

MCC Chorus hosts third choral festival



Based upon the enthusiastic response of former participants and audiences alike, the MCC A Cappella Chorus sponsored their third annual Michigan Christian College Choral Festival on March 30-31. This year, the Dayton Youth Chorus, under the direction of Ralph Royse, joined the Metropolitan Detroit Youth Chorus, directed by George Oliver and Robert Martin, and the MCC Chorus.

MCC Chorus Director Randall Gill conducted several hours of intensive rehearsal with all three groups during the day on Saturday in preparation for a Festival Chorus presentation on Saturday night. Over 750 people filled the Avondale High School Auditorium for the conclusion. Each individual chorus presented three pieces before combining into the 200 voice Festival Chorus, which presented a grand finale of seven selections.

Large crowd shares annual festivities at Homecoming game

Students, alumni, staff, and friends gathered at the Rochester High School gymnasium on February 10 for the annual activities of the Homecoming game. A 77-64 loss to St. Mary's College of Orchard Lake did not damper the warmth of a beautiful halftime ceremony and the reunion of old friends.

Queen candidates entered the gym for the halftime ceremonies through a tunnel of candlebearers.
