Consulting firm submits survey report to college

Last spring, Michigan Christian College authorized Dickerson and Associates, a private consulting firm, to conduct a comprehensive survey on behalf of the college. During the months that followed, the firm conducted personal and phone interviews with a number of individuals, and mailed questionnaires to 5,000 alumni and friends of the college.

With a response rate of over double the amount required to prepare an accurate evaluation, Dickerson and Associates submitted a detailed report of their findings to the college. The report included statistical summaries of responses to survey questions and a representation of written comments, without identifying respondents.

Dickerson and Associates reported on a "general good feeling about Michigan Christian College." They stated that "the vast majority of respondents think the college has a strong administration, appreciates its financial integrity, feels the campus has a warm and loving atmosphere, commends the faculty as competent and committed, and believes the location and beauty of the campus are outstanding."

Nearly 98% of the respondents felt that MCC renders a valuable service. Over 59% considered the college's program outstanding or above average.

Many referred to MCC as an asset to the church in the Midwest, and as a great place for students to learn, grow, and strengthen Christian roots.

The majority of responses to questions about the college's greatest need and direction for the future centered around four interrelated issues: four-year programs, facilities, enrollment, and funding.

A desire for the college to offer more four-year programs surfaced repeatedly in the survey. In response to that need, a new committee recently began the process of guiding the college through the final steps required before adding the Bachelor of Business Administration degree. The committee also has been charged with the task of planning for additional four-year programs.

While many survey participants commented on the ideal location and beauty of the campus, several also mentioned the need to renovate existing facilities and to construct new ones. Since his arrival at MCC, Dr. Ken Johnson has scheduled a Spring Service Encampment, and has set a goal of refurbishing the entire campus within a two-year period. Currently, space usage is being reviewed, renovation projects outlined, and potential funding sources identified. Consistent with the priorities of most college per-

sonnel, survey participants ranked library and science facilities as the greatest need for construction.

Many survey respondents felt that additional four-year programs and improved facilities would help MCC offset the declining number of high school graduates available from the general public and the church. In addition, the college is retargeting recruitment efforts.

Recognizing the cost of new programs and improved facilities, survey participants iden-

tified additional funding as one of the greatest needs of the college. Many stated a willingness to assist with special projects in addition to their involvement in operational gift programs.

Among comments that appeared on the survey, one former student stated, "MCC has offered a Christian education to hundreds who would not have received it if they had to go further from home. Our lives are full of memories gained there. I hope it is always there for future generations."

New scholarship levels announced for this fall

Currently, 28% of the full-time students at Michigan Christian College receive a scholarship for outstanding academic records or ACT scores. Students interested in attending MCC next fall will have an additional program, the largest scholarship ever offered by the college, available to them as well.

A number of Trustee Scholarships will be awarded to new students in increments that will cover full, three-quarters, or half of the annual cost for tuition, room, and board. Recipients will be selected upon the basis of grades, test scores, leadership abilities, and involvement in church activities. Applications for the new scholarship must be submitted to the Admissions Office by March 15, 1992. Recipients will be announced on April 1, 1992.

In addition to introducing the new Trustee Scholarship in the fall, the college will begin awarding the regular Academic and ACT Scholarships at new levels. Those scholarships are granted automatically to eligible students in amounts ranging from \$600 to \$3,000 per academic year.

Volunteers aid library operations

Volunteers have played a major role in the development and operation of Michigan Christian College since its inception. While hosts of individuals have assisted the college from their hometowns as Board members, Associates, campaign leaders, and workers for special projects, others have filled special campus needs on many occasions.

During the current academic year, two individuals have spent several hours each week as volunteer assistants in the Muirhead Library. Horace Hill, a retired branch chief for Abrams Tank Division of the U.S. Army Command, has been serving three afternoons in the library on a weekly basis. Linda Dunning, a former compensation clerk for Sears, began working as a volunteer during the summer, and has volunteered her services for one day each week since that time.

Introduced to the college by a former MCC student who influenced his daughter, Brenda (Hill) Tyler, to enroll in 1983, Horace Hill himself began taking classes at MCC last fall. His experiences in Dr. John Todd's legal assistant classes increased his interest in spending more time on campus, so he volunteered to assist in the library.

son, Jim, enrolled as a freshman. She has found great satisfaction in "being able to assist the students and see their joy in being together."

