Homecoming is always a special occasion at MCC, and this year was no exception.

A week of spirit and fun-filled activities preceded the Home-coming basketball game on Saturday, February 2.

Message from the **President**



Michigan Christian College is nearing the end of her 26th year. Across the years, the institution has experienced highs and lows in every operational area plus economic problems that would normally put an institution out of business. On the other hand, she has experienced great successes, times when recruitment was easier than at other times, and moments of great inspiration during Lectureships, Partnership Dinners, Commencements, and workshops. In short, we have "run the gamut."

For the last few years institutions of higher learning have been facing declining enrollments primarily because of fewer available students. There was a tremendous influx of students who entered higher education institutions immediately after World War II as servicemen were released. Their potential impact on the job market led the Government to emphasize and support educational programs everywhere. A few years later the post-World War II babies arrived on college campuses in the middle 60's at which time the largest enrollment ever in higher education began. Then the post-Korean War and Vietnam War babies arrived and extended large enrollments through the middle 70's. Since 1976/77, enrollments have declined. Evidence of a decreased population of young people can be seen as school buildings have been closed and sold. Consequently, colleges and universities in the nation today are in the throes of fewer available students. Public higher education is especially suffering because of this perplexing situation, but also, private Christian colleges are "feeling the pinch." In Christian education, however, we have a unique opportunity to overcome this downward trend in enrollment because we can definitely indentify our market and because apparently only about 15-20% of the young high school graduates in Christian families are going on to Christian colleges. That being the case, an 80-85% potential market is untouched. We just need to do a better job of selling young people and parents on the proven advantages of Christian education and on Michigan Christian College.

We need your help! Our admissions and recruiting staff is doing an outstanding job, but all of us who work in and support Christian education need to join hands in selling the concept to more students and parents. Therefore, we are attempting to employ every reasonable method of identifying students and selling them on the concept. What can you do to help? May I make some suggestions.

- 1. Personally encourage your high school young people to consider Christian education at Michigan Christian College.
- 2. Forward to Mr. Larry Stewart, Director of Admissions and Recruitment at MCC, the name, address, city, state and zip code, telephone number and year of high school graduation of all high school students you know. A form is provided immediately to the right for your convenience. Don't worry about duplicawe will catch them!
- 3. Do not assume that any of those young people would not be interested. Please let them make that decision and help us get in contact with them.
- 4. Take a personal interest in high school students. Bring them to the campus on special occasions such as Celebration in Song, High School Day, Lectureship, or just for a campus visit. Contact our Admissions Office to arrange a campus tour.
- 5. Personally speak to high school students about Christian education as evidence of your interest in their lives. You just might be amazed at the impact your interest in them will have.

We look forward to hearing from many of you in response to this appeal. Across the years you have responded by supporting MCC in so many ways. Students are our products! Without them, we cannot operate or be of service. With them, we can continue offering a high-quality education program and have profound influence on the great Midwest, both from the standpoint of community and church.

"I did 40 laps — how about you?"

Over 200 "joggers" gathered at the Macomb Community College Physical Education Center in Warren on Feb. 16 to participate in the second MCC Men's Club Jogothon.

After Mr. Ray Jeffers, president of the fund-raising organization, welcomed the participants, Mr. Duane Harrison, coordinator of the event and the day's master of ceremonies, got the jog started promptly at 1

For the next hour, a few ran and a few jogged while most walked around the one-eighth mile enclosed track. Each participant had contacted at least twenty-five potential sponsors, asking them to pledge from 50 cents to \$100 per lap to help Michigan Christian College.

One who was able to find many eager sponsors was Mr. Lenard Losiewicz, husband of MCC freshman Laurie Losiewicz. Mr. Losiewicz is a quadraplegic as a result of a car accident four years ago and wanted to participate in the Jogothon because it was the first time since his injury that he had been able to do some-

thing completely on his own. Many of his doctors were among those who sponsored

"Betcha never thought I'd do 10 laps," a tired, but happy, Mr. Losiewicz said to Mr. Dennis Miller, a Men's Club worker from Echo Meadows, as as he rolled his wheelchair to the door after his last lap.

