\$8.2 Million Five Year Goal

Silver Anniversary Campaign Underway

"The Silver Anniversary Campaign is officially in motion!" With these words at the close of the thirteenth annual Partnership Dinner, President Milton B. Fletcher launched the largest fund-raising campaign in the history of Michigan Christian College.

The *Silver Anniversary Case Statement* outlines the plans and goals of the Silver Anniversary Campaign. "Building upon the strong foundation laid by so many over the past twenty-five years, Michigan Christian College enters into a new era of service. To meet the needs of that era, the Silver Anniversary Campaign is launched — 'A Plan To Achieve.'" This new era presents the volunteer leadership, friends of the college, administration, faculty and staff with the most challenging campaign in the history of Michigan Christian College. It will be achieved if the spirit and dedication shown in the past twenty-five years is continued through the next quarter century.

The \$8,200,000 Silver Anniversary Campaign is divided into three basic areas: \$3,000,000 for the Operational Supplement, \$3,400,000 for the Permanent Endowment, and \$1,800,000 for the new physical facilities and renovation. The \$3,000,000 Operational Supplement goal will be generated from currently operating fund-raising programs — Salary

Sharing, Partnership, Dinner, Associates and Men's Club contributions, and out-of-state Annual Fund Campaign Dinners — the combination of which now raise approximately \$600,000 each year. Therefore, over the five-year period this \$3,000,000 Operational Supplement goal will require no new out-of-pocket money.

The \$3,400,000 Permanent Endowment goal is primarily being sought through Estate Planning programs. Some outright gifts will be contributed toward this goal, but most of the Permanent Endowment money will come from maturing estate plans that include MCC as a beneficiary. Consequently, virtually no new out-of-pocket money will be required to meet this goal of the campaign.

Development of a strong permanent endowment fund is a high priority to insure the stability of the institution in the event of difficult economic times. A minimum of \$10,000 per student in the permanent endowment funds is considered to be a general rule of thumb among institutions across the country. As of June 1, 1983, the Permanent Endowment Fund of Michigan Christian College amounted to \$279,000 or approximately \$750 per student.

It is estimated that 85% of all permanent endowment funds in American educational institutions are generated by estate gifts. Therefore, the Silver

Anniversary Campaign will encourage estate planning.

The \$1,800,000 needed for the facilities segment is the only portion of the overall goal which will have to be raised over and above the money already being contributed to the college. This aspect of the campaign will have three major projects as its goals: (1) construction of a Library and Science Learning Center; (2) renovation of present facilities; and (3) development of a faculty/staff housing complex.

Construction of the new library and science learning center is in keeping with recommendations from the North Central Association to continue expanding space and equipment available in these areas. The Library and Science Learning Center will be located near the front of the campus, west of the main access drive. Its design will allow the addition of two more wings at a later date. The projected cost for the original building and equipment is \$1,181,270.

The projected new two-story facility will contain two wings with a total of 14,000 square feet. A little over half of this space will be dedicated to the new library. Plans call for adding about 1,000 volumes each year during the campaign to the current collection. Other features include areas for *(Continued on Page Two)*

