Foundation funds \$40,000 gift for business program

Responding to a grant proposal from Michigan Christian College, a foundation from the Southwest recently donated \$40,000 to the college for use in development of the projected four-year business program. The foundation, which prefers to remain anonymous, expressed their conviction that it is important for the college to offer the Bachelor of Business Administration degree.

In their response letter, the foundation stated, "We truly hope that this can serve as a motivation to others to make contributions that will enable this program to become a reality." Continued growth of the budget will be necessary as library and instructional resources continue to expand.

As the first major step toward offering the full Bachelor of Business Administration degree, the college began operation of a three-year business program in 1987. This program has allowed students to continue their studies in business at MCC through the junior year and then obtain a Bachelor's degree with approximately one year of additional work in participating colleges and universities. This arrangement also has provided the college with an opportunity to develop library resources.

In the spring of 1989, a team of scholars representing the Michigan Department of Education visited the campus. The college has finalized most of the items suggested by the visiting team. The major item to be accomplished is the employment of an additional business instructor, who also will serve as chairperson of the department. Applications for the position are being accepted by Dr. Leonard Knight, Academic Dean.

Indoor setting chosen for thirtieth graduation after Friday rainfall

Friday rainfall and a similar weather forecast for the weekend of May 4 caused the graduation ceremonies of Michigan Christian College to move to an indoor setting for only the fourth time in its thirty-year history. The setting changed from under the majestic pines of the campus to the auditorium of the Rochester Church of Christ. Since the new auditorium had been in use for less than one week, the uniqueness of the situation provided an exciting substitute for graduates.

Dr. C.L. Kay, Vice Chancellor of Abilene Christian University, addressed the graduates. In his practical, yet humorous style, he presented a message entitled Keys to Success: Nine Principles to Remember.

Dr. Kay's perspective as an individual with an impressive background in education and civil service added depth to his advice. Prior to accepting his position with Abilene Christian University, he worked with Lubbock Christian University from 1957 to 1982. He has received numerous citations and awards for his work in public affairs, including a citation from

former U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower. As a member of the Defense Orientation Conference Association, he has inspected major defense installations throughout the world.

The majority of students in the graduating class received one of three Associate degrees offered by Michigan Christian College. Among graduates of the Associate in Arts program, 31% plan to return to MCC for upper division work in Bible, Counseling, or Business.

Four students received the Bachelor of Religious Education degree. Vic Bliss of Traverse City, Michigan, and Tom Twigg of Michigan City, Indiana, earned majors in Biblical Studies. Mark Brackney of Attica, Michigan, and Edet Udofia of Yuo, Akwa Ibom State, Nigeria, completed majors in Christian Ministry.

Adding a new dimension to the events of the day, six students received the first Certificates in Christian Ministry granted by Michigan Christian College. All six recipients began their work at the Bristol Road School of Biblical Studies in Flint, Michigan. When the

Bristol Road congregation decided last spring to move the School of Biblical Studies to the MCC campus, these men decided to complete their two-year program of preacher training at the new location.

Graduates of the School of Biblical Studies included Lamar Black of Mt. Morris, Michigan; Michael Davis of Rockport, Massachusetts; Isaac Gnohou of the Ivory Coast, West Africa; Bryan Hampton of Mt. Morris, Michigan; Hashim Hayik of Eilaboun, Israel; and Tony Reynolds of Plymouth, Indiana. All six men plan to continue their education next fall in the college's Bachelor of Religious Education program.



On Saturday, April 21, 312 participants met on the campus of Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo for Partnership Dinner West IV. The Tumbleweeds provided entertainment for the evening, and Dr. C.L. Kay, Vice Chancellor of Abilene Christian University, served as guest speaker. Dr. Kay spoke on Facing the Future With Confidence.

During the program, President Milton B. Fletcher presented an Alumni Citation to Dan and Peggy Shepard of Jenison, Michigan. Dan and Peggy attended MCC from 1971-73. Dan works as District Sales Manager for the American Chicle Division of Warner-Lambert. He and Peggy serve on the Steering Committee for Partnership Dinner West and are active members of the Grandville Church of Christ.

The newly remodeled Cobo Convention and Exhibition Center hosted Partnership Dinner XIX on Saturday, May 12 in Detroit. Dr. William Teague, President of Abilene Christian University, addressed the audience on the subject, When All Else Fails - Think. A choral group of alumni and the MCC A Cappella Chorus performed a number of patriotic songs.

At the dinner, President Fletcher named Dr. John Losher as Alumnus of the Year, and Ken Stewart as Artist of the Year.

