## Enrollment surges as business degree receives accreditation

Following final approval of the Bachelor of Business Administration degree by the North Central Association, Michigan Christian College experienced a substantial enrollment increase for the second consecutive year. Both occurrences provided an air of excitement as the college opened its thirty-fifth academic year.

After receiving authorization from the Michigan State Board of Education to offer the B.B.A., the college submitted a report to the North Central Association in May, requesting a focused evaluation of the program. The review resulted in an August 6 action on the part of the association, extending the college's accreditation to include the four-year business program.

About one month later, scores of new faces filled the campus as the new academic year began. A total of 374 students registered for classes, the second highest number in the history of the college. The addition of fifty-five individuals to the student body represented a 17% increase over the previous fall, and a 46% increase over the fall of 1991.

Playing a major role in the pattern of growth, a record number of returning students en-

rolled for classes. The number of returning students increased by fifty-eight, while the number of full-time students increased by fifty-seven and the number of boarding students by fifty.

Paralleling an expansion in the number of four-year programs offered by the college, the number of juniors and seniors continued at its highest level. Many other students entered their first or second year in new four-year programs, bringing the total percentage of full-time students in business majors to 20%, and the percentage in human services programs to 19%.

Students came to Michigan Christian College this fall from Alaska, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New York, Ohio, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, and Wisconsin. In addition, international students traveled to MCC from Botswana, Canada, Iran, Japan, Korea, and Spain.

Supporting program expansion, several individuals joined the faculty this fall, including Dan Bateman, adjunct instructor of criminal justice; Lori Calkin, instructor of child development: Eric French, adjunct

instructor of music; Shannon Houtrouw, assistant professor of mathematics and computer science; Steve Jones, assistant professor of business; Michael Light, instructor of history; Sarah Reddick, instructor of sociology and social work; and Jay Wilson, adjunct instructor of Bible.

Fall transitions among the staff of Michigan Christian College included Bryan Davies, admissions counselor; Penny Davis, academic services assistant; Burt Rutledge, campus life director; Jay Wilson, supervisor of boarding men, and Mary Jo Wilson, counseling center receptionist.

## Associates reach three million dollar milestone

Friends of Michigan Christian College gathered in the Westside-Central Chapel on Sunday, October 3, to honor the Associates for reaching the \$3,000,000 mark in funds raised for the college. During the program, participants reminisced about past events, and recognized the hundreds of individuals who have played a part in the group's remarkable story of success.

In opening the program, Dr. Ken Johnson stated, "Without the Associates, the college might not exist today. We appreciate their willingness to give of themselves and their resources to help Michigan Christian College be a place that can train young men and women to serve the Lord while they are preparing for their careers."

As the special program continued, Dr. Otis Gatewood, founding president of the college, recalled early developmental stages of the Associates. Four former presidents of the organi-

zation, Mildred Freeland, Mary Etta (Stowe) Whitelaw, Mary Utley, and Beth Fisher, shared their fondest memories of working with the Associates. Ginny May, current president, introduced all of the former presidents of the organization, most of whom were present for the day's festivities.

Representing the student body, Melody St. Charles, an Associates Scholarship winner and a second generation student, thanked the Associates for their love and support. Susan (Ward) Kowalski, a member of the class of 1984 and a second generation Associate, thanked the group on behalf of the alumni.

While expressing the appreciation of the Board of Trustees, Chairman Bob Utley stated, "For thirty-four years these ladies have been the unshakable backbone of the college. Their love for Michigan Christian College, and their love for the souls of young people continues to be our inspiration."

### MCC plans for more growth with addition of new degrees

## Board member begins fortieth year

Providing continuity for the Board of Trustees of Michigan Christian College since its inception, Jim Thomas of Oregon, Ohio, recently began his fortieth year as a member of the board. He holds the distinction of being the only current trustee who served on the founding board.

In September of 1954, Hobart Ashby, who then preached for the Western Avenue Church of Christ in Toledo, invited Jim to attend a regional meeting of individuals interested in establishing a Christian college in the North Central region. At that meeting, participants selected nine men to serve on a board, including Jim Thomas.

In 1955, the trustees elected Jim as vice chairman of the board. For the next nineteen years, he served in that role, while Wheeler Utley acted as chairman. Jim stated, "Wheeler contributed a tremendous amount to the success of the college and it was a great experience working closely with him." As Wheeler prepared to move to California in 1974, Jim became chairman of the board, and served in that capacity for two years. Over the years, he has served on numerous committees, including the executive committee for twenty-five years.

Jim began working as a food buyer for Toledo's Bud and Luke Restaurant in 1938. After serving in the army from 1944 to 1946, he returned to Bud and Luke's, and bought the restaurant from Ron Rummel in 1950. He sold the restaurant to his son, Ron, in 1982, but still works there every day, as he has done for the past fifty-five years.

