Rochester College hosts ElderLink

Elders, former elders, spouses, ministers and church leaders are invited to attend the ElderLink Forum to be held on the Rochester College campus January 28-29, 2005.

ElderLink is a concept initiated by Charles Siburt, vice-president for church relations at Abilene Christian University. The mission of the forum is to "equip, encourage and link those who lead and serve as elders in churches of Christ."

Hosted by Rochester College and held in the theatre of the new Richardson Center, the forum will include four large group sessions. Randy Lowry, meditation expert from Pepperdine University, will address issues related to church conflict. Other speakers include Harding's Monte Cox, Greg Stevenson from Rochester College and Ken Greene. In addition, smaller, discussion-focused breakout

sessions will be organized.

Those in attendance can look forward to gaining understanding and pragmatic guides for their role in leadership. ElderLink also fosters a unique environment for leaders to share individual concerns and successes, and to learn from each other.

The ElderLink Forum is a growing ministry conference. Four forums were held throughout 2004, and three forums are already planned for 2005, expecting to draw an estimated 1,500 church leaders.

Staff & students serve on mission field

For Dr. John Barton, Rochester College faculty member and one of the organizers of this year's African internship program, spending this summer in Uganda was not only purposeful for the program but it also allowed him to visit a place he and his family call home.

After living in Uganda for 8 years, John and his wife, Sara, who serves as a campus minister at Rochester College, moved back to the States about 2 1/2 years ago. Having a heart for mission work, they helped organize an internship program for Rochester College students desiring to job shadow missionaries.

"The purpose of this intense six-week internship is to expose students to a broad view of full time mission work," Barton said. Experiencing the differences that missionaries must grow accustomed to is an important factor. Some of those differences include working among people who speak different languages and who live in villages without electricity and running water.


While overseas, the 14 Rochester College students encouraged churches and members by giving presentations at village meetings and teaching Bible classes for both missionary and village children. Chris Shields, Rochester College alumnus and admissions advisor, said he realized the power of God in Uganda. "I learned that relationships have nothing to do with skin color or communication, but the bond we have in Jesus Christ. This trip gave me new understand-

ing of Romans 14:11; every knee shall bow and every tongue confess," said Shields.

"Mission work is life transforming. It's about appreciating a world outside of our own: making a difference and being a presence for God where you are," said Barton. And of course, mission work can't be all work and no play. Some team members enjoyed white water rafting on the Nile River and a few brave souls bungee jumped.

Rochester College religion chairman Dr. Keith Huey and his 12-year-old daughter Allyson spent a fulfilling week serving in Tegucigalpa, Honduras. Huey's reasons for spending a second summer serving on the mission field are two-fold. He wants his children to become more globally aware and he enjoys assisting those who are less fortunate.

Huey helped construct buildings and homes, while his daughter organized games and Bible lessons for the village children. "Going outside of our comfort zone expands our horizons," said Huey. He plans to continue this family tradition with two of his daughters next year. "It's exciting to see them so interested in serving," he said.

No Longer Strangers October 15-17, 2004

What is the RESTORATION FORUM?

Restoration Forum helps answer our Lord's prayer for Christian unity and world evangelism: that they all may be one... that the world may believe. "The lectures are designed to bring unity and fellowship to church leaders and interested Christians by promoting understanding of our differences and commonalities. This event reaffirms our fundamental value: our oneness in Christ," said Dr. Mel Storm, director of graduate studies at Rochester College and co-director of Restoration Forum.

Restoration Forum brings together believers whose Christian ancestry can be traced through the American Restoration Movement (a.k.a. Stone-Campbell Movement) that started in Kentucky around 1804. The Disciples of Christ, Christian Church, and Churches of Christ are three streams of the movement.

Restoration Forum XXII is historic as two colleges, Rochester College affiliated with Churches of Christ and Great Lakes Christian College (Lansing, MI) affiliated with the Christian Churches, collaborate to host this year's event, October 15 –17. This year's theme is *No Longer Strangers* (Ephesians 2:19 - KJV).

The program opens with a Friday dinner for all conference guests to honor ministers and elders. Dr. Michael Westerfield, president of Rochester College, will share the *Vision of Rochester College within the Restoration Ideal*, followed by Richard Alexander's (Clovernook Christian Church) keynote address, *No Longer Strangers*.

Presenters from Churches of Christ include historian C. Leonard Allen, who will speak on *The Future of the Restoration Movement*, and leadership expert Lynn Anderson, who will deliver Saturday night's keynote address, *Unity Through Ministry*.

All restoration churches in the Great Lakes Region are invited to join in an area wide worship service at the Rochester Church of Christ building on Sunday, October 17 at 4:00 p.m. for the conclusion of the forum. Attendees will hear Rochester College President Westerfield and Great Lakes Christian College President Larry Carter share a message from Ephesians, My Prayer for the Church. As a symbolic affirmation of unity, a communion service will highlight the three-day event.

The forum will feature acappella worship, fellowship dinners, textual studies from Paul's letter to the Ephesians, seminars on contemporary issues in Restoration congregations, a presentation on the history of Restoration congregations in the Great Lakes region and entertainment programs. Storm added that people should participate in this year's Restoration Forum for three reasons: (1) to celebrate our heritage, (2) to affirm the best of who we are, and (3) to renew our historic commitment to the unity of all believers.


faith of our fathers by Dr. Vernon Boyd



The first Church of Christ among Afro-Americans in Detroit. During World War I, the first black members of Churches of Christ moved to Detroit looking for jobs to escape the poverty and discrimination they had known in the South. The first members attended worship in the Warren Avenue (white) church and heard Claud F. Witty preach as they sat on the back row. Witty was warm and encouraging to these members but not everyone was. The black members then began meeting in the home of Blanche Yowell on Superior Street. As the numbers grew, they rented a storefront at St. Antoine and Alexandrine, the location now swallowed up by Harper Hospital and Detroit Receiving Hospital.

G. P. Bowser likely took this picture as his young daughter, Thelma, is in the photograph. He was known for taking many pictures in his extensive travels in preaching. Bowser first came to preach in Detroit in 1920 and held eight gospel meetings during the next 10 years.