Mrs. Losiewicz said her husband's participation was not easy but that she was proud as she watched from the sidelines.

"I'd kiss him every time he came around," she said. "He'd slow down after coming around that back stretch."

As the afternoon's event came to an end, the tired joggers left the track for cookies and glasses of orange drink and comparisons of their number of completed laps.

"Once again, MCC supporters rallied to the cause," Mr. Harrison said. "A lot of people worked hard to make this another very successful fundraiser.

"To date over \$22,000 has been billed and over \$15,000 has been put in the bank. All of this money will be turned over to the college to help meet the budget requests given the Men's Club earlier this school

"I want to say again how deeply we appreciate all of those who helped. It was a great day made possible by a lot of great people.'

Sponsor pledges are still being received, and invoices for those pledges are continually being mailed.

The groundwork is already being laid for the third MCC Men's Club Jogothon.

FIRST WEEK COURSES (May 28-31)

Great Bible Doctrines I. A study of several of the great Bible doctrines such as Christ, the Holy Spirit, the Gospel Plan, the Church, and Last Things, taught by Dr. Loren Gieger for one hour of credit.

Techniques of Counseling I. Methods of gathering, analyzing, and interpreting case data in counseling. The analysis of dynamics of counselor-client relationship, and interviewing techniques, taught by Dr. Leonard Knight for one hour of credit. Also available in a three-credit hour option, PSY 323, which requires the completion of both counseling courses in the special spring term plus an additional hour of independent study, paper, and project that must be completed by August

Biblical Storytelling. Designed for Bible school teachers who are interested in learning to tell the great events of the Bible in interesting and informative ways. Individual, group, and dramatic storytelling approaches, taught by Dr. Larry Jurney for one credit hour.

SECOND WEEK COURSES (June 3-7)

Great Bible Doctrines II. A continuation of the first week's doctrine course, again taught by Dr. Loren Gieger for one hour of credit.

Techniques of Counseling II. A continuation of the first week's counseling course with Dr. Leonard Knight for an additional one hour of credit.

SPECIAL FEATURE THIS YEAR

For the first time, Christian women have a spring term course which is specifically designed for them. The Biblical Storytelling course is one which will help every Bible school teacher and parent to become more effective in relating the great lessons of the Bible.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Meeting Times. All classes meet from 9 a.m. until noon except on Tuesday, May 28, and Monday, June 3, when classes meet from 1 to 4 p.m.

Tuition. Each course costs \$84 for one hour of regular college credit or \$42 for two units of continuing education credit. Regular college credit can apply toward a college degree, while students interested in taking a course for personal enrichment may elect continuing education credit.

Scholarships. For each person from a congregation taking a regular credit course, a second member of the same congregation may receive a full scholarship for one course for either regular credit or continuing education credit. These awards are being made from the Paul and Margaret Southern and Hobart Ashby Scholarship Funds.

Housing. Housing is available in the Alma Gatewood Residence Hall for individuals or couples for \$20 per week per person; linens are not provided. Although food service is not available on campus, there are many restaurants located within a mile or two of the campus.

His Wordsmen sponsor Bible Bowl, retreat

His Wordsmen, the student religious group whose influence is stronger on the MCC campus that it has been in years, sponsored a Bible Bowl tournament between the four campus social clubs as part of their contribution to the MCC Spiritual Reaffirmation campaign.

The preliminary round, held Jan. 28, pitted the students of Kappa Kappa/Theta Rho, Kappa Tau/Alpha Tau, Alpha Beta/Beta Gamma, and Sigma Phi/Delta Nu in competition. The top two clubs advanced to the finals. Sigma Phi/Delta Nu defeated Alpha Beta/Beta Gamma 45-30 Feb. 25 to win the club title.

