



## Phone-A-Visit success vital

The annual Salary Sharing Campaign is the largest operational funds campaign conducted by Michigan Christian College.

The 1987 campaign began with a Direct Mail thrust in September.

As usual, the Direct Mail segment is followed by the Phone-A-Visit segment with an attempt to reach those who did not respond by mail.

"The \$230,000 goal for this campaign is vital to the operating success of Michigan Christian College," President Milton B. Fletcher said. "We deeply appreciate the continued response of the great people who support Michigan Christian College.

"With enrollment slightly down during the 1986-87 year, the success of the campaign is even more vital."

When the campaign concludes, the Direct Mail segment and the Phone-A-Visit segment each produce about the same number of dollars.

Mr. Kent Hoggatt, Director of Church Relations, coordinates the campaign. During the Phone-A-Visit ac-

During the Phone-A-Visit activity, 22 telephones are installed in the Gold Conference

Room of the Campus Center. During the 14 nights of calling, MCC students are especially responsive in accepting phone call responsibilities.

Likewise, they are especially successful in talking to people after having been properly trained. The students enjoy the atmosphere that is generated in the Gold Conference Room as calls are being made.

Commitments through Nov. 20, 1986, are \$161,453, which is slightly behind last year.

#### Church Leadership Diploma Offered

Beginning in August 1987, Michigan Christian College will offer a new program designed to encourage and prepare individual Christians for greater roles in service to their congregations.

Those entering the program may take classes on a one-persemester basis or take them in groups of three, with the intent of completing the entire Church Leadership Diploma in one year.

The classes for the program are designed to reflect the practical needs of a local congregation. Included are areas of teaching, counseling, effective Bible study, local church management, public speaking, church growth and doctrinal issues involved with various denominational groups, church evidences and Christian ethics.

All courses will be taught by regular MCC faculty and are planned on the basis of continuing education credits.

The cost of the entire program if one begins and completes it during the 1987

## Parents, artist honored at Lectureship

In order to show appreciation to those parents who have sacrificed to send their children to Michigan Christian College, a special luncheon is held each year during the Fall Lectureship.

This year, two families were honored at the Oct. 8 Parents' and Friends' Luncheon. The Artist of the Year was also honored at this time.

Before the introductions and presentation of plaques, Mr. Buck Dozier, Family Life Minister at the Madison, Tenn., Church of Christ, spoke on the subject of "Your Family—Fun or Frenzy?"

He said that in America, families have a lot of fun and frenzy but that the love and discipline that lead to security are often missing.

"There are no perfect children or parents," he said and reminded the audience that parents do not have to like what their children do, but must love them. He ended with the thought that discipline is a Biblical principle parents must exercise in order to bring up

children as the Lord would have them do.

Two couples were then introduced as the 1986 Parents of the Year: Mr. and Mrs. William Fields and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Briggs.

The Fields, from Bedford, Ind., are the parents of six children. Four attended MCC: David, Brenda, Michael and Philip. Their granddaughter, Davena Fields, is an MCC freshman and is the daughter of David and his wife Linda. All six children and 18 grand-children live in Bedford near the Fields.

The Fields are members of the Central Church of Christ in Bedford. Mr. Fields has been a plumber since 1944 and has been preaching since 1956. Since then, he has served as full-time minister for five congregations, helping establish two of those churches.

After receiving the plaque, Mr. Fields said: "All our children expressed that the greatest thing that has happened to them was that they came to MCC."

In the audience was Mr. Winston Schloot, minister of the Redford Church of Christ and a 1986 graduate from MCC's Bachelor of Religious Education Program.

He mentioned that he was originally from Bedford and said: "I'd like to say that in that community, they represent Christianity to the fullest.
"Billy Fields likes to talk

"Billy Fields likes to talk about Christ wherever, on the job or in the pulpit. He is one of the reasons I'm preaching today."

The second couple honored has also sent four children to MCC. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Briggs of Akron, Mich., are the parents of alumni Wayne, Diane, Mark and David.

Today, Mark is MCC's business service manager; David serves as MCC's registrar.

Mr. Briggs has worked for 45 years as a funeral director in Akron. He and his wife are members of the Akron Church of Christ.

