Addition of three new majors enriches academic program

Three new majors have been finalized as Michigan Christian College continues to provide additional academic opportunities for current and future students. A new Counseling major within the Bachelor of Religious Education program and a Christian Ministry major in the new School of Biblical Studies began operation in the fall. The first coursework in a new Early Childhood major will be offered during the spring semester.

The four-year Counseling program is designed for students with an interest in personal, marriage and family, or child counseling. It features a core of thirty-nine credit hours in psychology and sociology.

A thirty-one credit hour core of selected Bible courses is required in the Counseling major to equip students with a solid base for counseling from the Christian perspective. Since those who complete the program will be encouraged to continue their education at the graduate level, the program provides the proper foundation for that purpose as well.

Last spring, the Bristol Road Church of Christ in Flint, Michigan, decided to move their School of Biblical Studies to the campus of Michigan Christian College. As a result, the college has developed a two-year program of preacher training for those desiring to change careers and enter the ministry.

Students are now able to benefit from instruction with college credit in the School of Biblical Studies, while completing the same type of excellent program that was offered at the Bristol Road location for almost two decades. In addition to a large core of practical and textual Bible courses, the seventy-three credit hour program incorporates basic courses in written and oral communication, Greek, and counseling.

For the past four years, MCC has offered a Child Care major for students desiring immediate employment upon completion of the Associate degree. This program has provided training for child care positions in daycare centers, nursery schools, and home settings. A new major in Early Childhood has been developed to provide the additional training currently required by the State of Michigan for certification as a director of a daycare center.

Students may seek employment as a daycare director upon completion of the Associate degree in Early Childhood, or may continue their education. The program includes the liberal arts courses required by most colleges for a Bachelor's degree and blends well into MCC's Counseling major.

In conjunction with the new Early Childhood program, the college plans to open a Child Development Center in the new facility which is being constructed adjacent to campus by the Rochester Church of Christ. The center will provide opportunities for internships as well as classroom observation.

While the new Counseling, School of Biblical Studies, and Early Childhood programs are being implemented, college officials also are making final preparations for the addition of a Bachelor of Business Administration degree. Evaluation teams from the Michigan Department of Education and the North Central Association are expected to complete their reviews of the proposed B.B.A. degree in the spring.

State association honors MCC's Coach Pleasant

MCC Coach Garth Pleasant received honors at a formal dinner of the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan on November 4 in Lansing. The association, which is made up of coaches throughout the state, named Coach Pleasant as the "Coach of the Year" in college men's basketball.

Julius Erving, former star of the Philadelphia 76ers, served as guest speaker for the annual dinner of the association. "Dr. J" stressed the importance of attitude in relation to success. Following his speech, Coach Pleasant was honored.

The previous two recipients of the prestigious award are the head coaches of Eastern Michigan University and Central Michigan University. In view of the fact that three Michigan colleges captured championships in their respective nation-

al associations in 1989, it is especially significant that Coach Pleasant received this award.

In twelve years of coaching basketball at Michigan Christian College, Coach Pleasant has accumulated a 238-82 winloss record. He has taken his team to the national finals for seven of the past eight years. Last spring, he led his team to their first National Championship, with a 25-3 season record.

Coach Pleasant is known for his ability to create a positive, winning attitude in others. In commenting about Coach Pleasant, Greg Kampe, Head Basketball Coach of Oakland University stated, "He studies basketball all of the time and knows the game. When I have a problem, I call him. Not only is he a great coach, but he is one of the finest persons I know."

Queen contest sets festival record

Queen candidates for the Fall Festival and their supporters shattered all records by raising an impressive \$40,606 in queen's votes prior to the September 9 festival. Combining proceeds from the queen contest with those of the actual festival day, the Associates raised a total of \$49,672 as a result of the annual event.

Throughout the summer months, local chapters sponsored dozens of projects on behalf of the queen candidates. Each dollar represented a vote for a particular candidate. Groups catered meals, inventoried stores, sponsored rummage sales, and served countless portions of food.