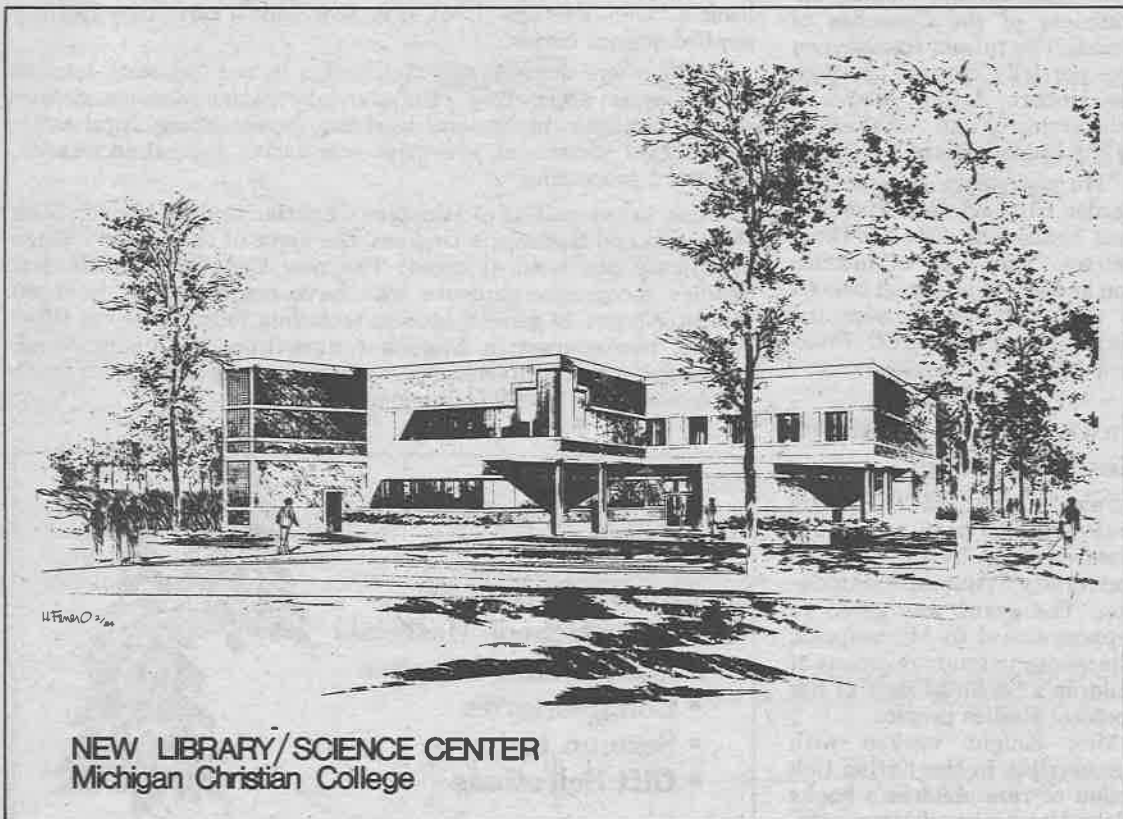

Annual Fund Dinner Generates Support from Abilene

"The people in Abilene are most generous, and Dr. Teague and the rest of the ACU staff are to be applauded for their unselfish spirit. We appreciate them letting us come to their campus each year to raise money for Michigan Christian," stated President Fletcher.

The exact total of contributions for the June 25 Abilene campaign, which is part of the overall Silver Anniversary Campaign, is not yet available.

Dr. John C. Stevens, Chancellor of ACU, was the featured speaker. MCC's Autumn performed and President Fletcher presented a State of the College report as well as introduced the Silver Anniversary Campaign to the Abilene area. MCC's new audio-visual presentation, "A Plan to Achieve," was shown as the evening came to a close.

Spring Bible Term Very Worthwhile

"Most worthwhile" and "very helpful" were comments often expressed by those attending this year's Spring Term for Church Leaders at Michigan Christian College.

Three classes were offered each week during the two-week term. Dr. Loren Gieger taught classes on I and II Thessalonians, Dr. Len Knight taught classes in personal counseling, and Coy Roper taught classes dealing with several of the minor prophets.

Once again the Garden City, Michigan congregation provided scholarship monies for ministers of the Churches of Christ. The tuition for the men was partially covered through the Hobart Ashby Memorial Scholarship Fund established by the congregation.

"We appreciate so much the Garden City elders' decision to once again help us offer these courses. This kind of instruction and study is a great benefit to the churches all over the Midwest," stated MCC President Milton B. Fletcher.

Fawn Knight Awarded Research Grant

Fawn Knight, MCC English professor, has been awarded a research grant by the Oakland University Alumni Association. The grant was given to support travel to Minneapolis, Minnesota to study revisions of children's books as part of her doctoral studies project.

Mrs. Knight worked with manuscripts in the Kerlan Collection of rare children's books at the University of Minnesota.

private and group study, a typing studio, and a new Learning Lab. The science department portion of the new facility will feature a tiered lecture hall, video equipment, new biology and chemistry laboratories with the latest equipment, as well as preparation rooms, offices, and storage areas.

Construction of the new facility will free considerable space in the present library and science buildings. Renovation plans for these facilities include converting the present science building into a Fine Arts Center to house all music and art activities, and converting the existing library space to house academic and administrative offices. The entire cost of these projects is estimated at \$100,000.