Dr. John Losher serves as Executive Vice President and Chief Executive Officer of the Christian Care Center of Mesquite, Texas. John graduated from MCC in 1962. Workshop guests focus on "Servant Leadership"

Church leaders from Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, and Kentucky converged on the campus of Michigan Christian College on June 1-2 for the Jim Wood Church Leaders Workshop. Workshop participants focused on a theme of Servant Leader-

One participant described the weekend as the "best workshop I've ever attended." Another stated, "We appreciate the way the school is helping churches in the area to become stronger by having this workshop." Several commented on the fine quality of the speakers and expressed their appreciation for the opportunity to spend time with other leaders.

The program opened on Friday evening with a dinner served by the Rochester Associates in the new Fellowship Hall of the Rochester Church of Christ. After a musical presentation by Autumn, Dr. John Stevens, Chancellor of Abilene Christian University, discussed the topic, Is Leadership Accidental?

At the conclusion of the evening program, a number of participants took advantage of the availability of overnight housing in the Alma Gatewood Residence Hall. Those staying overnight benefited from further opportunities to visit.

Early on Saturday morning, James LeFan, who recently retired after thirty-nine years of preaching for the Western Hills Church of Christ in Temple, Texas, addressed workshop guests in the opening session. Guests then divided into classes.

Jack Duty, minister of the Clawson Church of Christ, presented a class on ministering to senior citizens, while Rick Watson, an elder of the Echo Meadows Church of Christ in Oregon, Ohio, discussed work with youth. The great potential of inner city ministries became more apparent after a class by Lytle Thomas, director of the Nashville Inner City Ministry.

After a general session, guests chose from another set of classes. James Grotts, Clinical Director of the Agape Counseling Center in Flint, discussed the growing need for professional counseling. Jerry Tallman, minister of the Rochester Church of Christ taught a class on evangelism, and Joe T. Ritchie, an elder of the Holmes Road Church of Christ in Lansing, Michigan, discussed stewardship. John Stevens closed the program with remarks about the role of the servant leader.

Listing forty-six names of students who came to Michigan Christian College from the Lincoln Park congregation or who settled in Lincoln Park after attending MCC, Board Member Bob Benham gave the following statistics at the Employee Appreciation Dinner in April. Of eighteen men, eleven are deacons and one a prison minister. Of twenty-eight women, ten are the wives of deacons, two the wives of preachers, and one a vocational missionary. Unfaithfulness to the Lord has touched only three families. He concluded, "What is the likelihood of this happening without Christian Education?'

Volunteers in Action

Passing her gavel to Beth Fisher of the Brighton chapter, Margaret Hadfield completed her third year as President of the Associates on May 31. Ginny May of the Lake Orion chapter also began her term as Vice-President and Evelyn Fletcher as Assistant Treasurer.

Members of the Board of Trustees and the college administrators gathered in Angola, Indiana on June 15-17 for their ninth annual retreat. The weekend included the quarter-ly meeting of the Board.

Two months prior to the end of their fiscal year, the Associates met their budgeted 1989-90 contribution of \$100,514. The group ended the year by surpassing projections and donating a total of \$116,000 to the college.

Featured Speakers

James Cail. Joining the staff of Oklahoma Christian University in 1962, Dr. James Cail now serves as Professor of Psychology at Oklahoma Christian and as Minister of Counseling at the Quail Springs Church of Christ. Dr. Cail received degrees from Abilene Christian University and Baylor University.

Steve Eckstein. Thirty-three years of teaching for the Bible Chair of Eastern New Mexico University adds tremendous depth to Dr. Steve Eckstein's classroom presentations. He joined the Bible faculty of Michigan Christian College in 1986. Dr. Eckstein holds degrees from Harding University, Eastern New Mexico University, and Texas Tech University.

Dowell Flatt. Now serving as Chairman of the Bible Department at Freed-Hardeman University, Dr. Dowell Flatt is the youngest member of the Flatt Brothers Evangelistic Team. Including five years in Michigan, he has preached in forty-nine states and twenty-two countries. Dr. Flatt is a graduate of Freed-Hardeman University, Harding University, Harding Graduate School of Religion, and New Orleans Seminary.

Loren Gieger. Drawing upon his twenty-four years of full-time preaching experience in Oklahoma and Texas, Dr. Loren Gieger taught at Michigan Christian College from 1981 to 1984. He joined the Bible faculty of Oklahoma Christian University in 1984. Dr. Gieger holds degrees from Abilene Christian University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Mike Houston. Seventeen years of preaching, youth work, and campus ministry in the heartland of America and on the West Coast help Dr. Michael Houston identify with the challenges of a local church. He began his work on the Bible faculty of Michigan Christian College in 1987. Dr. Houston attended York College, Pepperdine University, and the University of Iowa.