Queen candidates included Voncile Bullock, Lansing chapter; Carolyn Farrell, Rochester chapter; Mildred Freeland, Gateway chapter; Betty Lehnan, Farmington Hills chapter; and Barbara Williams, Parkside chapter. Mildred Freeland accumulated the most votes and was crowned Queen.

In their report of festival day, project chairpersons Benita Ward and Veneda Dillard stated, "The grounds were a bit soggy but everyone's spirit was sunny and bright." Fortunately, the several days of rain that had left the grounds soft and muddy subsided for the day.

Participants operated a total of fifty-four booths on festival day. Chapters receiving first place ribbons for decoration of booths included Gateway in the crafts tent, Ypsilanti in the food tent, Echo Meadows in the outside area, and Chase Road in the children's area.

The Baby Beautiful Contest collected over \$1,300 in votes for baby pictures. Joan Long of the festival committee announced that Alli Jeffers of Toledo took first place, Clinton Sweitzer of Dearborn second, and Corrine Waldrep of Taylor third. The future of those children at MCC is more secure because of the success of the day!

Phone-a-Visit directed by volunteer

Success seemed inevitable for the Phone-a-Visit campaign as Jack Duty, minister of the Clawson Church of Christ, rallied volunteers for the largest annual fund campaign required to sustain Michigan Christian College. Always appearing on campus in a special red sport coat, Jack served as the first volunteer director of Phone-a-Visit in its seventeen-year

An average of over eighteen volunteers phoned every Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday evening from October 16 through November 16. As a result of their efforts, a total of \$140,845 was pledged in support of the college.

Students served as the nucleus of phone volunteers. Twentyfour percent of the full-time students participated. Ken Cleghorn of Hazel Park, Michigan, led the student callers by raising \$6,404. He was followed by Michele Torrey of Oxford, Michigan, with \$6,175; and David Zeigler of Trenton, Ohio, with \$5,315.

Other student volunteers raising over \$1,000 included Jim Lavrack, Burton, Michigan; Mark Johnson, Dayton, Ohio; Kim Pfeffer, Trenton, Michigan; Sherrie Allen, Owosso, Michigan; Kevin Kowalski, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan; Chris Ward, Columbus, Ohio;

Duncan Alney, Calcutta, India; Wendy Barnett, Michigan City, Indiana; Deborah Crews, Upper Sandusky, Ohio; Marcy McClelland, Trenton, Michigan; Dawn Vaughn, Ecorse, Michigan; Marilyn Newton, Ypsilanti, Michigan; Sylvia Zavitz, Beamsville, Ontario; and Lydia Ferguson, Toledo, Ohio.

In addition to student callers, a number of employees and offcampus volunteers assisted. The Clawson, Lake Orion, Chase Road, Rochester, Brighton, and Ypsilanti chapters of the Associates each sent members to make calls.

At the conclusion of the campaign, Jack Duty made a rousing victory announcement in chapel, stating that the campaign goal was surpassed. He also stated, "I came to the campus to be a catalyst. A catalyst, however, remains unchanged. I do not leave here unchanged! Working with the students, faculty, and staff affected me deeply! I have grown as a result of my participation in this effort. President Milton B. Fletcher responded by presenting Jack with a plaque recognizing him as an honorary alumnus of Michigan Christian College.

Mobile kitchen quietly continues a tradition

Minutes of a 1963 Associates Meeting record a suggestion by President Wilma McKeel that the group obtain a food booth at the Michigan State Fair. Two years later, the Associates and Men's Club began managing and staffing a privately owned booth for 40% of the proceeds.

In her 1966 report to the membership, project chairperson Marie Carter noted, "Years ago we discussed ways and methods of earning money that would come from the general public and not just our Associates group." The State Fair Project accomplished that purpose until 1968, when the owner of the booth did not renew his contract with the Associates and Men's Club.

In the fall of 1969, the Associates and Men's Club jointly purchased a mobile kitchen for use at the State Fair. The mobile kitchen also received honors that fall as the best eating facility at the Rochester Centennial Celebration. During those early years, the kitchen was named "Scotty's Fish and Chips" in honor of Scotty Darnell, who helped organize the effort.