The final goal of the facilities segment of the campaign will be the development of a faculty/staff housing complex to be located on East Avon Road, just one-half mile from campus. This will allow college employees to purchase housing in the Rochester area at a price in keeping with their income range. The college plans to contract with the employees to construct homes in the proposed subdivision, while retaining title to the land by lease agreement. Agreements will be made giving the college the right of first refusal on the resale of any homes in subsequent years.

Site development and mortgages on the first six homes are projected at \$518,730.

During Partnership Dinner XIII, J. Robert Utley, Chairman of the Silver Anniversary Campaign, announced that advance gift commitments of \$1,716,817 had already been made toward the \$8,200,000 goal.

"With this kind of a beginning the overall campaign is in good shape," commented President Fletcher. "It will not be easy, but it looks as if exciting things will be happening in the not too distant future."

Jurney, Roper Elected Rotary Officers

Dr. Larry Jurney, Academic Dean of Michigan Christian College, has been elected president of the Rotary Club of Auburn Hills. Coy Roper, MCC Bible professor, is the new vice-president of the local chapter of the international service organization.

For the past seven years the group has made annual contributions of \$400-\$500 to Michigan Christian College. Each gift represents approximately eleven percent of their total charities' budget for one year. In recent years, the contributions have been directed to the new business and computer science programs at MCC.

New Majors, Minors Add Depth to Curriculum

Beginning with the Fall 1984 term, a student may select from three majors in the Bachelor of Religious Education program. The choices include the Biblical Studies Major, the Biblical Studies Extended Major, and the Christian Ministry Major. Students may choose counseling, Greek, or history as a minor. Plans call for business to be added to the list of possible minor choices for BRE students in the fall of 1985. Those students enrolled in the Biblical Studies Extended Major, however, are not required to declare a minor.

Students who complete the major and support courses for one of the Applied Science majors with at least a "C" average (2.00) and complete the general education and elective courses with at least a "C-" average (1.75), may now earn a certificate in their applied science major.

MCC offers degrees and certificates in the following applied science areas: accounting, computer information systems, cosmetology management, general business, homemaking, legal assistance, legal secretarial, executive secretarial, general secretarial, and word processing.

Also, in recognition of Michigan Christian College offering both Associate and Bachelor's Degrees, the name of the Junior College Certificate has been changed. The new Certificate in General Studies recognizes students who have completed at least 60 semester hours of general studies including four courses of Bible survey, two courses in English composition, a communication course and a course in ethical perspectives with a cumulative grade point average of "C-" (1.75) or higher.

Message from the President



Dear Friends:

As of May 31, 1984, the 1983-84 year came to an end. With your help we have been able to close the fourth consecutive fiscal year "in the black." This is also possible because unselfish employees have been willing to work for less than they could earn elsewhere. Why? Because they are dedicated to a cause that is greater than themselves. However, for Michigan Christian College to attract and hold employees over long periods of time, she must make every effort to improve the salary scales of qualified people. As we move into the second quarter century one of our goals is to focus on the "living" assets of the institution — namely, people. Without qualified and dedicated employees all other physical assets begin to appear rather insignificant. People support is one of the heaviest expenditures in the budget.

We must do a better job of retaining good faculty, staff, and administration in order to continue offering a program of the highest quality. As progress is made; as employees are retained; as academic programs are enriched, not only must the giving programs be highly successful, we must also call on those who benefit directly: namely, the students. MCC (and one other Michigan private educational institution) is measurably lower in cost than all other Michigan private schools. In fact, we are very near in cost to those four-year public institutions who are supported by the state. Our charges are thirty to forty percent lower than other private institutions in Michigan and the other Midwestern states.

The Operating Budget for 1984-85 is \$2,440,243 or \$6,686.00 per day. The budget is actually \$20,327 lower than 1983-84. It contains a modest raise for employees, and it became necessary to raise tuition, fees, room and board by five percent. Even with the increase Michigan Christian College charges students less than all but one of our sister senior colleges and is competitive with all our two-year sister colleges. Each of our brotherhood schools has budget increases for 1984-85. We believe our slight increase is reasonable and we know it is in line with other institutions.