Commenting on the work of Horace Hill and Linda Dunning, Sandra Hollis, director of library services, stated, "Their volunteer efforts have been a real blessing to the library. On a daily basis, I admire the positive influence that they have on our students."

Phone-a-Visit directed by volunteer

Success seemed inevitable for the Phone-a-Visit campaign as Jack Duty once again rallied volunteers for the largest annual gift campaign required to sustain Michigan Christian College. Jack served as the first volunteer director of the campaign in 1989 and returned to fill the same capacity this year. He regularly serves as minister of the Clawson Church of Christ and as a member of the MCC Board of Trustees.


A total of eighty-six individuals made phone calls every Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday evening from October 21 through November 15. As a result of their efforts, a total of 1,319 families pledged \$118,307 in support of the college. An additional 440 made pledges in response to mail efforts, totaling another \$72,332.

Students served as the nucleus of volunteers. Tammy Rigsby of Northwood, Ohio, led the student callers by raising \$10,925. She was followed by Abbie Pegan of Fort Wayne, Indiana, with \$10,475; and Amiee Vernal of Plymouth, Michigan, with \$5,685. Other students raising over \$1,000 included Michigan students Leah Tucker of Swartz Creek, Mitch Anderson of Detroit, Julie Wallace of Flint, Leena Gilbert of Caro, Adam Hammitt of Flint, Mary Torrey of Oxford, Kelvin Brown of Romulus, and Kathleen O'Connell of North Branch.

In addition to student callers, a number of employees and offcampus volunteers assisted as well. The Brighton, Clawson, Lake Orion, Parkside, and Rochester chapters of the Associates each had representatives making calls.

Although a team effort made the nineteenth campaign a

success, Alpha Tau/ Kappa Tau social club led calling groups with the largest number of callers participating on the various nights. They were followed by representatives from the Board of Trustees, employees, and the Associates.



Michigan Christian College is not a seminary. Nor is it designed in the tradition of a Bible college. Rather, it is a *liberal arts college* where students study scores of different subjects in pursuit of the academic foundations needed to build a vocational career.

Pioneer class member directs adoption agency

Dedicating the past twenty years to Colorado Christian Services, Leonard Blake has made a significant mark in the field of Christian child care. He has served as an employee of three child care agencies, and has played an important role in the establishment of others in California, Oklahoma, and Kansas.

Leonard graduated with the pioneer class of Michigan Christian College in 1961. Upon graduation, he worked for Schults Lewis Child and Family Services in a number of roles until 1965. He spent the next three years as a missionary in Vietnam.

Upon returning to the United States, Leonard enrolled at Oklahoma Christian College, where he received his bachelor's degree in 1969. He completed a master's degree in social work at the University of Oklahoma in 1971.

After a brief stint as a counselor for Sunbeam Family Services, Leonard began his work with Colorado Christian Services in 1972. Within a short period, the agency appointed him as executive director. Since serving in that capacity, he has been active in the development of legislation regarding adoptions in the state of Colorado. and has served as president of the Rocky Mountain Adoption Exchange.

Leonard met his wife, the former Dona Mai Bruce, at Michigan Christian College. The couple has sent three children as students. Their daughter, Mary Johnson, enrolled in 1979, as the first second-generation student whose parents both attended MCC. Their son, Billy, was one of the first students enrolled in the third-year business program in 1988. Their daughter, Beth, graduated valedictorian of the class





Bible professor continues to release publications

Reprinting one of his works for the sixth time, Dr. Steve Eckstein, professor of Bible and Greek, recently released a new edition of Studies in the Pentateuch. The reprint followed a set of monographs that he had published during the past two

In each of his monographs, entitled From a Nobody to a Somebody, Dr. Eckstein highlighted the life-changing stories of Bible characters. Shortly after the release of the monographs, two of his students took copies on a summer mission campaign in Ghana, West Africa. Based upon the positive response of readers in that country, the publisher decided to donate 1,000 copies for distribution by local missionaries.

In addition to his recent releases, Dr. Eckstein has published two other books, The Purpose of Genesis and History of Churches of Christ in Texas. His small pamphlet, I Am a Christian, has been reprinted several times.

Before beginning his teaching career at Michigan Christian College, Dr. Eckstein taught at the Bible Chair of Eastern New Mexico University for thirtythree years. Most of those years he served as chairman of the department of religion, which holds the distinction of being the first graduate program in religion among churches of Christ.