Leonard Knight. Specializing in counseling, Dr. Leonard Knight has served as a Youth Minister and a Children's Home Counselor. He began working with Michigan Christian College in 1978 and now serves as Academic Dean. Dr. Knight holds degrees from Pepperdine University, Fuller Theological Seminary, and Oakland University.

Joy McMillon. Having worked twelve years on the faculty of Oklahoma Christian University and six years as Managing Editor of the Christian Chronicle, Joy McMillon now serves as Consulting Editor for 20th Century Christian. She completed degrees at Oklahoma Christian and the University of Central Oklahoma.

Prentice Meador. In constant demand as a speaker on family life, Dr. Prentice Meador has given the majority of his time to the ministry since 1974. He has taught in several universities and has had extensive experience with radio and television ministries. He now preaches for the Prestoncrest Church of Christ in Dallas, Texas. Dr. Meador received his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois.

Martel Pace. Known to many in Michigan because of his fifteen years of preaching in the state, Martel Pace now serves the Vaughn Park Church of Christ in Montgomery, Alabama. He attended Freed-Hardeman University, Harding University, and the Harding Graduate School of Religion, and teaches part-time for the Alabama Christian School of Religion.

Garth Pleasant. Able to create a positive, winning attitude in others, Garth Pleasant has developed an exceptional basketball program in thirteen years of coaching for Michigan Christian College. He preaches for the Lake Orion Church of Christ and holds degrees from Michigan Christian College and David Lipscomb University.

Mel Storm. Nine years of experience in preaching and teaching were gained by Dr. Mel Storm while completing his college work. He began teaching at Michigan Christian College in 1986 and now serves as Chair of the Bible Department. Dr. Storm completed degrees at Pepperdine University and Baylor University.

Willard Tate. Now serving on the faculty of Abilene Christian University and as minister of the Hamby Church of Christ, Willard Tate is a frequent speaker on lectureships and workshops. He built record-breaking basketball programs in twenty years of coaching at Alabama Christian College and Abilene Christian University. He is a graduate of Alabama Christian, Auburn University, and Troy State University.



Three days in the Windemere area included a visit to the home of Beatrix Potter and Hawkshead, the grammar school of Wordsworth. After reading from the works of Wordsworth at a luncheon on Morecambe Bay, the group also

Phi Beta Lambda sends service project report to national headquarters

Helping the Homeless served as the theme for the 1989-90 Community Service Project of the MCC chapter of Phi Beta Lambda. In May, the group sent a report of their activities to the national office of the business student organization. Outstanding projects are honored at a national convention in July.

In the first phase of their project, the group sponsored a food drive last fall for the homeless hungry. They collected over 1,000 cans of food for distribution to the needy.

Phases two and three focused on help for homeless babies and homeless orphans. They wrote a flyer to promote adoption over abortion and distributed it to twenty-five adoption agencies and seventy public high schools in Michigan. Their efforts to locate a Romanian orphanage to work with American adoption agencies had to be put on hold until pending law changes in Romania would allow such adoptions.

In an attempt to assist the homeless hostages in Lebanon, the group worked with Congressman William S. Broomfield to send a petition to the captors. The congressman saluted the student effort and encouraged the group to maintain their interest in foreign affairs.

Rounding out their efforts, the group helped a homeless family by participating in Habitat for Humanity. On May 12, a group from MCC assisted in the renovation of an abandoned Detroit home, which has since been occupied by a mother and two small children. The club has had inquiries from other groups desiring to assist in this type of activity.

Alumnus completes twenty years in mission field

Dedicating their past twenty years to evangelism in East Africa, Berkeley and Charlotte Hackett have played an integral part in one of the most fruitful mission efforts among the churches of Christ. The continuity that they have provided for the work in Nairobi, Kenya has been a key to the success of efforts in that area.

Berkeley recently directed Target Nairobi, a project which raised \$1.6 million for a 1.500 seat auditorium and classrooms for a Christian school. The congregation meeting in that new facility has grown from thirtythree members in January of 1989 to 615. The congregation baptized 687 people in 1989.

The Nairobi mission effort includes thirty congregations of the churches of Christ in and around the city of Nairobi. Those congregations recorded 1,226 conversions in 1989.

After attending MCC from 1961-62, Berkeley received de-