The volunteer contributors of Michigan Christian College have caught the vision of the importance of sacrificial giving. They have rallied to the call time after time, even to the point that various programs of giving have become "traditions". Examples are the "Partnership Dinner," "Salary Sharing," the "Associates," and the "Men's Club". "Traditions" become powerful ingredients for success. Michigan Christian College expresses "thanks" to you, our clientele, for supporting the institution and for making these programs traditional. Approximately twenty-five percent of the operating budget has been supported by contributions from some 2,400 annual donors. They continue to respond and we must continue to seek that response.

With God's blessing and your sustained help we will continue to balance the budget and will succeed with the Silver Anniversary Campaign.

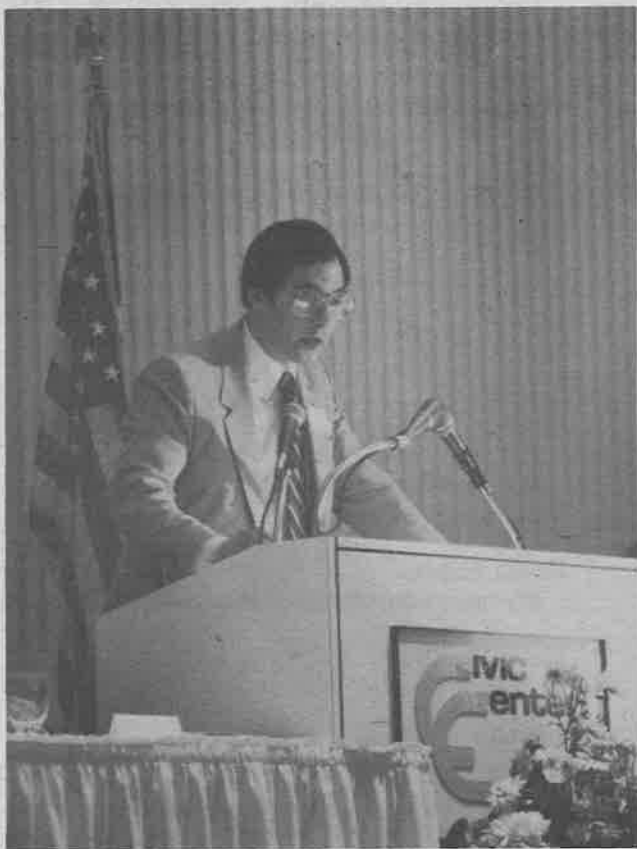

Partnership Dinner Attracts Record Crowd

Saturday, May 12 brought nearly twenty-four hundred people to Detroit's Cobo Hall for Michigan Christian College's thirteenth Partnership Dinner.

Christians from congregations throughout Michigan, as well as northern Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio enjoyed a delightful evening of fellowship during the annual fund-raising event. Comments such as "What a fantastic evening!" and "This is the best so far!" were expressed often as the record crowd mingled and renewed acquaintances.

"The money raised tonight will go a long way towards paying off the debt on the Alma Gatewood dorm," stated President Milton B. Fletcher. "Thanks to the continued hard work and dedication of hundreds of people, Michigan Christian College is in its best financial position ever."

The evening began with dinner being served from 5:45 until 6:45 p.m. Devotional activities were underway at 7:00 p.m. Dr. Howard Hagerman, a member of the Board of Trustees and the Holmes Road congregation in Lansing, led the invocation.

Congregational singing followed with Phil McCullough (Class of 1967) of the Midland congregation leading "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" and Dale Dover of the Garden City congregation directing, "A Wonderful Savior." Jim Bruce, a 1965 MCC graduate, member of the Board of Trustees, and a member of the Birmingham congregation, then read the scripture from Philippians 3:12-16. "Soldiers of Christ Arise," led by Dennis Rainsberger (Class of 1976) of the Flanders Road congregation in Toledo, and prayer led by Royce Dickinson, first vice-chairman of the MCC Board of Trustees and a member of the Ecorse congregation closed the devotional.

Presentation of the Alumnus of the Year Award followed the worship period. Dr. Jerry Rushford, Class of 1963, received the honor. Randy Coss, President of the MCC Alumni Association presented the award.

Dr. Rushford is currently an Associate Professor of Religion at Pepperdine University in Malibu, California and also serves as a minister of the University congregation in that city. Dr. Rushford, a Detroit area native, taught Bible and coached basketball at MCC from 1969 to 1972. He earned his Ph.D. at the University of California at Berkley.

