Pre-registration keeps pace with applications

"Michigan Christian College's residence halls will be full this fall!" Toby Osburn, dean of enrollment services, relayed that exciting information to the Board of Trustees at their annual June meeting.

While applications continued to arrive in the Admissions Office at an exceptionally strong pace, a record number of current students pre-registered for the fall semester. Not since the early 1980's has the college maintained such a strong rate of applications, and the number of potential returning students has never reached a higher level.

"The last time we saw this kind of activity, our student body grew at a phenomenal rate, and that growth was built primarily around two-year degree offerings. With thirteen bachelor's degree majors being offered this fall, the possibilities seem almost endless for a substantially larger student body," Osburn stated.

Preliminary enrollment projections indicate that over 200 new students will be enrolling at Michigan Christian College this fall, with around 175 students expected to return for sophomore, junior, and senior-level studies. That projection places the student body size very close to that of the record year of 1977.

Reflecting upon the positive indicators for a larger enroll-

ment, Dr. Ken Johnson stated, "I believe our greatest strength for growth lies in the increase in four-year programs." He also noted the definite impact of a significant increase in scholarships.

Bachelor's in business receives state approval

Complete with trumpet fanfare, balloons, and the sound of fireworks, Bob Utley, chairman of the Board of Trustees, announced a landmark decision for Michigan Christian College at Partnership Dinner XXII in Detroit. Chairman Utley shared with dinner guests the exciting news of an April 21 decision by the Michigan State Board of Education that authorizes Michigan Christian College to offer the Bachelor of Business Administration degree.

Chairman Utley stated, "This is a milestone event in the life of Michigan Christian College. We commend President Johnson and his administrative team for their leadership in achieving this goal, and we thank the thousands of partners who have worked and prayed for this program since the college opened it's doors in 1959."

The college now awaits final program approval by the North Central Association, which is expected to take place this summer. Once granted, the college will award new bachelor's degree majors in business administration, management, human resource management, and vocational ministries.

"We've finally entered the home stretch in the approval process," stated Dr. Ken Johnson. "Development of the Bachelor of Business Administration degree signifies a strengthened commitment to a broad curriculum that not only meets the demands of the job market, but more importantly, allows our students to begin and complete their entire bachelor's degree in business on the campus of Michigan Christian College."

Michigan Christian College has awarded bachelor's degrees since 1980. Under existing authorization, MCC will offer nine bachelor's degree majors this fall, including counseling, psychology, social work, sociology, Biblical studies, Christian ministry, missions and evangelism, professional ministry, and youth and family ministry. The new authorization immediately will expand four-year majors to thirteen.

Dr. Johnson added, "Hundreds of students from the North are discovering that they no longer have to consider transferring to other colleges and universities to complete four-year degrees. They can stay in this region, study in a quality academic environment, and receive degrees in business, human services, Bible, and ministry. That benefits everyone in the region. Students, families, employers, and churches will be strengthened. That's the dream that brought Michigan Christian College into existence. God is continually working to turn that dream into reality!

Counseling Center director selected

Coinciding with the implementation of new bachelor's degree majors in psychology, social work, and sociology, Dr. Ken Johnson recently announced the selection of Dr. Leonard Knight as chairman of the new Human Services Department, and as director of a counseling center to be opened this fall on the campus.

A licensed professional counselor in the state of Michigan, Dr. Knight has provided counseling services for the students of Michigan Christian College since beginning work with the college in 1978. Originally serving as dean of students, he became academic dean in 1986. He led the college through the 1989 accreditation visit, and most re-cently through development and approval of the Bachelor of Business Administration degree. He is respected by his students and colleagues alike as an outstanding classroom teacher.

Dr. Knight received his bachelor's degree from Pepperdine University, and master's degrees from both Pepperdine and Fuller Theological Seminary. He holds doctorate degrees from both Fuller and Oakland University. He is a clinical member of both the American and Michigan Associations of Marriage and Family Therapists.

