College establishes connection to Internet

Imagine being linked to over four million computer systems in over 146 countries! By fall, the students of Michigan Christian College will have such resources available to them on campus through the Internet, the most popular vehicle of the information revolution.

College officials recently announced to the student body plans to proceed with the first phase of Internet installation. This summer, the current IBM compatible workstations in the computer lab will be networked with a Unix operating system in order to allow the college to establish a connection to the Internet. In addition. terminals will be placed in the Muirhead Library to facilitate Internet access of specialized library resources.

In future months, the college plans to proceed with a second phase of Internet installation, which will allow student access to the computer lab network and to the Internet from rooms in the college residence halls. Lines to accommodate phase two already have been installed in the residence halls.

The Internet is a worldwide web of interconnected computer networks. By connecting thousands of separately administered educational, governmental, and commercial networks, the Internet provides individuals and organizations with unlimited opportunities for resource sharing and communication.

On the Internet, students will be able to access several university library catalogs, and then obtain additional resources through an interlibrary loan program already administered by the Muirhead Library. In addition, students will find numerous on-line books and indexes of magazine articles. Many of the articles include full-text and can be printed directly from the Internet.

The Internet also features thousands of databases and an incredible amount of statistical information from governmental, business, scientific, and educational sources. Often such data is more current than printed versions since the material is updated more frequently.

Michigan Christian College's connection to the Internet will feature Gopher, a menu-driven navigator, and Netscape, a browsing tool for the World Wide Web that includes full-color graphics and sound, along with text. Between the simple menu system, color graphics, and unlimited amount of information, many will find that "surfing the Internet" can be fun as well as educational!

The season included other NCAA colleges like Oakland University, Northern Michigan University, and Adrian College, and NAIA institutions like Siena Heights College and Madonna College. Even with the stiffer competition, the men's team ended their season with a 12-8 record.

In other areas of athletic competition, MCC hosted and participated in three national tournaments for the NSCAA during the 1994-95 academic year. Teams from several states traveled to the campus for finals in cross country, volleyball, and soccer. The women's cross country team from MCC took second place, and the soccer team took third at the tournaments.