Jesse Clayton, Director of Development and coordinator of the event, thanked those connected with PD XIII and reported highlights of the campaign. "The chairmen have worked so hard and everyone has done a great job putting this together. We appreciate so much the interest shown by all those who participated in the dinner."

Dearborn's Parkside congregation led the total ticket sales with 180 tickets sold. One hundred twenty members attending from the Rochester congregation represented the largest attendance of any group.

Eleven congregations which had not attended in 1983 were represented. Three of these were first time guests. Eleven congregations doubled previous year ticket sales in 1984, while another seven multiplied by four to eight times. Seventeen congregations sold at

least fifteen more tickets this year than last year.

A musical presentation by the MCC A Cappella Chorus, directed by Randy Gill, was highlighted by a "Celebration of Allegiance." This moving, patriotic selection featured Dr. Larry Journey and a dramatic reading of the Preamble to the Constitution.

Keynote speaker, Dr. Paul Faulkner, presented thoughts regarding qualities that make a winner. Dr. Faulkner is well known for his work with Dr. Carl Brecheen in the Marriage Enrichment program. He is director of the Marriage and the Family Institute at Abilene Christian University and teaches Bible and personal and marriage counseling.

Introduction of the Silver Anniversary Campaign, A Plan to Achieve, highlighted the evening. President Fletcher presented the case statement of the campaign (see related story on Page One) and then introduced volunteer members of the campaign leadership who were seated at the head table. J. Robert Utley, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, as well as Chairman of the Silver Anniversary Campaign then announced that \$1,716,817 had already been pledged toward the 8.2 million dollar overall campaign goal.

Closing ceremonies featured an outstanding audio-visual presentation of over 500 slides depicting MCC's successful twenty-five year history and visualizing goals of the campaign. Immediately following this dramatic presentation, President Fletcher declared the Silver Anniversary Campaign officially in motion. Dr. Paul Southern of the MCC Bible faculty offered the benediction.

Twenty-fourth Commencement Honors Ninety-six Graduates



Sunny skies and warm temperatures provided a perfect background as Michigan Christian College conducted Commencement Exercises Saturday, May 12. The 11:30 a.m. ceremonies were held in the traditional setting under the campus pines.

Dr. Jerry Rushford, an Associate Professor of Religion at Pepperdine University in Malibu, California addressed the graduates. He also serves as one of the ministers of the University Church of Christ in Malibu. A native of the Detroit area and a 1963 graduate of Michigan Christian College, Dr. Rushford returned to teach Bible and coach basketball at MCC from 1969 to 1972. He earned his Ph.D. at the University of California at Berkeley and is known for his work in restoration history.

Using the eighth chapter of Romans as his text, Dr. Rushford urged the graduates to determine their destinies in Christ and challenged them to become great Christians.

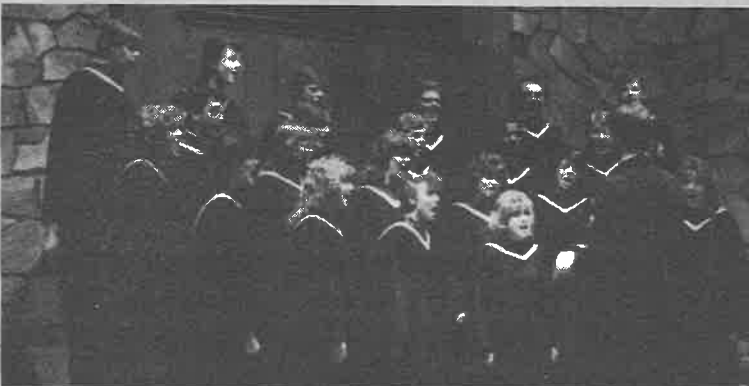
Co-valedictorians Kelley Garrison of Mt. Pleasant, Michigan and Keith Ziegler of Wellington, Ohio also addressed the audience. Each had earned a perfect 4.00 average in their studies at MCC. They shared special memories of MCC with their fellow graduates.

Ninety-six graduates received a total of ninety-seven degrees or certificates. Six students were awarded the Bachelor of Religious Education degree. These included: Randall Dill of North Manchester, Indiana; Henry Doty of Walled Lake, Michigan; R. Dwaine Estes of

Poughkeepsie, New York; William Lowmaster of Birmingham, Michigan; W. Keith Richards of King of Prussia, Pennsylvania; and Anthony Russell of Detroit, Michigan.