The new Counseling Center will be located in renovated fa-

cilities on the second floor of Gallaher Center. Initially, the center will provide personal and career counseling, and job placement services for MCC students. Dr. Knight, Ben Noah, and Sarah Reddick will provide counseling services in the center, in addition to fulfilling teaching responsibilities. Dr. Knight also plans to develop an association of Christian counselors in southeast Michigan through the center.

Recipients of Trustee Scholarship announced

Twelve students have been selected to receive Trustee Scholarships to Michigan Christian College for the 1993-94 academic year. Trustee Scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic ability, personal integrity, character, and involvement in church, school, and community activities.

Trustee Scholarships are awarded in amounts that cover either 100%, 75%, or 50% of the cost for tuition, room, and board. To apply for the award, applicants must achieve a composite score of 26 or above on the Ameri $can\,College\,Test\,(ACT)\,and\,have$ supportive high school grades.

For this fall, April Shepard of Jenison, Michigan, received the 100% Trustee Scholarship. Entering students receiving 75% awards included Shawn Brown of North Aurora, Illinois; Marcia Hoffmaster of Berkley, Michigan; Christopher Russo of Fraser, Michigan; Christopher Stampfly of DeWitt, Michigan; and Rebecca Stutts of Perrysburg, Ohio.

Other students received 50% Trustee Scholarships, including Steven Bowers of Clarkston, Michigan; Heather Carrier of Mt. Morris, Michigan; Jason Dover of Galesburg, Michigan; Heather Hanna of Warren, Michigan; Margaret-Ann Hibbard from Sarnia, Ontario; and James Spears of Plain City, Ohio.

College moves forward with planning projects


Continuing to chart the course of Michigan Christian College into the 21st century, board members and employees have completed significant steps toward updating the college's Strategic Plan and Campus Master Plan. Both documents, which establish the institution's goals and outline the strategies that the college will follow to achieve those goals, are of paramount importance as the college prepares for the next decade.

Dr. Ken Johnson stated, "With enrollment growth and expanded degree offerings, we must prepare today for tomorrow's challenges. Substantial progress and growth require detailed planning and careful consideration." Strategic planning is essential for success and growth of the college, and a functional campus master plan assures that facilities will be capable of supporting the college's needs.

In March and April, a group of administrators and board members reviewed and refined the first draft of the Strategic Plan, which was developed by a number of committees under the leadership of former President Milton B. Fletcher. The updated plan is now approaching completion.

The Strategic Plan will integrate all college functions, including academics, admissions, business management, development, student services, and auxiliary enterprises, specifying the management strategies to be used in pursuing specific goals. The goals and related completion dates established in this plan will span the next decade. The final plan will address enrollment growth, academic degree offerings, quality of campus life enhancements, and financial stability of the college.

Concurrent with development of the Strategic Plan, another committee of board members and employees has been appointed to update the Campus Master Plan. Meetings with city officials last spring revealed that the existing plan, developed in 1979, would require substantial revision to meet new city and environmental codes, as well as to address changing needs of the college.

After reviewing several proposals, the college engaged the services of TMP Associates, a professional architectural firm from Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, in June, to assist with preparations for a new master plan. Currently, the firm is evaluating

existing facilities to help college officials decide what improvements and additions must be made to meet future needs identified in the Strategic Plan.

The new Campus Master Plan will address facility needs and the capital requirements for future improvements. A detailed analysis of space for classroom, library, residence hall, and athletic activities will be included.

Committees plan to have both the Strategic Plan and Campus Master Plan completed by the end of the calendar year.

Vice presidents assume new duties

Dr. Ken Johnson recently announced the appointment of two new administrators, Joe Reddick, vice president of operations, and Mark Davis, vice president for capital development. In his new role, Mr. Reddick will supervise the business operations of the college, and teach business courses on a part-time basis. Mr. Davis will direct efforts focused on endowment and deferred gifts, capital and strategic development, and special projects.

Over the past thirteen years, Joe Reddick has served in positions as controller, vice president for finance, and chief financial officer for corporations in the oil industry. Prior to that, he held a position with Haskins and Sells, an international account-

ing firm, working as a tax specialist and serving or directing auditing teams for North American Rockwell, Allied Chemical Company, independent oil and gas producers, television and radio stations, and newspapers.

