Inaugural Business Team places first in competition

Following eight weeks of simulated business competition, the Michigan Christian College Business Team placed first in the college division of the Harding University Invitational Business Games. The MCC team received an impressive trophy after final judging of the games on November 18 in Searcy, Arkansas.

The computer-simulated games included eight sets of decisions, representing a two-year period of time for a business firm. Decisions included product marketing, unit producing, inventory financing, and other decisions necessary for a normal business

operation.

In the college division, York College placed second, Great Lakes Christian College took third, and Ohio Valley College and Northeastern Christian College rounded out the competition. Nearby Luckett Christian Academy also placed in the high school division of the games. Student volunteers spearhead drive for college support

Student volunteers made up about 85% of the calling force in the college's recent Phone-a-Visit Campaign, conducted from October 24 to November 22. The annual phone campaign generated \$134,000 in gifts and pledges, which will combine with another \$89,000 in mail pledges to help meet college operating expenses not covered by tuition and fees.

Five MCC students raised over \$1,000 each on five or more nights during the campaign. They included Mark Hammitt of Flint, Michigan; Wyn Hudson of Warren, Texas; Tracey Martinez of Charlevoix, Michigan; Winnie Shopshear of South Haven, Michigan; and Jim Whitlow of Danville, Illinois. An additional thirty-nine student callers reached a goal of \$1,000 on at least one night. Each received a great dinner for two at the Six Pence Restaurant in Sterling Heights.

Commenting on the campaign, MCC President Milton B. Fletcher stated, "We certainly appreciate all who called. The students worked especially hard. It is great to see their enthusiasm and interest."

Fiction and Facts about Financial Aid

Fiction. Recent federal and state budget cuts have practically wiped financial aid out of existence.

Fact. Although there have been some changes in eligibility requirements and funding levels, there is still a lot of aid available. In fact, a large majority of current MCC students are receiving aid, including various forms of grants, scholarships, loans, and work programs. The average aid package still covers nearly two-thirds of the cost for a full-time boarding student at MCC!

Fiction. Families must have a very low income level in order to qualify for financial aid.

Fact. Naturally, the lower the income, the more aid a student can receive. However, some current MCC students with a family income over \$38,000 are receiving some federal and state assistance to attend MCC.

Fiction. It is wiser to live at home and commute to the community college since this option only involves tuition costs.

Fact. The College Board News reports an average annual cost of \$3,400 at the community college. Many fail to take into consideration the cost of owning and operating a car on a daily basis, the usage of extra utilities at home, and those grocery bills! In addition, community colleges usually do not offer as much financial aid.

Fiction. It makes no difference when one applies for financial aid.

Fact. Sure, some types of aid are available regardless of date of application, but many are not. Michigan residents must apply for aid by mid-February in order to receive the \$1,300 Tuition Grant. Outstate students should apply for aid during the spring months. Later applicants still receive aid, but their packages include a smaller proportion of grant aid.
