College adds criminal justice major

Unique among programs available from colleges affiliated with the churches of Christ, a new major in criminal justice will be offered this fall by Michigan Christian College. The new program, resulting in an Associate in Science degree, is designed to provide students with appropriate training for immediate employment with a law enforcement, security, or private investigative agency upon completion of the degree. In addition, it includes the course work required by those students desiring to pursue a degree in criminal justice at the bachelor's level through the college's newly developed "2+2" degree plans.

The criminal justice program features a core of eleven specialized courses that will be offered by Michigan Christian College. Students obtaining the degree will complete thirty-one credit hours of such specialized courses as *Introduction to Criminal Justice*, *Criminal Law*, *Police Processes*, *Police Report Writing*, *Juvenile Methods*, *Criminology*, *Loss Prevention*, *Criminal Investigation*, *Emergency Control of*

Deviant Behavior, *Firearms Training*, and *Field Internship*.

Dr. John Todd, professor of political science, has been named on-campus coordinator for the new criminal justice program. Dr. Todd, an experienced attorney and instructor, also will teach selected law courses to the criminal justice students.

Having served as a consultant to Michigan Christian College in the developmental stages of the criminal justice program, Dr. Wayne Francisco has been chosen to serve on the adjunct faculty of the college. Dr. Francisco, a veteran law enforcement agent and retired college professor, will teach courses in the new major on the campus of Michigan Christian College and at a special extension center near Dr. Francisco's retirement home in Atlanta, Michigan.

Since 1950, Dr. Francisco has

served as a practicing law enforcement officer. In addition, he taught criminal justice at Schoolcraft College from 1969 to 1973 and at Lake Superior State University from 1973 to 1983. He has written extensively on law, drug abuse, and crisis intervention.

At the present time, Dr. Francisco serves as national vice president of the American Federation of Police, faculty mentor of Columbia Pacific University, and dean of the American Police Academy. He regularly conducts seminars throughout northern Michigan and Canada.

New lectureship format features fuller program

Michigan Christian College's 35th Annual Bible Lectureship on October 4-6, 1992, will unveil a new and more compact format, designed for the busy schedules of the 1990's. This year's format will offer more alternatives and more classes for attendees than any MCC lectureship in recent years, while at the same time reducing the number of days that participants must be away from their hometown responsibilities.

Designed around the theme *Equipping to Serve*, the new lectureship format will provide two very full days and three evenings of lectures and special activities. During the daytime hours on Monday and Tuesday, a textual track with a sequence of nine lectures will cover the entire book of Ephesians. A concurrent counseling track of seven lectures will teach entry-level counseling skills to persons having little or no formal training in counseling. Five additional concurrent lectures will constitute a program especially designed for women attending the lectureship.

Evening keynote addresses on Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday will follow traditional musical presentations by choral groups on two of the nights. All of the traditional meals and dinners have been worked into the new format.

Following last year's lectureship, a ten-member committee designed the new format in an attempt to address the needs of MCC's unique constituency. Attempting to focus on Christian service in the North Central states, the committee selected speakers based upon outstanding credentials and involvement in congregations in MCC's service region. The committee attempted to schedule a program that ministers, elders, deacons, teachers, and Christian workers would find informative, uplifting, and encouraging, as they seek to be better equipped for service in the Kingdom.

Phones to be installed in residence hall rooms

Workers began installation of a Premier ESPDX phone system throughout the campus of Michigan Christian College during the early part of July. The system, scheduled for completion before the opening of the fall semester, will provide state-of-the-art phone services to the entire campus community, including all students living in the four campus residence halls.

Every residence hall room will be equipped with a phone unit, and each resident student will be provided with voice-mail service. This valuable feature will allow parents and friends to leave recorded messages for individual students when those persons are away from their rooms.

In addition to making major changes in equipment, the college also has negotiated long-distance services at discounted rates for both student and insti-

tutional use. Students will be able to obtain long-distance services through the college in addition to their basic phone and voice-mail services.