His Wordsmen planned at the beginning of the year one major activity for each semester that would contribute to the Spiritual Reaffirmation campaign launched by MCC President Milton B. Fletcher on the opening day of chapel. As the name implies, the purpose of this campaign is to cause the faculty, staff and student body to reevaluate their spiritual lives and to make a special effort to let this resolve pervade the campus.

The first semester activity was a weekend retreat to the Michigan Christian Youth Camp in Attica, Michigan, Nov. Twenty-seven students attended devotionals, played games, ate pizza, and heard

talks concerning spiritual reaf-firmation by MCC alumnus ('79) Leonardo D. Gilbert, minister of the Sheldon Heights Church of Christ in Chicago.

THE BIBLE Bowl was proposed as the second major activity of the year. The questions in the elimination round were taken from the Gospel of John, while the finals contained questions from the Acts of the Apostles. Questions were written by a committee from the 25-member group.

Members of the committee were His Wordsmen President Daniel Corp from Ashtabula. Ohio; Darren Maggard, Melvindale; Patrick Medlock, Pontiac; Kevin McCabe, Watervliet; Vice President Tim Tostige, Trenton; and Anthony Whitley, North Canton, Ohio.

Judges for the tournament included His Wordsmen members Greg Campbell of Lansing and Whitley; Mr. Mark Briggs, MCC computer services manager and His Wordsmen sponsor; Mr. Kent Hoggatt, MCC financial aid director and His Wordsmen sponsor; and Mr. Jerry Tallman, minister of the Rochester Church of Christ.

THE ROUNDS lasted until the questions were exhausted. Correct answers were worth up to three points, relative to the

question's difficulty.
"We thought this would be the best way to provide spiritual activity for the social clubs,' Corp said.

"I feel that the Bible Bowl was a great experience for the social clubs," said Carson Mathis, president of the runnerup Alpha Beta/Beta Gamma squad. "We should have more activities of this level."

CORP GAVE His Wordsmen sponsors credit for the group's success this year.

"Mr. Briggs and Mr. Hoggatt want to get things done,' said. "Being under the leadership of the elders at Rochester

has helped. Mr. Hoggatt (a deacon) and Mr. Briggs support each other and the eldership supports them. Without those two, we wouldn't have been able to do half of what we've done."

Mr. Briggs looks forward to next year and the improve-ments that can be made on the Bible Bowl.

"Considering that it was the first year, it was successful," the 25-year-old MCC alumnus

('79) said. "There's a lot we'll do differently next time. The twosession format wasn't as successful as we wanted it.

"NEXT YEAR, we'll know how to write better questions. I feel good about the different social clubs putting forth effort and the high percent of participation from His Wordsmen.'

The group has expressed interest in making the retreat as well as the Bible Bowl an annual event.

Dr. Lucien Palmer, Board member, made Nigerian Chief

Dr. Lucien Palmer, who worked for Michigan Christian College from 1958 to 1974 and is now a member of the Board of Trustees, recently completed a six-month tour of the country of Nigeria. West Africa.

Nigeria, West Africa.

While this alone is not unusual, because Dr. Palmer has been making such visits for the past 10 years, a most unique honor was bestowed upon him during this latest tour of duty.

On October 27, 1984, with approximately 1,000 people in attendance, the Conferment of Chieftaincy was awarded Dr. Palmer in the village of Ikot Usen. This is a unique honor in that it is not sought after and seldom is realized by a foreigner.

Making the occasion even more meaningful is the fact that Ikot Usen is the village where in 1952 the Church of Christ in Nigeria had its beginning.

ALSO MAKING the event special was the fact that His Royal Highness, the Okuku of Ibiono Ibom, pronounced and performed the Conferment. This prestigious man is chief over 237 villages and seldom appears in public.

The Okuku is waited on and cared for completely by others. Whenever one wishes to have audience with the Okuku, he must make an appointment but only after having been thoroughly scrutinized and after having obtained special permis-

Since the Okuku never speaks in public, he had a "son of the village," a British-educated university graduate, speak for him as he placed the Chief's Cap upon Dr. Palmer's head. As he did so, he pronounced Dr. Palmer to be "Obong Nkori" or "Chief of Progress and Good Works" for the following:

Progress in Spreading the Gospel;

Progress in Christian Education

Progress in the Human and Spiritual Welfare of the Nigerian People;

Progress in Working with African Christian Schools with All Its Special Programs and Projects.