Jim and his wife, Raida, an

active Associate, have watched the college grow from a small student body of fifty-four in 1959, to an institution offering several four-year programs. Jim recently commented, "The association I have had with all the board members through these years has been very special to me. I do not believe you could find a greater group anywhere. I feel I have gained more than I have given."

Financial planners estimate that over 60% of our population does not have a valid, personal will at the time of their death. With two million Americans dying each year, that's well over a million people who allow their property and possessions to be dispersed as the state government and courts deem appropriate. Those who don't have a personal will, have the equivalent of a state-prepared will - a decree made by total strangers with no vested interest in one's property or personal desires. Protecting your loved ones and distributing your assets requires a personal will as part of your estate planning. Even a modest estate has valuable property to distribute and protect, property such as an automobile, house, furniture, cash and savings, personal belongings, or collectable items. A will assists in the security and financial protection that your family must have.

Many of our friends and alumni have found that their personal will provides an excellent method for a generous charitable donation. Even the smallest of estates today are discovering how easy it is to include a charitable bequest or gift as a part of the will. As a result of the bequest, the estate receives a charitable deduction equal to the fair market value of the gift. Charitable bequests may include a wide variety of gifts, from a specified percentage of the estate's worth, to more specific property such as a summer home or antique automobile. Some donors specify a dollar amount, for example \$10,000, as a charitable bequest.

A personal will is the foundation of good estate planning. For many, a charitable bequest provides an easy vehicle for donations. For others, charitable gifts such as gift annuities, trusts, or endowments, might better serve their needs. These giving methods will be discussed in upcoming columns.

## Festival carries Associates over goal

Proceeds from the annual Fall Festival queen contest allowed the Associates to reach the impressive \$3,000,000 mark in funds raised for Michigan Christian College. Prior to the September 11 festival, queen candidates and their supporters raised \$21,050 in queen's votes.

Throughout the summer, local chapters had sponsored dozens of projects on behalf of the queen candidates. Each dollar represented a vote for a particular candidate. Groups catered meals, sold crafts, and served countless portions of food.

Queen candidates included Margaret Feltner of the Pontiac chapter, Helen Slater of the Parkside chapter, and Velma Wineinger of the Hazel Park chapter. Festival Cochairman Benita Ward introduced Helen Slater as the 1993 queen during

a noon ceremony at the festival. Participants operated over fifty individual booths on festival day. Chapters receiving first place ribbons for decoration of booths included Metro in the food tent. Ypsilanti in the children's area. Oakland in the crafts tent, and Pontiac in the outside area.

The beautiful babies contest raised \$392 by collecting votes for baby pictures. Joan Long announced that Lauren Wheeler of Pontiac took first place; Dillon Whitlatch of Madison Heights. second; and Abbygail Samuels of Warren, third.

While hundreds participated in Fall Festival activities on campus, another group of volunteers staffed the Associates' mobile kitchen at the Art 'n Apples Festival in Rochester. To date, the Associates have collected \$34,844 from the Fall Festival, including proceeds from the queen's contest, and another \$2,200 from their weekend efforts at the annual Art 'n Apples Festival.

### Volunteers in Action



## Singing group begins third decade of service

Maintaining a heritage of outstanding musical performance, Autumn began its third decade of service as the new academic year opened at Michigan Christian College. Even though the group's membership and style of music have changed, Autumn has continued to delight audiences throughout the North Central region for twenty years.

In the fall of 1973, administrators selected a talented sophomore music major to work with the Admissions Office in forming a group that could serve as a musical ambassador for Michigan Christian College. That student, Randy Gill, later returned to the college in 1977 as the director of musical activities.

Since the concept of a small traveling ensemble with a repertoire of non-religious music was fairly new among the Christian colleges in 1974, half of Autumn's original membership had to be recruited. Eventually, five students banned together to form the first group, Randy Gill, Mark Smith, Lynne (Yoakum) Stewart, Kathryn (Boggs) Ahart, and Holly (Wiser) Rademaker.

Members of the first group selected the name Autumn to reflect the easy-listening style of their music, and to honor the beautiful season that they all enjoyed on the scenic campus of Michigan Christian College. The group performed such numbers as If You Could Read My Mind, Sing Medley, and Going Out of My Head, as well as a number of songs written by Randy Gill.

After weeks of preparation and a few individual performances, Autumn made its debut tour into Ontario and New York on February 11-13, 1974, in a Volkswagon van borrowed from Ken and Dorothy Stewart of Corunna, Michigan. By the end of the summer, the group logged over 12,000 miles in travel, performing for eighty-four audiences over a six-state area.

In 1981, personnel changes in Autumn led to the development of a summer group that performed only contemporary gospel music. Based upon the positive reception of that group, Randy Gill, musical director, and admissions personnel reshaped the image of Autumn in the months that followed.