After being honored, Mr. Briggs said: "We're just glad MCC was here to take care of

our kids when we sent them down here."

It was coincidental that the 1986 Artist of the Year introduced at the luncheon was Mr. David Fields, whose parents had been honored earlier.

Mr. Fields attended MCC from 1963-65 before going on to Harding University. He works as a rural mail carrier in Bedford, Ind., and is a faithful member of the Central Church of Christ.

His painting is of the red barn to the east of the house in which MCC President and Mrs. Milton B. Fletcher live.

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## Message from the President



Dear Friends:

Probably all of us become so accustomed to daily blessings that we forget how convenient they are to everyday life. We just take things for granted. This has happened to us regarding telephone service. Up until the last three or four years, it has been good, but since that time, our system has caused immeasurable problems.

The old AT&T dial equipment with four trunk lines and 20 extensions, operating under the 651-5800 number, was installed in 1961/1962. That was before the time that you could purchase your own equipment. Everything was leased or rented from AT&T. As Michigan Christian College grew, we experienced a need for additional extensions. We could not expand the 20 extension capacity of the old system and had to install separate single line residence telephones in various offices on the campus. Eventually, we had about as many private lines on campus as we had extensions under the 651-5800 number! To say the least, the total operation has become inadequate and inefficient. Additionally, the main system had been used for so long that it completely wore out. In the last three or four years, the old dial sets caused an untold amount of trouble, and the central system was constantly requiring expensive service calls. Many of you have experienced frustrations while trying to get in contact with Michigan Christian College by phone.

For several years, we have planned to purchase a new upto-date, state of the art, campus communication system. However, because of budget restraints, we were unable to follow through. During 1986, the Associates of Michigan Christian College and the Men's Club approved the funding of a new telephone system as one of their projects. Their action has allowed us to purchase a new AT&T electronic, push-button system that supports 36 extensions. The system allows much greater flexibility and can be expanded as the needs arise. In addition, an out-of-state, incoming WATS line that presently serves nine states and was formerly used only by the Bookstore is being re-routed to serve both Admissions and the Bookstore. Also, an incoming WATS line covering the state of Michigan is being installed to serve customers of the Bookstore and prospective students dealing with the Admissions Office. We believe that Michigan Christian College will benefit tremendously from these additions.

A good telephone system is so very important to efficient operations and to good public relations. Certainly, many of you have wondered on occasion why we didn't answer the phones. Because of worn-out equipment, we were not receiving the calls, even though the caller could hear the ring on his or her end of the line. This condition has also been extremely disturbing to us, and we apologize for what must have been interpreted at times as unconcern on our part. Please know that your calls were not being ignored

Hats off again to the Associates and the Men's Club for bringing us up-to-date with a new electronic, push-button system, operating with eight trunk lines instead of four under the old system, and with 36 extensions, as opposed to 20 previously. The electronic system handles the calls much faster and with greater clarity. We are thankful for this step

# May 24 set for start of new academic, social program — Registration going on now

Next spring, for the first time, Michigan Christian College will be participating in a world-wide program of educational and recreational activities for people sixty years of age and older.

The program offered at MCC will include three courses taught by faculty members plus a variety of social activities each evening from May 24-30.

The program, titled ELDER-HOSTEL, was launched in 1975 and has its origins in the youth hostels of Europe and the folk schools of Scandinavia. In 1986, nearly 100,000 hostelers enrolled in programs throughout the United States, Canada, and more than 20 countries overseas.

During the week-long event, participants will be housed in MCC's Alma Gatewood dormitory, will be served three meals in the cafeteria each day, and will attend three classes — two each morning and one each afternoon.

Social activities tentatively scheduled include a trip to Meadow Brook Hall, a 100-room English Tudor mansion on the campus of nearby Oakland University. An evening of musical entertainment on the campus is planned, and an evening at the Detroit Symphony is being considered. Attendance is not mandatory at any of the evening events.

The three courses to be offered are as follows:

Follow Me Through the Near East will be taught by Dr. Stephen Eckstein of MCC's Bible Department. The course involves a tour of Egypt, Jordan and Palestine via geographic history, archaeology, religion, picture and press. "Tourists" will be encouraged to interact during the imaginary trip.