The essence of the speech reviewed Dr. Palmer's contribution over a 30-year span to the people of the Ibiono Villages and the Community, to the Cross River State and to the country of Nigeria as a whole.

SINCE 1954, Dr. Palmer has been involved in almost every phase of work and growth of the Lord's kingdom. He has served as evangelist, teacher, manager of village schools, principal of Nigerian Christian School and president of the College of the Bible (now Nigerian Christian College).

Dr. Palmer was the administrator of Nigerian Christian Hospital for three short tours. He also oversaw the construction and beginning of the Nigerian Christian Printing Press and Distribution Center.

MOST RECENTLY, Dr. Palmer met with, in an advisory capacity, several committees as they planned the construction of the Palmer Medical Center in the village of Ikot Usen.

IN HIS dedication to the Lord and His work, Dr. Palmer has been a beautiful example for generations of Christians. Dr. Palmer and Dr. Otis Gatewood, president of MCC from 1958 to 1964, were the first employees to start laying the groundwork for the school. "Basically," President

"Basically," President Milton Fletcher said, "MCC was organized by Lucien Palmer. He established what was then North Central Christian Junior College as a tax exempt organization and worked with the board members in writing the first bylaws and first charter for the new college."

DURING HIS years at MCC, Dr. Palmer was academic dean, business manager, president and chancellor.

"From the standpoint of long tenure, he probably has made a greater impact on this institution than any other one person," President Fletcher said, "and he continues to make an impact through his influence and his activities as a member



Warriors No. 2 in NLCAA poll

The MCC Warriors, under the direction of Coach Garth Pleasant, finished another great basketball season with a 23 and 3 win-loss record.

The Warriors entered the district finals of the National Little College Athletic Association (NLCAA) needing to beat Nazareth College of Kalamazoo and Orchard Lake St. Mary's respectively. A win over both schools would send MCC to the national finals for the third year in a row.

Pleasant's second-ranked Warriors pounded Nazareth 68-34 in the district semi-finals on Friday night, March 1.

Orchard Lake St. Mary's, a four-year National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) school, entered the NLCAA tournament after failing to earn a berth in the NAIA playoffs. OLSM and MCC battled throughout the Saturday afternoon contest, neither able to get a decided advantage over the opposition.

With a 10-point lead and just over two minutes left in the

game, it appeared that OLSM had the trip to the nationals wrapped up, but the Warriors would not give up.

INTENSE defense and some great outside shooting brought the Warriors to within two points with just three seconds left in the game.

Following a timeout, St. Mary's inbounded the ball and threw a lob down court.

Todd Grizzell intercepted the pass and fired back up court to Iantham Allayne standing a few feet over the mid-court stripe.

Allayne turned and, at the buzzer, "swished" a 40-foot jump shot.

As some order returned to the gym, the two teams went into overtime.

AGAIN, MCC fought hard but was unable to overcome a quick five-point deficit and found themselves on the short end of the 59-55 final score.

"This team played to its potential better than any team I have coached," Coach Pleasant said. "All year long we

The Warriors were ranked second in the nation. The only team receiving higher ranking was last year's national champions from Webber College who were expected to again take that crown.

OFFENSIVELY, the Warriors averaged 77 points a game. MCC led the country in the NLCAA, defensively giving up only 59 points a game.

Balanced scoring and overall good team play contributed to the Warriors' success. Allayne, Marvin Mathis and Greg Spraggins each averaged 15 points per game. Allayne and Mathis led the team in rebounding while Spraggins led the team in assists. Captain Tim Morton supplied the leadership with his own intense style at play.

Matt Bugg, Grizzell, Marcus Little, Rob Oldham and Chris Turpin also contributed to the Warriors' fantastic season.