In recent years, the experience of students in their junior and senior years, and the leader-

ship of Joe Bentley, current director of musical activities, have further strengthened Autumn. The current group is the first in Autumn history to carry identical membership over a two-year span of time.

Since the inception of Autumn in 1973, over 100 students have

served as members of the group. Even with regular changes in personnel and the variety of musical styles, each group has carried on the rich tradition of quality performance and outstanding service to Michigan Christian College established by the first Autumn two decades ago.

Sponsor Ben Noah inducted eleven members into the charter organization at Michigan Christian College.

Growing numbers of returning students at Michigan Christian College necessitated expansion of the A Cappella Chorus to sixty members this fall to accommodate new students. Joe Bentley, director of musical activities, auditioned fifty-two individuals for a limited number of openings. Strong interest in musical groups has stirred new discussion about adding a second choral group.

## Area ministers benefit from new degree option Initial response to the college's gan Christian College with a

Initial response to the college's new Professional Ministry Program exceeded expectations as ministers from throughout the Great Lakes region responded to program announcements during the past year. Dr. Ken Johnson, president of the college, stated, "The response to this program again highlights the vital importance of Michigan Christian College's role in training preachers for Northern churches."

Through the Professional Ministry Program, individuals with five or more years of experience in full-time ministry can receive a bachelor's degree from Michi-

gan Christian College with a minimal amount of disruption in their normal responsibilities. Vocational experience and course work completed in a variety of academic settings, including schools of preaching, is applicable toward this major, decreasing the number of class hours that many individuals are required to complete at MCC.

The program features a minimal residency requirement of eighteen credit hours that must be taken through Michigan Christian College, and only six of those hours require presence on the campus. Instructors of Michigan Christian College recently taught two seminars during special summer sessions that met the six hour requirement. Each seminar was concentrated into a one-week period of time.

Of fifteen individuals who received bachelor's degrees from Michigan Christian College last spring at age twenty-five or above, five completed the professional ministry major. Each one continued in his role as a local minister while completing the degree.

Making the professional ministry program as flexible as possible, concentrations can be developed to suit an individual's history, interest, training, and experience. College officials built the business curriculum around a number of faculty members who would be scheduled to teach business courses in the new degree program. In addition to the business faculty, they included instructors from three other disciplines to teach specialized business courses.

Steve Jones joined the faculty of Michigan Christian College in the fall as an assistant professor of business. Steve received his bachelor's degree from Pittsburg State University in Kansas, a master's degree from the University of Missouri at Columbia, and an M.B.A. from Southwest Missouri State University. He is a candidate for the Ph.D. from the University of North Texas.

In addition to teaching at both the university and secondary school level, Steve has published a number of articles for professional journals and for the United States International Trade Administration. He also has pro-

Most recently, Larry served the Upjohn Company as a training and information center consultant. In this role, he provided in-house microcomputer support and corporate training for Lotus 1-2-3, Harvard Graphics, DOS, and DataEase. During this time, he also taught classes on a parttime basis at the Stryker Center for Management Studies at Kalamazoo College.

## Renovations again enhance campus

Renovation projects have improved the appearance and utilization of Michigan Christian College's campus for the second consecutive year. During the summer months, maintenance personnel, student workers, and volunteers completed a number of tasks, ranging from basic painting to complete renovation of rooms in certain facilities.

After the selection of new colors, workers painted the entire exterior of Gallaher Center, the Gymnasium, and Science Center. They applied a natural tan on the large surfaces to match the campus brick color, and trimmed the buildings with a forest green. They then repainted the campus sign and trim on other buildings with the new colors, giving the campus a more contemporary appearance. In a memo to employees at the opening of the academic year, Dr. Ken

Johnson stated, "I have received more positive comments on the new green color scheme than any change in the last two years."

Adding to improvements on the outdoor areas of campus, workers removed numerous lifeless trees in the wooded areas near the buildings and around the campus lakes. They also replaced sidewalks near Gallaher Center, the Muirhead Library, and Science Center.

Indoors, maintenance personnel directed several improvements designed to accommodate the college's growing student body and the additional employees required to support new programs. In most cases, changes maximized the usage of space.

Workers completely renovated the former President's Office area in the upper level of Gallaher Center for the new Counseling Center. They built offices for three instructors who provide counseling services, and a waiting area for visitors to the center. Reassignment of other space provided the center with a room for individual testing and another for their receptionist.

In the Admissions wing of Gallaher Center, a carpenter built six work stations into a special room for use by the admissions counselors. Division of another room into two separate offices and new carpeting completed renovation of the area.

After renovation of storage areas for art and chemistry supplies, the Art Department moved to the Gatehouse and opened space for two additional lecture rooms in the Science Center. Workers then completely renovated both of those rooms.

Improving the usage of space that originally served lectureship crowds, maintenance personnel constructed two faculty offices in the foyer of the gymnasium. That change also opened space for the storage of athletic equipment.