Holy Harmony will be taught by Mr. Joe Bentley of the Music Department. This is a hands-on class in the appreciation of church hymns, including a study of background material and group participation in the performance of examples from hymn literature.

Classics to Read Aloud will be taught by Dr. Fawn Knight of the English Department. Children's literature is a delightful field for people of all ages. Dr. Knight will focus on some of the old favorites as well as the best of what is new in the eighties.

ELDERHOSTEL is a program specifically created for older adults. It is open to people

60 years old or older, together with their spouses. Single individuals may attend alone or may be accompanied by a companion who is 50 years old or older.

The courses are not taken for college credit and there are no exams, grades or required homework. No particular knowledge or study is presupposed. Participants are welcome whether they have completed formal education with grammar school, high school or college.

The program will begin Sunday evening, May 24, and will end Saturday morning, May 30. The cost is \$205 per person.

The registration form plus a \$30 deposit is all that is re-

quired at this time. These should be sent directly to the address given under the Payment portion of Registration Form #2. A social security number must be written on the check or money order.

Mail registration enrollment assignments begin Dec. 4, 1986. Telephone registration begins Jan. 6, 1987. To register by phone, call: 617-426-8056 between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. The registration form should be filled out as a worksheet before a phone registration is made.

Her past experience includes work at Detroit College of Law Library, Bendix Engineering Development Center Library and the University of Detroit Dental Library.




Miss Sharon Giudice Computer Service Technician

## Missionary from France joins Math Department

Sixteen years ago, Dr. Leo Hindsley, MCC history professor, had no idea that the hiring of Miss Kelly Fletcher (no relation to President Milton B. Fletcher) as a new math instructor this fall would, in a round-about way, be to his credit.

Back in 1980, Miss Fletcher was a high school freshman who knew nothing about the Church of Christ or about Michigan Christian College.

She had an uncle, though, who worked with a young draftsman named Jerry Tallman (now minister of the Rochester Church of Christ). At the time, Mr. Tallman was studying evangelism under Dr. Hindsley and approached Miss Fletcher's uncle one day at work and mentioned the Bible filmstrips he had been viewing. Later Mr. Tallman showed Miss Fletcher's uncle and his wife the filmstrips and, as a result, they were baptized. About a year later, young Kelly also became a Christian.

# Associates give mirror to Home Ec Department

At the November meeting of the Associates of Michigan Christian College, Mrs. Joyce Felzien, home economics instructor, was presented a check to purchase a full-length mirror for the department. The clothing construction class will benefit from this purchase.

The money was raised from points accumulated in the Bill Knapp's community points

program.

The Associates' plan for future points includes curtains for the Homemaking House and other equipment needed for the foods and meal management classes.

Since the spring of 1985, the Associates have encouraged those who eat at a Bill Knapp's restaurant anywhere in the United States to ask for a Community Support Program receipt each time they dine.

For each dollar a person spends, he is credited with one point. Those points soon add up, and the Associates are able to purchase necessary items without spending funds from their budget.

TODAY, after serving as a missionary in Switzerland and France for eight years, Miss Fletcher, 31, is teaching math, algebra, and calculus at MCC.

She went overseas to work as a missionary after graduating from Michigan State University with a degree in mathematics in March 1978.

WHILE AT MSU, she had become involved in the campus ministry at the University Church of Christ and realized that when she graduated, she wanted to work in a mission field.

Mr. Bob Grigg, the campus minister, was a child when his parents worked in France as missionaries along with Dr. Hindsley and his wife Darlene.

Mr. Ğrigg's wife Patti was also a child when her parents, Stanley and Marie Shipp, were missionaries in Switzerland.

When the Griggs decided to leave MSU and follow in their parents' footsteps, Miss Fletcher and another couple, Buddy and Maurine Jones from Arkansas, decided to join them.

The five first went to Switzerland because there they could learn French and could get to know the church before settling down in a city in France where there was no congregation.

AFTER TWO years, they moved to Nantes and have been there ever since.

"I feel like France is my home, but after being gone eight years, I felt like I needed to spend time with my family and take a rest from the pace of things and the responsibilities over there.

