

"CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: CHALLENGE AND CRISIS"

CHAPEL

Each morning the entire student body and faculty meet in a small, temporary chapel room, situated just off the cafeteria dining area. Space limitations do not permit comfortable handling of larger crowds. It is not practical to invite parents or residents of the community to hear the many interesting guest speakers who regularly visit the campus. Our dedicated students are highly enthusiastic about a separate chapel building which will be far more conducive to a worship atmosphere. Our campaign will allot \$100,000 for the chapel.

LIBRARY

The library now contains 13,200 volumes. The increasing size of the student body, with their wide range of interests and research requirements, makes it imperative that we expand the library to 20,000 plus volumes. This is a most urgent matter. Our campaign will allot \$45,000 for this purpose.

GYMNASIUM

At the present time the gymnasium has limited use potential. It is regularly used by the basketball team for practice sessions but competition games must be played at a local high school. The addition of bleachers will make the gym an excellent facility for spectator sports. With a winning basketball team this season and an aggressive intramural sports program and league program, interest in sports at the college is high and a more adequate gym is vitally important. With the addition of a stage and stage facilities, the gymnasium can be used by the Fine Arts Department and for large college and community meetings. Allotted for the gymnasium — \$50,000.

CAMPUS IMPROVEMENTS

Campus improvements are a must. Additional lighting around campus, expanded parking facilities, and track and field improvements are all high priority items. With ninety one beautifully wooded acres, room for future growth is assured but we must preserve and improve the grounds regularly. Allotment — \$50,000.

DEBT RESERVES

A sensible program of planned expansion has been brought about through the cautious use of bond issues. Immediate needs and favorable bonding ability have enabled the college to head off soaring construction costs implicit with longs delays, without placing an immediate financial burden on donors. According to plan, \$125.000 will be allotted for debt service.

OPERATING RESERVES

From time to time, funds have been borrowed from operating budget allotments to pay for improvements, repairs, expansion, and equipment. Judicious use of such funds has enabled the college to proceed with items that would have cost much more had they been delayed, without borrowing from outside sources. It is, of course, only prudent that operating funds be replaced and contingency reserves added. Allotted for this item — \$130,000.

IT COMES TO THIS

The current development campaign has been carefully timed to accomplish two objectives. *First*, to maintain a sound financial structure that has been the hallmark of Michigan Christian College since its inception. Failure to meet the goal in this campaign would, of course, result in a serious crisis that would force the college to consider alternative measures for continued operation as an independent, private institution which is Christian education oriented. Nothing would please opponents of Christian education more. *This must not happen*.

Secondly, the campaign has been timed to achieve maximum financial strength at a time when the college is seeking full accreditation with the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities. This is the final step of a carefully planned accreditation program that has taken years to achieve. Failure to meet the rigid financial standards of the Association could result in a five year set-back. Christian education must be synonymous with quality education and final, full accreditation will add immeasurably to the prestige and academic standing of Michigan Christian College.

THE VITAL ROLE OF LEADERSHIP GIFTS

Men and women with strong faith believe in the undergirding of our society through Christian institutions. Since 1959, Michigan Christian College has served hundreds of students, and through the maturing process, has provided society, and the Church, with some of its finest leaders. Michigan Christian College presents one of the most worthy and deserving causes possible for a contribution based upon a set of *lasting, timeless values*.

In order to fulfill the Michigan Christian College Development Fund it is necessary to make a clear distinction between public appeals, and a special appeal to a special group of concerned men and women. In a cause requiring a development fund in the range of half a million dollars, a much higher scale of giving is required to meet an objective of such magnitude. Amounts which donors are accustomed to giving each year to various causes, or checks which can be written from current funds, will not go far toward meeting the Michigan Christian College Development Fund.

Nevertheless, the objective is realistic. To provide less than half a million dollars would admit a lack of genuine Christian concern for one of our finest and most deserving institutions. To those who welcome this opportunity to give significant support to this worthy endeavor, the question naturally occurs, "How can we predict success in the search for the Michigan Christian College Development Fund from among friends of the college?"

Leadership giving is the factor which makes any campaign a success. We can predict that a large per cent of our total will be subscribed by a small per cent of the donors. Large gifts, made early in the campaign, have a marked and important effect on lifting the sights of all donors. In order to insure success in reaching the Michigan Christian College Development Fund objective, these gifts are needed:

1 gift of \$	100,000	3 gifts of \$	10,000
1 gift of	50,000	8 gifts of	5,000
1 gift of	45,000	10 gifts of	3,000
1 gift of	25,000	20 gifts of	1.500

These 45 leadership gifts, many designated for the naming of buildings and portions of buildings, will assure success in reaching the Michigan Christian College Development Fund goal. Designated gifts form the perfect opportunity for a memorial, or named portion of campus facilities. Each portion can bear a beloved name in perpetuity — the donor's name; a family name; the name of parents, children, husband, or wife; a former educator or friend; one's own choice for lasting honor — thus placing an important name in association with the good work of Christian education at Michigan Christian College forever.