In time, State Fair attendance decreased to the point that the mobile kitchen did not

return to the fair. However, the kitchen quietly continued operation in a variety of places. Associates like Helen Williams, Catherine Sadurski, Janet Hyder, Lorene McDonald, and Mary Utley have directed efforts of the countless volunteers who have assisted in the project for two decades.

In recent years, patrons of the Rochester Art 'n Apples Festival have enjoyed the popular chicken nuggets and chicken dinners of the mobile kitchen. Through this effort alone, workers have raised over \$7,868 for Michigan Christian College during the last four festivals.

Students sponsor drives for child and the needy

Recent announcements about a young boy needing funds for an operation immediately caught the attention of the MCC student body. Within two weeks, student groups raised and sent over \$800.00 to the family in need.

An emergency fund of \$25,000 had to be raised for Shawn Clanton, ten year old son of Stan Clanton, minister for the North-east Church of Christ in East Detroit. The fund was needed to supplement insurance coverage before doctors would begin the search for a bone marrow trans-

In addition to collecting donations, the Student Body Association sponsored two fundraising activities for Shawn. They collected over 1,100 pop cans for return while preparing for an October 29 car wash.

Alpha Tau/Kappa Tau social clubs made a donation from their club treasury. Alpha Beta/Beta Gamma social clubs sponsored a Haunted Forest in the woods between the campus lakes on Halloween night just before the final donation check had to be sent to Shawn.

A short time later, Phi Beta Lambda, the campus business club, announced another service project. The club sponsored a unique scavenger hunt designed to collect food items for the needy.

On the evening of November 7, participants sought various canned goods among residents of a neighboring condominium complex. Within hours, over 1,000 items were collected. In response to the student effort, a local Pizza Hut treated participants to a meal in their honor!

MCC community donates 83 pints in Bloodmobile

Responding to the promotional efforts of Coach Bill Shinsky, eighty-three donors gave blood in an October 12 bloodmobile on campus. An additional eleven individuals attempted to

Red Cross personnel began wheeling equipment into the MCC Chapel immediately after the close of the morning devotional. Throughout the day, volunteers from campus assisted with the moving of equipment and supplies, while others served as hosts and hostesses for the event.

This year's bloodmobile was the thirty-sixth blood drive organized among the MCC community by Coach Shinsky. Countless individuals have given blood for the first time as a result of these drives and the

persuasive efforts of Coach Shinsky. Over the years, many of these same individuals have continued to give in their home communities.

Small numbers participated in the MCC blood drives of 1966 to 1970 since blood was donated in the name of the college at an off-campus site. Beginning in 1971, the number of participants increased measurably when the bloodmobile moved to campus. Coach Shinsky decided to expand efforts of the program further in 1980, when he began sponsoring a drive each semester.

The MCC community has donated a total of 1,986 pints of blood over the past twentythree years. Coach Shinsky expects to break the 2,000 mark next spring.

Duties reassigned among campus Administrators

Following the appointment of Birgie Houston as Dean of Students in the fall, President Milton B. Fletcher announced further administrative changes on November 30. Those changes, scheduled to become effective January 1, 1990, involve new assignments for Larry Stewart and Kent Hoggatt and the addition of Herchel McKamey to the administrative team.

Birgie Houston served as Assistant Dean of Student Life at Pepperdine University and as an administrative assistant at the University of Iowa Foundation prior to coming to Michigan Christian College in 1987. She began her work at MCC as the Associate Dean of Students and Instructor of Psychology and Sociology.

This past summer, Garth Pleasant decided to return to full-time teaching and coaching, leaving his administrative position open. Birgie Houston's background in Student Services and training as a professional counselor made her the ideal choice to fill the position.

Larry Stewart has served primarily as the Director of Admissions in his eighteen years as an employee of Michigan Christian College. Currently, he holds the longest tenure in this position among colleges and universities affiliated with the churches of Christ.