"Now, the pace here seems even faster at times. Sometimes, I sure would like to go back to France for a two-hour lunch."

While overseas, Miss Fletcher said she had to become "a jack-of-all-trades."

HER WORK over the years has included renovating an old building to be used for a place of worship — from putting up new walls to painting and wall-papering.

She has also worked extensively as a teacher of women's and children's Bible classes and in the printing and publishing of invitations, booklets, and other materials used in the church's outreach programs.

Miss Fletcher helps plan and organize a Christian camp held each summer. There are eight French-speaking churches in France, five in Belgium, and two in Switzerland. The camp is organized by the Nantes team, but the work is shared by all the congregations.

Miss Fletcher has found that being in a small church (today, membership is about 50) has made her a stronger Christian.

"In a situation where there is only one church in each city, and they are so far apart from one another, the people really draw closer to one another," she said.

"When there are problems, you learn to work them out because you have to come to some type of agreement.

type of agreement.
"That has given me a lot of spiritual growth in relationships because you have to learn to get along with each other."

THE FIRST semester at MCC has been a good one for Miss Fletcher thus far, but she does look forward to returning "home" next August.

She has enjoyed teaching on the college level, and the students have responded favorably to her methods of teaching.

"She's not like math teachers I've had in the past," sophomore Rob Wright (Decker, Mich.) said of Miss Fletcher as his pre-calculus instructor. "When she explains something, I really can understand it."

When her year in Michigan ends in August, Miss Fletcher will return to France in time for the 1987 Metz lectureship/retreat for all the European churches and will go back to her work of teaching and of organizing seminars, retreats, and camps.

#### 300 enroll for fall semester

Students began arriving on campus Aug. 23 for the 28th academic year at Michigan Christian College. By the close of late registration, a total of 300 students had registered for classes.

Fall enrollment included 15 second-generation students, those with either one or both parents who attended MCC.

Every year since 1977, when the first-second generation student enrolled, additional sons and daughters of former MCC students have enrolled, bringing the total number to 46. To date, seven second-generation students have already applied to attend MCC next fall.

A larger number of part-time adult students also enrolled this fall. This is a result of several new evening and weekend classes that were arranged to meet the scheduling needs of adults. Further adult education programs and courses are currently being planned.

Although the largest percentage of students continued to come from the state of Michigan, representatives of several other states and countries also joined the student body.

Students enrolled from Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, North Carolina, Ohio, Texas, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Greece, Jamaica and Suriname.

Although this year's enrollment reflected the national trend of decreasing enrollments, the current application rate for next fall has surpassed recent years.

In order to maintain that rate and to allow MCC to serve a greater number of students, friends of MCC are encouraged to talk to high school students about the college and to send the names of those students to the Admissions Office.

### Organic chemistry class receives new equipment

The organic chemistry class now has the use of a Varian EM-300X nuclear magnetic resonance (nmr) spectrometer.

resonance (nmr) spectrometer.

Nuclear magnetic resonance
is a technique widely used by
chemists to analyze and study
the structure of organic compounds.

Chemistry instructor David Cole was able to acquire the instrument from the UpJohn Company in Kalamazoo while he was pursuing graduate studies at Western Michigan University.

MCC is extremely fortunate to have obtained this instrument gratis since a new one would cost \$15,000 to \$20,000.

"This spectrometer is a workhorse of organic chemistry, but the high cost prevents even many four-year colleges from owning one," Mr. Cole said. This model is particularly suited for instructional and student use.

Dr. Mike Smith, a member of the Rochester Church of Christ and a nmr researcher at Henry Ford Hospital, recently spent about eight hours setting up and tuning the instrument.

MCC is deeply indebted to Dr. Smith for donating his expertise in order to get the new instrument in working order since scientific instrument technicians start at \$150 an hour.



## Associates, Men's Club chapters sponsor fun-filled activities

The hall, today a residential conference and cultural center for the community, sits on 1,400 acres once owned by Matilda and Alfred Wilson and donated to Oakland University after their death.

The first 320 acres of the property were purchased by Matilda and her first husband, John Dodge of Dodge Brothers car fame. The home, built between 1926 and 1929, has 100 rooms, 24 fireplaces, and an art collection of priceless museum quality.