During his years at Eastern

Eckstein taught 5,052 students. He worked with 167 individuals as they completed master's degrees in religion.

Dr. Eckstein moved to Michigan in 1986, when he began teaching full-time for Michigan Christian College. In addition to a large variety of courses in the college program, he has taught regularly in the MCC Christian Ministry Workshops. He has served as a featured speaker at numerous workshops, retreats, and seminars throughout the nation, and preaches at various congregations on most Sundays, averaging 130 engagements per year.


MCC hosts cross country nationals

Cross country runners of the National Small College Athletic Association (NSCAA) converged on the campus of Michigan Christian College on November 8 for their annual national championship meets. Upon arriving on campus, participants enjoyed an evening banquet, and then returned to campus the next morning for races in both men's and women's divisions.

The variety of terrain on the campus course provided an extra challenge for the runners. The men completed a five-mile route that included the level ground of the front campus, the hilly areas between the campus lakes, and the steep hills and dense woods behind the athletic fields. The women competed on a three-mile course through the



The database is updated on a monthly basis, providing timely information from the current, as well as the previous three years.

Former presidents continue to serve after MCC

Former presidents of Michigan Christian College have continued to serve in a variety of capacities since completing their work at MCC. Mission efforts, educational institutions, and senior care organizations have benefited from the same leadership skills that molded the college for thirty-two years.

After serving as founding president of Michigan Christian College from 1958 to 1964, Otis Gatewood redirected his efforts toward mission work. He served as professor of missions at the Harding Graduate School from 1964 to 1970. During the same period, he also assisted Columbia Christian College as chancellor.

In 1971, Dr. Gatewood began serving as director of the East European School of Evangelism in Vienna, Austria. He continued in that capacity until becoming founding president of European Christian College in 1978. He retired in 1988.

Currently, Dr. Gatewood lives in his former residence in Rochester Hills, near the MCC campus. He continues to write materials for use in Eastern European mission areas and preaches in area congregations on a regular basis.

After serving as president of Michigan Christian College from 1964 to 1971, Lucien Palmer continued to work with the college as chancellor for three more years. He has maintained a close relationship with the college as a member of the MCC Board of Trustees.

In 1974, Dr. Palmer accepted the presidency of African Christian Schools. For several years, he spent about half of his time in Nigeria, and about half coordinating efforts in the states. Today, most of his duties as president are accomplished at the foundation's base in Nashville, Tennessee.

Christian schools throughout the nation have been touched by the efforts of Don Gardner since he left his 1971 to 1978 presidency of Michigan Christian College. He served as president of Christian Schools of Greater Houston until 1981. In 1984, he founded Partners for Christian Education; and in 1986, the National Christian School Association. As president of those organizations, he has provided guidance and council for countless Christian schools and academies.

In 1987, the Board of York College asked Dr. Gardner to serve as interim president. After a short period of time, they convinced him to remain as president. When he left Nebraska in 1991, they placed a caption on his portrait that stated, "With God's help, he saved York College."

Dr. Gardner continues to serve as president of Partners

Dr. Gardner continues to serve as president of Partners and the Christian School Association. Temporarily, he is residing in California, while helping California Christian School reopen its doors.

After serving as the fourth president of Michigan Christian College from 1978 to 1980, Walt

Gilfilen returned to his former position at Brevard Community College in Cocoa, Florida. Currently, he serves as their assistant to the president.

Walt Gilfilen is active as an elder in his local congregation and as the board chairman of Mercy Watch, an organization that serves needs of the elderly. In recognition of his significant contributions to the fibre of the nation, the White House honored him as President Bush's 210th Point of Light.

Retiring last fall from his tenyear presidency of Michigan Christian College, Milton B. Fletcher agreed to serve the college on a part-time basis as chancellor. In his new role, he assists MCC with public relations, estate planning, and annual-fund dinners in the Southern region of the country.

In addition to his ongoing efforts for MCC, Dr. Fletcher also works part-time as director of community relations and development for the Christian Care Centers of Mesquite, Texas. The organization operates three retirement centers, which serve the needs of about 1,000 residents.

Great men have led Michigan Christian College for over three decades. Each has left his mark on campus, and each has continued to live in service to others.