The institutional phone system still will be answered by the college receptionist during the normal office hours of 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Monday through Friday. Outside of those times, an auto-attendant will answer the phones, direct calls, and take messages for all campus personnel and offices. Students will be reached by separate numbers.

Changes in phone operational costs are expected to impact the college budget enough to pay for the entire new phone system within a five-year period. In the meantime, individuals from both on and off campus will benefit from the improved communication capabilities that the new phone system will provide.

Teens visit campus for Summer Jam

Teens from Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Ontario, and Holland participated in a new program hosted by the Admissions Office from June 22 through June 26. Named *Summer Jam*, the program combined the activities of a youth rally with those of a summer Bible camp.

The week featured Dr. Randy Gill of Malibu, California, as guest speaker. Randy, a 1974 graduate and former instructor of Michigan Christian College, presented his popular workshop, "That's Entertainment?"


During the four-day program, campers lived in the college residence halls, ate in the cafeteria, and participated in a full schedule of activities. Bible classes, mixers, lakeside devotionals, service projects in the community, recreational activities, chapel, and entertainment by such groups as Autumn, Lifeline, and Straight Company filled each day. As one camper commented at the end of the week, "Everything was so much fun. I liked being busy the whole day."

Russ Bone, minister of the Parkside Church of Christ wrote

At a Glance

Over 600 residents from the community filled the auditorium of the Rochester Church of Christ for *Spring Choral Fest*, the annual concert of the Rochester Community Chorus. The program featured the MCC A Cappella Chorus, along with the community group, in an unprecedented joint concert. Both choral groups are directed by Joe Bentley, assistant professor of music at Michigan Christian College.

Students with outstanding academic backgrounds will have a newly designed honors program available to them this fall. A selection of over thirty-two credit hours of designated courses will meet honors degree requirements, and a number of specific courses will be taught at a more advanced level than their normal counterparts. Students entering the honors program must achieve a high school grade point average of 3.30 or above, and a composite score of 25 or above on the ACT to be admitted to the program.

Sigma Phi and Delta Nu social clubs raised \$1,215 for a child with cancer during the past academic year. Near the end of the year, representatives of the club delivered a check to family members, and a large teddy bear with an autographed shirt to the boy during one of his hospital stays. In addition to assisting with this project, the entire student body made a gift through the Student Body Association to the Rainbow Connection, an organization which grants wishes to terminally ill children.



Employee Highlights

Six Christian college chancellors have been selected to form a new board to direct the Foundation for Christian Higher Education, including **Dr. Milton B. Fletcher**, chancellor of Michigan Christian College. The board has been commissioned with the task of developing a plan to promote Christian education on a national basis.

Dr. Ken Johnson, president, presented the keynote address at the annual Michigan Missions Forum in Midland, Michigan, last spring.

Coach **Bill Shinsky** received honors as *Faculty Member of the Year*; and **Michael Light**, admissions counselor, and **Cathy Ries**, secretary to the president, as *Staff Members of the Year* at the annual Employee Appreciation Dinner.

Dr. Steve Williams, associate professor of business, received his Doctorate in Business Administration from Nova University in May. Dr. Williams is actively involved in the final stages of preparation for addition of the four-year business degree.

Future students benefit from new "2+2" programs

Building upon an exceptionally strong liberal arts program, Michigan Christian College has developed a creative new set of "2+2" degree programs. By following these course outlines, future students will be able to obtain the first two years of virtually any bachelor's degree program in the unique atmosphere of Michigan Christian College.

To reassure prospective students about the ease of transfer when academic programs are properly planned through such vehicles as the "2+2" degree plans, Michigan Christian College also has developed a written guarantee of transferability. Upon selection of a college major and an institution where the bachelor's degree is to be completed, students will be able to see their entire program in advance and be assured of receiving proper credit for their work.

The "2+2" degree programs were conceived because of Michigan Christian College's historically strong belief that the first two years after high school are among the most critical years in a student's life, when most struggle to find their faith. By following the "2+2" degree plans, neither students or parents will

have to sacrifice the desire for a prestigious degree from a nationally-recognized college or university.