Tour guides were standing at various locations to answer questions and point out unusual characteristics of the house and its furnishings.

During the touring, MCC piano instructor Bernard Leshley played the three manual, 66 rank Aeolian pipe organ, the largest resident organ in Michigan.

A devotional in the ballroom was the highlight of the evening. Several MCC students led hymns, and sophomore Jeff Westerby (Troy) spoke about the subject of temptation.

## **Business Team competes**

The 1986 Michigan Christian College Intercollegiate Busi-Team competed again this year in the Harding University Invitational Business Games.

The competition, held each fall semester, climaxed with formal presentations on the Harding campus in Searcy, Ark., Nov. 22.

This year's competition was larger than ever, with seven teams competing.

Mr. Jim Shelton, new to MCC's Business Department this fall, coached the team.

Returning members from last year's team are Tracy Osredkar (Vanderbilt) and Karlton Turner (Houston, Texas).

New members are Billy Blake (Littleton, Colo.), Analisa Mauersberg (Columbus, Ohio), James Ballard (Vallajo, Calif.), and Jim Craig (Morenci).

Harding University first became involved in intercollegiate business competition in 1985 when invited to participate in the prestigious Michigan State University Games.

Harding went on to win the Michigan State games an unprecedented four times. The school has also won the Emory University Games in Atlanta as well as the University of Nevada at Reno competition.

natural outgrowth of Harding's success was the development of the Harding University Management Simulation. This computer simulation model was written by David Burks, then Dean of the School

of Business and now Presidentelect of the university.

A special version of this simulation is used by the junior college competitors in the Harding games. The emphasis is on management, marketing, and production decisions.

The decisions made by each team are entered in a computer where they interact with each other to produce industry results

Each team makes decisions for six simulated quarters. The decision-making part of the competition lasts six weeks. At the end of the six weeks, the schools go to Harding and the teams make formal defenses before the competition's

The presentations are similar to those made by corporate officers to stockholders at annual meetings.

In this year's competition, Ohio Valley Christian College came in first overall. The results of MCC's overall performance were mixed.

"We had hoped to win it this year, and although we didn't there are some things we did that we can be proud of," Mr. Shelton said.

"The competition was tighter this year. Of over \$86 million in total industry profits, less than \$6 million separated the first five teams in net income," he

In the game, MCC sold two products: a turbine ventilator and a household attic fan. The team captured 42% of the attic fan market and did so while having the highest-priced

This was due to two factors. MCC's research and development expenditures were greater than any other team's, and the salesmen were paid premium commissions.

The resulting figures showed that MCC had more sales than any other team — \$58 million compared with Ohio Valley's \$51 million.

MCC had more assets and more owner equity than any other team and was also one of the industry leaders in advertising.

"We had greater operating and selling expenses, however, which moved us to fourth overall in net income," Mr. Shelton said. "And being fourth in net income is what really hurt us in the quantitative part of the competition.'

Separate from the business games but part of this year's event was the first Biz Quiz, which will now be held annually for the business games participants.

The Belden Center for Private Enterprise sponsored the quiz, which was a test consisting of 50 multiple choice questions on economics and the free enterprise system. Most of the business games participants took the quiz.

MCC had four participants finish in the top ten, more than any other school.

Analisa Mauersberg placed 4th; Karlton Turner, 5th; Billy Blake, 7th; and Jim Craig, 10th. For those finishes, they won T-shirts and other prizes.

With the team's help and the coach's assistance, I made it through the year and am looking forward to a better season next year."

Because cross country is a highly individualized sport, it is up to each person to push himself in practice. Many times it is all too easy to slack off in practice. Fortunately, this was not the case with this year's team.

Desmond Peterson (Detroit) is the best example of the success of the team. Desmond took close to five minutes off his time from the beginning of the season to earn the honor of most improved runner.

The season included three 5 kilometer (3.1 miles) road races. All three were run in Michigan with the first one in Lansing, the second in Albion, and the third in Kensington.

