing against Kentucky Christian and GLBC September 27 and 28.

The Warriors lost the first of the four to Kentucky 6-3. In the second game, however, MCC slaughtered GLBC with 18 runs and 18 hits.

The team's chance for a .500 season ended with another loss to Kentucky Christian 5-2. Then in the final game of the season, the Warriors lost to GLBC despite the fact that 9 walks were issued to MCC.

The team's pitching was led by Duguay with 59 strikeouts and an ERA of 1.85.

Hitting was led by sophomore Dan Dill (Rochester) with a .529 batting average. Close behind him were freshmen Joey Tilton (Interlochen) with .350 and Alan Tyrrell (Madison Heights) with .314 and sophomore Dan Boren with

Runners organized

This fall, for the first time since 1981, Michigan Christian College students had the opportunity to be on a cross country

Under the direction of admissions counselor Mr. Michael Light, the 12-member team participated in a combination of road races and intercollegiate invitational meets.

The push to have a team was spearheaded last spring by Tom Twigg (Michigan City, Indiana), an MCC sophomore. Several students were jogging regularly on campus but had no

real direction.
Since Mr. Light is an avid racer who not only runs the six miles to and from work each day but also participates in several marathons yearly, the students asked him to help.

"I told them that if they wanted to do it, I'd be more than willing to coach," Mr. Light said. He urged those interested to take part in a running club last spring in order to get in shape and to develop an interest among other potential runners.

The results were surprising.

ONE OF the women, Bonnie Clayton (Cincinnati, Ohio), had never run before joining the team but ended up winning medals or trophies in four events. She was the only team member to place in both the September 7 5K road race at Madonna College and the September 15 5-mile Apple Amble, a road race in which runners could compete individually and as a team. Bonnie placed third in each race.

The runners next went against Oakland University at home September 17.

Then on September 28, in a 5K road race in Kensington Park in Milford, Bonnie placed first in her division while Suzanne Scott (Auburn Hills) placed third and Sonja Barcus (Lima, Ohio) fourth.

THE TEAM traveled to Angola, Indiana, October 5 for the Tri-State Classic, an invitational against 21 college men's teams and 13 women's teams.

Following this event was the October 19 Siena Heights Invitational in Adrian where runners competed against 16 men's teams and 14 women's.

The season ended with the October 26 Run for Reye's Syndrome road race in Novi, a race that also brought the most victories to the MCC team. In their respective divisions, David Buskirk (Warren) took first; Bonnie, first; Suzanne, second; Cheryl Ingersoll (Traverse City), third; and Keith Martin (Grabill, Indiana), third.

Mr. Light said he enjoyed his first season as coach and that he was sure the students felt a great sense of accomplishment in their running and in their improvement.

"WE HAD some good individual effort on the part of our runners, and many of them improved greatly over the season," Coach Light said. "I think it not only helped them. but it helped the school because everybody was excited about the accomplishments the runners made.

"I was glad to be a part of that excitement and feeling that I could help each individual runner to develop himself."