Consistent with a national trend, 25% of applications for enrollment at Michigan colleges and universities are transfer applications. Many students complete their first two years of basic, general education courses

at a "first college" and then transfer to obtain a bachelor's degree at a "second college." In 1990, 63,281 Michigan students applied for transfer to complete their academic programs.

Openings for both new and transfer students desiring to enter Michigan Christian College for the fall semester are still available for those meeting ad-

mission requirements. Financial aid also is still available for eligible students. Parents or students wishing to inquire about particular "2+2" degree plans or any of Michigan Christian College's four-year majors may phone the Admissions Office toll-free at 1-800-872-2579 from Michigan or at 1-800-521-6010 from outside of Michigan.

Gatewoods honored by scholarship

Bringing together a name and a concept that have become synonymous, Michigan Christian College has established the Gatewood Evangelism Scholarship in honor of Otis Gatewood, highly respected missionary and pioneer president of the college. The scholarship will be granted

annually to MCC students training for evangelism efforts.

In 1946, Otis Gatewood and his wife, Alma, entered Germany as the first American missionaries after the war. They were responsible for the distribution of about one million dollars worth of food and clothing to the war-

torn cities of Frankfort and Cologne. After assisting in the establishment of about forty congregations, the Gatewoods returned to the states in 1957.

Upon completing his work as the first president of Michigan Christian College, Dr. Gatewood served as professor of missions at the Harding Graduate School. In 1971, he began directing the East European School of Evangelism in Vienna, Austria. He continued in that capacity until becoming founding president of European Christian College in 1978.

Currently, Dr. Gatewood and his wife, Irene, live in Rochester Hills, and are writing materials for use in Eastern European mission areas. This summer, they are involved in mission efforts in Russia.

Associates surpass budget for year

Surpassing their budgeted goal for the 1991-92 fiscal year by \$5,000, the Associates of Michigan Christian College donated a total of \$120,000 to the college during the past fiscal year. Before making their annual gifts to the college, the group raised a total of \$137,030, the second largest amount in their thirty-three year history. Only proceeds from staffing souvenir booths at Super Bowl XVI allowed the 1981-82 total of \$167,422 to remain the record.

Two fund-raising projects proved crucial to the success of the Associates during the past year. Income from the Fall Festival totaled \$38,695 and proceeds from the Silverdome reached \$37,915. These two projects alone accounted for over half of the year's income.

During the past fiscal year, the Associates funded a variety of items and projects from the college budget. Such items as library books, scholarships, land and car payments, computer equipment, and the college year-

book each received assistance from the Associates in amounts exceeding \$5,000. Smaller projects included equipment for science laboratories and the Child Development Center, athletic uniforms, chairs for the student center, and outfits for Autumn and the Pied Pipers. After beginning their fiscal year, the Associates added a substantial amount to their giving for use

with emergency roof repairs.

In her June report to the membership, Associates President Ginny May stated, "What a great year the Associates have completed! 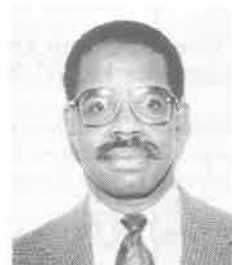

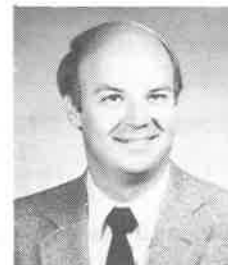

Coach Shinsky retires after 32 years

Bridging two generations of students, Coach Bill Shinsky ended his thirty-two year career with Michigan Christian College at the spring graduation ceremonies. Coach Shinsky joined the faculty in the fall of 1960 and touched thousands of lives as he worked with students from every year in the history of the college except the first.

Throughout the spring and summer months, friends honored Coach Shinsky at a number of events. Current students presented him with a memory book

at the final chapel of the year, and gave him a rousing ovation at commencement. A few days later, the college employees participated in a progressive dinner in his honor.