Both Joe Meredith (Detroit) and Matt Neild (Ceresco) received trophies for winning their respective age divisions at Albion. Joe Meredith also went on to win a medal for his performance at Kensington, along with Desmond Peterson and David Buskirk.

Besides the road races, the season included three dual meets and two invitationals.

MCC began the season by traveling to Alpena on Sept. 12 for a disappointing 37-18 loss.

On Sept. 16, the team traveled to Defiance, Ohio, where Meredith and Neild led the team with a third and fifth place and times of 29:27 and 31:28 respectively. Defiance won 41-20.

The Macomb Community College Invitational was held Oct. 3. MCC took eight people to run in the rain and mud. Although the team did not do well overall, several runners set personal records.

At the Siena Heights Invitational Oct. 11, MCC competed against Adrian College, Aquinas College, Siena Heights College, Tri-State University and the University of Detroit, which won the meet.

The course was challenging with one especially memorable hill. Despite the difficulty of the course, five MCC runners set personal records.

The final meet of the season was against Alpena on the MCC campus. The improvement of the team over the season was reflected in the score. Although Alpena took a second victory, MCC came within a point, 29 to 28.

Meredith led the team in performance and earned a NLCAA All American nomination. He expressed the views of several of the team when he said, "It was a short season. I wish there were more races because most of the guys are finally starting to peak."

Backing up Meredith were Beaudoin, Buskirk, Cooper, James Isenberg (Melvindale), Darren Jackson (Detroit), Neild, Peterson, Christopher VanNeste (Capac), and Doug Wiley (Richland). Tom Twigg (Michigan City, Ind.) served as manager.

Tina Gosmann (Rosemond, Ill.), Carolyn Mottor (Mt. Clemens), and Tracy Osredkar (Vanderbilt) represented the women's team in two dual meets and a 5 kilometer race.

Although their dedication and efforts did not reflect in the standings, they set several personal records.

## MCC accepted for AICUM membership

Effective January 1, Michigan Christian College will become a member of the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities of Michigan.

MCC was a charter member of the organization which began in the early sixties.

AICUM membership is made up of 42 private and independent colleges and universities in the state of Michigan.

The presidents of each of the colleges make up the board of directors of the organization. There are 36 regular members and six affiliated members or branch campuses.

The AICUM board of directors employs a small staff in Lansing, directed by Mr. Edward Blews, Jr., president of AICUM.

AICUM is an organization working on behalf of all private higher educational institutions in the state.

Its efforts assist the association members in the areas of purchasing, insurance, and contacts with the Michigan Department of Education and the Michigan State Board of Education.

One of the outstanding accomplishments of AICUM was the leadership role it took in influencing the state legislature regarding the establishment of the very valuable student aid program known as the Michigan Tuition Grant.

Without this particular benefit, thousands of students in Michigan would not be able to attend colleges and universities in the private sector.

## Coach Light qualifies for Boston Marathon

Mr. Michael Light, MCC's cross country coach, fulfilled a long-standing goal by completing the Oct. 19 Free Press Marathon in 2:59:20.

His time, which had to be under 3 hours, makes him a qualifier for the Boston Marathon, in which he will run next spring.

Coach Light competed in the 39-and-under bracket and came in #230 out of 2,733 runners. Since this was the last year he had a chance to compete in this bracket, he was ecstatic about his time.

"It's something I've worked for for 3½ years," he said. "It was hard, but I finally did it."

The 26.2 mile race started in Windsor, Canada, and took the runners through the tunnel to Detroit, down Woodward and Michigan Avenue, and to the finish line on Belle Isle.

Coach Light already has an idea of what he faces in Boston since he has run the Maryland course once before. In 1984, he went with a competing running partner and ran as a "bandit," one who had not officially qualified.

### Season ends with 5-5 Record

With only three returning players - Dan Dill (Rochester Hills), Joey Tilton (Interlochen), and Karlton Turner (Montgomery, Texas) — Coach Bill Shinsky knew he had to do some team rebuilding before the 1986 baseball season.

During the off-season, Coach Shinsky was able to find four excellent ball players who qualified for baseball scholarships — Brian Cain (Amherst, Ohio); Shane Cox (Winter Springs, Fla.); Steve McClurg (Madison Heights); and Ron Siegel (Wyandotte).