Associate in Arts degrees were conferred upon forty-five graduates. Twenty Associate in Science degrees were awarded. Sixteen students were granted the Associate in Applied Science degree. Junior College Certificates were awarded to ten students.

Nineteen of the graduates earned honors for their academic achievements. Seven achieved a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.85 and seven others achieved at least a 3.60 average. Five more students achieved at least a 3.30 average.

A Cappella Chorus Tours Washington D.C. and Kentucky Areas

Visits to several historical sights in Kentucky and Virginia enriched the recent spring tour of the Michigan Christian College A Cappella Chorus. Their May 13-25 tour included fourteen performances in Kentucky, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, and Ohio.

Following opening performances in Dayton and Louisville, the chorus began their first week by visiting the Cane Ridge Meeting House of the Restoration Movement and the Kentucky Horse Park. The following day included several hours at the restored Shaker Village of Pleasant Hill, where the group was asked to sing a couple of songs in the old Shaker Meeting House. The moving music sung in that resounding room brought tears to the eyes of the village tour guide as well as members of the chorus.

A morning visit to the Cumberland Falls preceded a beautiful drive through the Smokey Mountains en route to Taylors, South Carolina. Two days later, the group explored Colonial Williamsburg before moving on to Norfolk and visiting the Atlantic Ocean.

Performances in Alexandria and Falls Church, Virginia allowed for two days of touring in the Washington, D.C. area. The first day included stops at the Arlington Cemetery, major monuments, and the U.S. Capitol. Students spent most of the next day in the museums along the mall.

After returning to Ohio, some of the chorus visited the Football Hall of Fame on Thursday, while others shopped in a local mall. An early start on the next morning allowed for a fun-filled day at Cedar Point before the final performance in Cleveland that evening.

The chorus returned to campus on Saturday with a deeper appreciation for their country, the church in other communities, and their fellow students. Tentative plans for next year's spring tour include visits in scenic Northern Michigan, Wisconsin, and the Chicago area.

Special Honors Program to Begin this Fall

Since about one-third of the student body of Michigan Christian College enters their freshman year with a scholarship for outstanding high school grades or ACT scores, a special honors program will begin this fall to challenge students who have the ability to do excellent academic work.

To enter the program, the student must have scored a minimum of 23 in the English and social studies subtests of the ACT examination. Due to the nature of the required courses in math and lab science, the student must also have an extensive high school background in these areas.

A student in the honors program will be pursuing an Associate in arts degree. The curriculum will include four new courses in English composition and history, in addition to more challenging course requirements in Bible, literature, physical education, science, and mathematics.

The students also have the opportunity to study in areas of special interest and training among the MCC faculty. For example, the honors students will be taking a Seminar in Issues of World and American History, taught by Dr. Leo Hindsley, who earned his doctorate in international relations. He lived in France for many years, and has had several National Endowment for the Humanities grants.

Even the physical education course required in the honors program is special. Students must take conditioning, which helps them learn how to develop and maintain a lifelong program of physical fitness.

The nature of the courses required for the program is such that students will be well prepared for liberal arts and pre-professional majors during their last two years of college. In fact, it is likely for them to be offered extensive scholarships for the last two years of college because they will have already demonstrated the ability to complete high-quality academic work at the college level. Furthermore, the requirements of the program are designed to facilitate transfer to other colleges and universities, especially other Christian colleges.

The student completing the Honors Program will receive special recognition on their MCC transcript and diploma. More information about the program may be requested from the Admissions Office.

In 1980, the National Center for Educational Statistics reported that the average American female with a college degree earned thirty-one percent more than a female with a high school diploma. Men with a college degree passed those with a high school diploma by twenty-five percent.

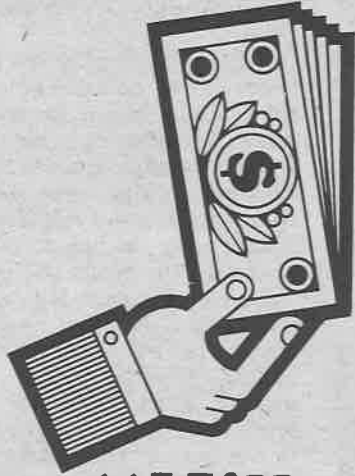