In his new position as Director of Public and Church Relations, Larry Stewart will continue to publish the college catalog and recruitment brochures. Beginning with this issue of the North Star, he will be producing all other college publications. In addition, he will organize the Christian Ministry Workshops, Church Leaders Workshop, and Youth Leaders Workshop. He also will direct alumni activities, supervise the MCC Bookstore, and assist with some development programs.

Kent Hoggatt's fifteen years of experience at Michigan Christian College give him unique qualifications to serve as the new Director of Admissions. He has served as an Admissions Counselor, Director of Financial Aid, and most recently as Director of Church Relations

In his new role, Kent Hoggatt will supervise the admissions program and all recruitment activities. He will schedule the A Cappella Chorus, Autumn, and Company and will work with student representatives in the Christian camps.

Herchel McKamey will join the administrative team as the Director of Development. He worked in the same capacity for Indianapolis Christian School prior to becoming their President in 1980. He served as the President of ICS for eight years. In addition, he has preached in Indiana and served on the Advisory Board of Shults Lewis Child and Family Services for several years.

Cross Country team captures first NSCAA national championship

Participating in the annual meet of the National Small College Athletic Association (NSCAA) for their second year, the MCC cross country team moved from runner-up position last year to the championship spot this fall. Dr. Martin Luther College of New Ulm, Minnesota, placed second in the national competition and Central College of McPherson, Kansas, placed third.

Michigan Christian College hosted the November 4 meet on the college's scenic campus. The runners began their five-mile race near the residence halls, continued down the pathway between the campus lakes, and then proceeded to the steep hills and dense woods behind the athletic fields. The variety of terrain provided an extra challenge for the runners.

Olaf Meier of Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, led the MCC team by completing the race in first position with a time of 27:04. After about the first mile, Meier moved ahead of the other runners and maintained a comfortable lead throughout the remainder of the race. Tom Preiss of Webster University in St. Louis, Missouri, captured the second spot with a time of 27:52.

MCC's Matt Parks of Ann Arbor, Michigan, took seventh position in the race and Eric Seelig of Wyandotte, Michigan, tenth. Chris Ward of Columbus, Ohio, and Matt Reeves of Flat Rock, Michigan, rounded out the victorious effort of the MCC team and their coach, Michael Light. Both Meier and Parks received All American honors from the NSCAA.

Paralegal students introduced to computer research

Students enrolled in the Legal Assistant Program of Michigan Christian College recently began training in computer-assisted legal research. This training provides invaluable exposure to a new method of research that is becoming common in law offices.

The training program, developed by Open Window, Inc., is designed to simulate the WESTLAW legal research system and to give the user instructional guidance in computer research. WESTLAW is the major computer data base used in modern law offices. It includes all federal and state

laws, case histories, and news on current legal issues.

Dr. John Todd, Director of the MCC Legal Assistant Program, donated the Open Window training diskettes to expose his students to an additional research method. Along with research from MCC's Michigan Law Library, Dr. Todd is requiring each student to log several hours of hands-on experience with the WESTLAW training materials.

MCC added the Legal Assistant Program in 1981. The twoyear program leads to an Associate in Applied Science degree. Students may seek employ-

ment upon completion of the degree in such places as law offices, insurance companies, and governmental agencies.

The MCC Legal Assistant Program features eight specialized law classes and an internship. It provides training in such areas as civil litigation, real estate matters, wills and probate administration, and criminal case work.

Statistics from the U.S. Department of Labor list the paralegal profession among the fastest growing occupations during the next decade. They predict a 104% increase in the profession by the year 2000.

At a Glance

Teenage Christian and Power for Today recently published seven articles written by members of the Honors Composition class. The articles were written as class projects.

Students enjoyed using newly renovated tennis courts during the fall semester. The courts, built in 1965, received a new surface, a fence painting, new tennis nets, and four basketball goals prior to the opening of the new academic year.

Adult students over age 30 may now receive academic credit at Michigan Christian College for certain types of life experience. This new policy was developed to recognize practical knowledge among the growing number of adults who are entering college programs.

Rochester featured the MCC A Cappella Chorus on Main Street prior to their annual Christmas Parade. An estimated 40,000 view the parade each year.


