

Study abroad program adds new dimension to RC

On May 20, the first-ever Rochester College Global Educational Opportunities (GEO) expedition left from Detroit Metro Airport for London, England. During the next three days, the group saw many, many famous sights throughout the city. London is an incredible place, filled with intriguing history and immense architecture. It was the perfect place for the adventure to begin!

After the action-packed London experience, the group split in two. Seventeen people headed up the west coast of the United Kingdom to Aberdeen, Scotland, while the other five met up with students from Oklahoma Christian University and flew to Vienna, Austria, in the center of the European continent.

The Scotland group spent four weeks in Aberdeen taking classes and getting to know the area. Aberdeen, located on the North Sea coast, is home to such sites as Union Street, the Scottish Maritime Museum, and the ancient University of Aberdeen. Field trips were taken to other Scottish cities, like Edinburgh, St. Andrews, and Inverness, and also to other countries, including France, Ireland, and Wales. Other highlights included visits to Stonehenge, one of the seven wonders of the world, and Oxford University in England.

In Vienna, the group also divided their time among classes and various sight-seeing opportunities. Vienna is a city rich in history and culture, and is home to places such as Shönbrun Palace, the Staats Opera House, and the Danube River. Day trips throughout Austria were taken to Innsbruck, Mauthausen, Salzburg, and Melk. There were also several opportunities for weekend trips, during which the students visited a variety of places like Germany, Italy, France, the Czech Republic, and Hungary.

"It was an experience that changed all of our lives in so many ways," said junior participant Casey Arnett. "The most significant way is that now we are all so much more aware of this world. We saw buildings that have stood for a thousand years or more, and we walked in places where kings, queens, prime ministers, and religious leaders have walked. We saw God's majesty manifest in the rolling hills of Scotland, the splendor of the Austrian Alps, and the diversity of the European people. We bonded as a group, students and teachers alike, and we learned more than anyone ever could have imagined. This was an incomparable growing experience, and any person who participated would recommend it highly."

RC Community breaks ground for new library

Rochester College officials, local dignitaries, and more than 200 students gathered on August 30 to break ground for the new Ennis and Nancy Ham Library. Amid enthusiastic cheers, Rochester College president Ken Johnson, Board of Trustees chairman Howard Hagerman, the mayors of Rochester and Rochester Hills, and library benefactors Ennis and Nancy Ham turned over earth on the library site, which is located in front of the Associates Campus Center.

"Today, we are celebrating a major step of progress," said Dr. Johnson. "This is one more step in the direction of having a highly recognized, premier liberal arts college right here in our hometown." The new 17,500 square foot facility will provide twice the capacity of Muirhead Library and will feature classrooms and a state-of-the-art computer lab in an open and spacious setting. Construction will begin this fall on the building and is scheduled for completion by next August, Ennis and Nancy Ham, of Lansing, Michigan, donated \$1 million toward the \$4 million total construction cost.

In their speeches, the mayors of Rochester and Rochester Hills congratulated Rochester College for the groundbreaking and expressed great pleasure over the student turnout at the event. In his speech, Rochester mayor David Katulic compared the excitement shown by the student body to the kind of energy that usually surrounds a college basketball game.

"We're very grateful to the students who came out to the groundbreaking," said Dr. Johnson. "Next to our Christian heritage, I cannot think of anything that we as administrators could be more proud of than our students. This new library is for them."

The new library is the first project in the *Catch the Vision* campaign that will continue to improve the

Rochester College campus over the next decade. Upcoming projects include the construction of a new residence hall, parking lot, athletic fields, administration offices/music center, and gymnasium.

Teacher certification program reaches final stages

On May 17, 2001, the State Board of Education granted approval for the development of elementary and secondary teacher preparation programs at Rochester College. Most current education majors complete their degree programs on campus but must be certified through Madonna University in Livonia, Michigan. Now Rochester College has permission to develop a teacher certification program of its own, which means this year's freshmen class will receive state certification through Rochester College.

Education is the fastest growing major at Rochester College today. Currently there are around 110 students who are registered as education majors (including close to thirty who are new this semester). "Education majors at Rochester College will benefit from the very latest methods of teacher education," said Dr. Mike Westerfield, provost. "We're building a program where students will actually learn in elementary and secondary classrooms, from practitioners, rather than in a sterile environment where they're far-removed from what's really going on in contemporary education."

The faculty of the Education Department is

comprised of chairperson Vikki Bentley, veteran professor Linda Park, new addition Jim Dawson, and certification officer Lynne Stewart. Each of these faculty members is working in a different area of specialty that is sure to benefit education students greatly while making the transition to this new program run as smoothly as possible.

The 2001-2002 academic year is already shaping up to be a big one for the Education Department at Rochester College, In addition to the new advancements that have been established, the college also plans to have its independent set of requirements and regulations in place for fall 2002.