In addition to designing and installing computerized accounting systems for domestic and foreign subsidiaries, Mr. Reddick has presented several management seminars in the United States and Canada over the past few years. He received the highest ratings for his presentations.

Mr. Reddick received his Bachelor of Business Administration degree in accounting and finance from the University of Hawaii. He earned a Master of Business Administration degree in management from Wayland Baptist University. He holds professional affiliations with the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, Oklahoma Society of Certified Public Accountants, the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, and the Institute of Management Accountants.

Mark Davis has twenty years of management experience. During the past ten years, he served as a program and contracts manager on several capital expansions and major development programs. He earned various government awards and citations for developing innovative approaches to project development and management. Most recently, he directed several multimillion dollar advanced technology projects for the Aeronautical Systems Division of the United States Air Force.

Mr. Davis earned his Bachelor of Science degree with both a technical and business major from Wayland Baptist University. He later completed a second degree in religion. He holds a Professional Designation in Contract Management from the National Contract Management Association, and earned three government certifications, including project manager, contracts manager, and quality assurance manager.

The appointment of both Joe Reddick and Mark Davis affirms the college's commitment to build a strong management team to lead the college into the 21st century. Dr. Ken Johnson stated, "Both men possess outstanding qualifications. They have the very experience that Michigan Christian College needs.

Planned Giving Matters

Completing degrees with the college's thirty-third graduating class, eighteen students received bachelor's degrees from Michigan Christian College this spring. This group stood apart from previous bachelor's degree classes in both size and background.

Since 1981, Michigan Christian College has awarded seventy-six bachelor's degrees, an average of about six per year. Two employees retire from teaching

Accumulating a combined total of fifty-one years of teaching for Michigan Christian College, Dr. Leo Hindsley and Bernard Leshley recently retired at the close of the past academic year. At the same time, Kent and Debi Hoggatt, long-time employees whose service spanned nineteen academic years, also ended their work with the college.

Dr. Leo Hindsley began teaching history and French for Michigan Christian College in 1968. Prior to coming to MCC, he preached for churches in the metropolitan Detroit area, and spent six years as a missionary in Paris and Toulouse, France.

While living in France, Dr. Hindsley obtained a Certificat de Fracais Usuel from the Sorbonne at the University of Paris. He completed a bachelor's and master's degree at Wayne State University, and earned his doctorate from Michigan State University.

In 1980, Dr. Hindsley was one of ten individuals selected by the National Endowment for the Humanities for research among the presidential papers of Lyndon B. Johnson in the Johnson Library at the University of Texas. His study focused on French and American relations during the Johnson administration.

Except for a period of time from 1971 to 1974, Mr. Leshley taught piano lessons for the students of Michigan Christian College from 1964 through the past year.

Mr. Leshley came to the United States from Montreal, Quebec, where he received his bachelor's degree from the University of Montreal. He obtained a second bachelor's and a master's degree from Wayne State University.

Retiring from the Rochester School System in 1983, Mr. Leshley decided to continue his part-time work with Michigan Christian College. At nearly eighty years of age, he plans to slow his pace a bit and continue living in the Rochester area.

After graduating from Michigan Christian College in 1972, Kent Hoggatt returned to the college a year later to begin work as an admissions counselor. During that time period he also met his wife, the former Debi Tuck, who also worked as an admis-

Upon completion of that degree one year later, Kent returned to Michigan Christian College as director of financial aid and a part-time instructor of speech communication. In the years that followed, he became a popular speaker in area congregations.

In 1986, Kent changed duties at the college and began work as director of church relations. He also completed his master's degree at Wayne State University the following year. He changed roles at the college again in 1990, when he began duties as director of admissions, and returned to the Development Office in 1992.

After completing her bachelor's degree at Michigan Christian College and a master's degree at Wayne State University, Debi Hoggatt became the first director of the MCC Child Development Center when it opened in 1991. She also has taught child development courses at the college since that time.

Kent recently accepted a position as minister for the Church of Christ in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The Hoggatts have played a major role in the growth and development of Michigan Christian College. Their efforts will continue to be felt for years to come.
