# STUDENT APPLICATIONS FOR SEPTEMBER UP 52% OVER LAST YEAR — MCC IN EXPANSION PROJECTS

The MCC Admissions Office reports that student applications for admission in September are up 52% over the number of applications which had been received by that office at this time last year.

This increase is making additions to present facilities necessary to accommodate the additional dormitory students.

Professor Balderson received the B.A. Degree from David Lipscomb College and the M.A. Degree from Wayne State University.




the campus, just in front of but not obscuring, the Administration Building.

In answering questions with reference to the new Student Union Building which is to be built on Lake Norcentra (and for which excavations have been made), President Palmer said, "It is better to face the financial facts and be wise than to ignore these facts and begin a three-story building for which we do not have all the necessary funds. The modern, one-story building now under construction will take care of our needs in this area for next year and will be a useful building in many ways for years to come. We will build the three-story Student Union Building when the necessary funds are raised or pledged."

President Palmer said further, "We are glad and enthusiastic over the increase in student enrollment for next year. It is anticipated that the Student Union Building and the proposed Alma Gatewood Memorial Dormitory for Women will be a real need within the next few months. However, the immediate need for these major buildings has been somewhat met by the construction of the one-story Classroom and Student Center Building."



### CONSTRUCTION BEGUN ON NEW ATHLETIC FIELD

Earth movers, bull dozers, superintendents (sidewalk and otherwise) moved into the recently-purchased 54-acre land area adjacent to the present campus on Tuesday, July 20.

Dirt began to move from one portion of that field to another. In a few days, the corn field that was once part of the Gierok farm, will have been transformed into the new MCC Athletic Field.

Proposed construction will include a football and baseball field, regulation size track, and tennis courts.

Again, it is the pleasure of MCC to express appreciation to the Ladies Associates, that amazing and wonderful group of women which has done so much for the college. The funds for the Athletic Field and land-scaping pertaining to it come from the efforts of this organization.

Battle Creek was the scene of the successful Tri-State Youth Rally last November with over 700 young people in attendance. A similar rally is planned for November nearer the MCC campus when upwards of 1500 to 2000 young people are expected.

#### MEN'S CLUB PUSH UNIQUE PROJECT

With the cooperation of the Christian Memorial Estates Cemetery Association, the Men's Club of MCC have arranged for a private Burial Garden of 1800 2-site burial plots designated at the Michigan Christian College Memorial Garden.

The marker for this garden is shown left, and is named "The Rock of Ages" garden. If all of the 1800 sites are sold, MCC will receive a total of \$72,000. The college receives from the Cemetery and from the burial plot salesman a total of \$40 for each plot bought.

Mr. LePage, the Cemetery President, has already delivered several checks to the college through this project. However, he said sales people were needed badly to make the contacts. Men or women can do this work and, even working part time, can make for themselves a sizeable commission. Mr. LePage will train any person interested.