With these and six other good ballplayers, the Warrior's season opened against Orchard Lake St. Mary's Sept. 12.

Sophomore McClurg pitched a strong first game, striking out 11 batters. The Warriors won 6-1. MCC lost a player, though, when Tilton sprained his shoulder in his first at bat. The injury hindered his playing for the rest of the season.

In the second game of the double-header, freshman Cain held St. Mary's to one run with 14 strikeouts as the Warriors came out on top with five runs.

The Warriors met Great Lakes Bible College in the second double-header of the year on Sept. 16.

McClurg got the 8-0 victory in the first game with a shutout and 13 strikeouts. Tony Hill (Houston, Texas) and Cox each had two RBI's in the game.

In the second game, Cain pitched a 9-1 victory with seven strikeouts.

The Warriors met up again with St. Mary's on Sept. 18 in a double-header.

Turner was the pitcher of record for the Warriors and, despite a lack of pitching experience, made a great effort. In the last inning, the Warriors made a valiant effort when, the team down by four runs, Tilton pinch-hit for a bunt single. McClurg then got a hit, which led to another run.

One run was not enough, though, and the team took its first loss, 3-6. The Warriors also lost the second game, 5-11.

The team went to Ann Arbor Sept. 20 to face Concordia Lutheran. Cain pitched an excellent first game, but with seven fielding errors, the rest of the team was unable to give him the backing he needed to win. The Warriors lost in extra innings 7-8.

Siegel pitched the second game, which ended in a 5-4 victory and gave the Warriors a 5-3 win-loss record.

Sept. 26 found the Warriors in Grayson, Ky., where the team was scheduled to play in a four-game weekend tournament.

As it turned out, MCC lost 14-0 and 14-4 to Kentucky Christian. The games scheduled against Great Lakes Bible College were cancelled when Great Lakes pulled out of the tournament. Stormy weather then caused the cancellation of the two Saturday games.

On a positive note, both freshman Vic Bliss (Traverse City) and sophomore Mike David (Canal Winchester, Ohio) had doubles. Davis also hit a home run, the first in MCC's season.

The team's final six scheduled games were cancelled because of rain, leaving the season record 5-5. Leading the team in hitting were Siegel (.371) and Shane Cox (.370).

Cain pitched four of the 10 games, with two wins and two losses. He also had 38 strike outs in the four games.

Coach Shinsky has announced the return to spring ball for MCC. In the fall of 1987, a few practice games and inter-squad games will be held.

Then in the spring of 1988, a full schedule of spring ball games will be played, with the possibility of the Warriors playing in district playoffs and in tournaments.

# Volleyball program off to good start

Eight women volleyball players experienced the ups and downs of being on a first-year team in a sport added at MCC this fall.

The team played against fouryear colleges, which made the matches very difficult. The Lady Warriors looked at the games as a challenge and continued to give their best in an attempt to improve their performance in each contest.

Because volleyball was a new addition to the athletic program, hard work and commitment were necessary for the women to compete this season.

Practices started in August with team members meeting four or five times a week to work on skills. Drills in the basic skills of setting, passing, and hitting, along with specific team techniques and serving, were included in most practices.

He was also captain of the University of Regina men's volleyball team in 1984-1985 and worked with the Canadian women's national volleyball program during those two years.

The season began with two practice matches against Macomb Community College and Henry Ford Community College.

As the season progressed, the women played the best two out of three matches against Madonna College, Nazareth College, Grand Rapids Baptist College, Siena Heights College, Great Lakes Bible College, and Tiffin University.

Throughout the season, the women improved their individual skills and learned the need for teamwork.

Lynn Tebo led the team in the highest number of serves. Carole Hopkins and Rhonda Murray tied for most successful blocks. Rhonda Murray had the highest number of successful hits.

The season was short with only nine matches, but the women continued to play in club tournaments to prepare for the years to come.

There were not many victories according to the score clock, but many personal achievements led to comments by team members about "the great learning opportunities" made available this season.

"We have only just begun," Coach Wieb said. "It is difficult to start anything new, but this program will improve as will the win-loss record in future years. The most important thing is to never give up."