At Partnership Dinner XXI in Detroit, the Board of Trustees announced their plans to name the college athletic field in honor of Coach Shinsky. Later in June, alumni gathered on campus for a barbecue luncheon and presented Coach with a superb drawing by Bill Kocher of Rochester, New York, depicting Coach, his

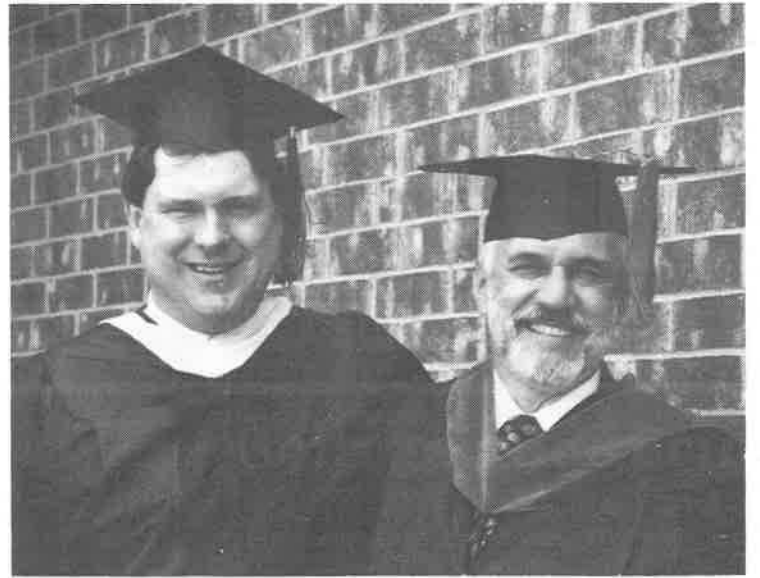
past activities, and his many admirable personality characteristics.

Raised in Dearborn, Michigan, Coach Shinsky entered Abilene Christian University as a married, adult student and earned his bachelor's degree at that institution. Upon graduation, he returned to Michigan and accepted a position with Michigan Christian College as instructor of physical education.

After a year of teaching and coaching, Coach Shinsky accepted an additional role as supervisor of boarding men and moved into the newly constructed Barbier Residence Hall with his wife, Joanne, and three sons. In 1967, he completed his master's degree at Wayne State University and officially began serving as MCC athletic director. While continuing to teach and coach, he also served as director of student life from 1971 to 1974.

During his diverse career at Michigan Christian College, Coach Shinsky led the men's basketball team from 1960 to 1970, and during the 1973-74 academic year. He initiated men's baseball in 1970, and coached the team until 1991. He also worked with intercollegiate teams for men in soccer, tennis, and track, and with women's teams in basketball, softball, tennis, and volleyball.

Beginning with the first MCC blood drive in 1966, Coach

Shinsky organized forty such efforts. Small numbers participated in the drives of 1966 to 1970 since blood was donated at an off-campus site. Beginning in 1971, the number of participants increased measurably when the bloodmobile moved to campus. During his recovery from a stroke in 1990, Coach's soccer team promoted the fall blood drive in his absence and collected eighty-eight pints of blood in his honor. The MCC community has donated over 2,000 pints of blood under Coach's leadership.

For over three decades, Coach Shinsky charmed students with his unique personality. Every week, he summoned those enrolled in his bowling class to the

bus or van with a shout of "Let's go bowlers." Any time individuals needed the attention of a noisy crowd, they could depend on Coach's shrill whistle. While regularly nicknaming many students and joking with most everyone, he always demonstrated a genuine concern for those around him.

Coach Shinsky and Joanne plan to remain in the Rochester area during their retirement, so the Michigan Christian College family will continue to benefit from their presence in the area. However, as stated in the 1962 *Totem Pole*, "We know he will go down in the annals of Michigan Christian College as its first, and greatest coach."
