

Adults attend college in record numbers

It's oft been said that learning is a life-long process, and the statistics from colleges and universities throughout the country are proving that for many adults in America today, that is true.

Currently, one-third of all college students are over age 25. By 1990, that number is expected to reach one-half.

Some are continuing their education for personal enrichment, some for job training or advancement, and some for the satisfaction of completing a

During Partnership Dinner XV alone, approximately 100 adults indicated a desire to do so in the future. Those responses added to the large number of adults who are already MCC students are encouraging and have made the administration look forward even more to serving those out of the typical college age bracket.

WHETHER a person works days or evenings, classes are available that the adult will find both informative and stimulating. Some courses, such as Romans and Galatians offered from 6:30 to 9 p.m. on Monday evenings or History of Judaism from 7 to 8:50 p.m. on Thursdays, are especially suited to those who might be interested in being on campus only one evening a week.

The variety of courses offered at a variety of times also provides the added benefits of a Christian viewpoint in the classroom and a caring, friendly atmosphere on campus. FINANCIAL AID is available for those who are at least half-time students (taking about two classes). Also, many employers such as Ford and General Motors will pay all tuition costs of any college courses taken by their employees, including Bible classes. Company personnel offices provide forms for this employee benefit.

Adults who have taken classes at MCC in the past are excited about the education they have received. Mrs. Wendy Estes, for example, graduated in 1985 with an associate's degree with a major in homemaking. Upon graduation, she expressed her happiness at being able to return to being a full-time mother of four and put her learning to use.

THIS SPRING, the Bachelor of Religious Education address at Commencement was delivered by Winston Schloot, who graduated from MCC after finishing an education he had begun as a teen-ager 40 years ago. Even though Mr. Schloot has been the preacher at the Redford Church of Christ for more than 10 years, he said he still learned so much from the Bible courses he took and would miss no longer being a student.

And Laurie Losiewicz, another mother of four finishing her sophomore year in the Bachelor of Religious Education program said: "I think you really gain a lot more from college when you go back later in life because your experience (see Adults, Page 2)

MCC receives \$75,000 gift for physical facilities

At the annual Board of Trustees Retreat on June 8, 1986, Bob and Mary Utley presented a gift of \$75,000 to Michigan Christian College to be applied to the Physical Facilities goals of the Silver Anniversary Campaign.

These great people made this gift over and above their previously committed Silver Anniversary Campaign pledge. They have an intense desire to see that the Campaign succeeds.

In making this gift announcement, Bob Utley made this statement:

"Only 2% of the Silver Anniversary Campaign commitments thus far have been toward the Physical Facilities goals.

"If we are going to see this Campaign result in the bricks and mortar of the planned Library and Science Learning Center and the Faculty/Staff Housing Complex, it is imperative that we increase our efforts in this area."

Bob Utley, recent Chairman of the Board of Trustees, is Chairman of the Silver Anniversary Campaign.

At Partnership Dinner XV on May 10, 1986, he made his annual Silver Anniversary Campaign progress report by stating that \$3,498,447 had been committed toward the total Campaign goal of \$8.2 million.

Of those total commitments, \$1,586,988 was related to the Operational Supplement goal; \$1,849,324 was reported as commitments toward the Permanent Endowment goal; while only \$62,135 had been pledged toward the Physical Facilities goals.

However, in keeping with the Campaign Plan adopted prior to the Campaign launching in May, 1984, the first two years of Campaign activity were to concentrate on the Operational Supplement and Permanent

Endowment goals. Now that those two years have passed, it is planned that heavy emphasis will also be given to the Physical Facilities goals.

Three items compose the Physical Facilities goals, namely: the Library/Science Learning Center for \$1,181,270; the Faculty/Staff Housing Complex for \$518,730; and the renovation of the existing Science Building and the Library Building for \$100,000.

Commitments are now being sought for these Physical Facilities goals, as well as the continuing Operational Supplement and Permanent Endowment goals. The campaign is scheduled for five years.

Bob Utley, at the close of his Board Retreat remarks, stated: "Mary and I hope this gift will encourage others to share their blessings in a significant way with Michigan Christian College, especially in the Physical Facilities area of the Silver Anniversary Campaign."

Promotion announced of two to administrative position

President Milton B. Fletcher has announced the promotions of two Michigan Christian College employees to administrative positions.

Mr. Garth Pleasant, who served as interim Dean of Students during the spring months, will officially be Dean of Students beginning with the 1986-87 school year.

He first worked at MCC from 1971 to 1973, during which time he taught physical education, coached basketball, and served as supervisor of the

Barbier dormitory.
From MCC, he moved to
Georgia where he taught Bible
and physical education at
Georgia Christian School and
coached the basketball team.
He also worked as associate
minister at the Dasher Church
of Christ in Georgia.

HE RETURNED to MCC in 1976 to again coach the Warriors basketball team. At different times during the past eight years, he has served as Director of Housing and as Barbier dorm supervisor and has taught health and the college success techniques Much of the Warriors' success may be attributed to the coaching of Mr. Pleasant, who has taken the team to the finals in four out of the last five years.

This year, the Warriors entered the nationals ranked

number one in the United States. During the tournament, Mr. Pleasant was selected as the NLCAA Tournament Coach of the Year for his outstanding job of handling his players.

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Message from the President



A friend sent me an anonymous article about the Chambered Nautilus. I recently shared the information with the Associates and request that they excuse my using the information to share more widely.

There are few shells from the oceans of the world that are more beautiful than the Chambered Nautilus. A study of it reveals movement in all directions. It is a solidified record of the growth of the tiny creature from its small beginnings to its fully developed spiral formation.

Chamber after chamber, it forms itself, increasing in size as the creature lives in each home or each chamber for a year, sealing off its earlier dwelling and moving into more spacious quarters. This progression into a continually larger life inspired the following celebrated words of Oliver Wendell Holmes:

Build thee more stately mansions, O my soul, As the swift seasons roll! Leave thy low-vaulted past! Let each temple, nobler than the last. Shut thee from heaven with a dome more vast, Till thou at length art free,

Leaving thine outgrown shell by life's unresting sea. In life the Nautilus is a lovely creature. In England and the United States, both the whole shell and the split half are coveted as ornaments of beauty and inspiration.

The ability of the live Nautilus to float or submerge is doubtless the reason why its name has been given to submarines. Since it is sometimes observed afloat on the sea surface, it is only logical to assume that it has this submarine-like ability. There seems to be no record of anyone having seen the Nautilus sink.

Not only may the chambers be seen spreading out from the Nautilus, but you may observe threading through the chambers a fine tube called the siphuncle (the same word from which our word "siphon" comes). Marine biologists say that by means of this siphuncle, water and air or gas may be pumped in and out to enable the Nautilus to sink or swim at will. They also say that the tube is a means of expelling a spray of water, giving the creature jet propulsion.

When we watch the Nautilus, as well as other phenomena of nature, none of us questions the wisdom, the power, or the omniscience of God. None of us questions the excellence with which God performs. During the 1985-86 school year, the theme at Michigan Christian College has been "Excellence."

The college began in 1959 as a small entity. Each year has been independent, but each year has also depended on prior years as slow but steady growth has taken place. There has been a stream of clientele support threading through all 27 years of Michigan Christian College's existence. She has come of age, in a sense, but continues to develop like the Chambered Nautilus. With your help, prayers, and unselfish support, Michigan Christian College will continue to develop into a full-grown institution.

Partnership Dinner XV Coach Stallings stresses value of Christian schools

"Children need to learn how to think right, how to perform, how to associate with good people. That's why I want them in a Christian college," Gene Stallings said at MCC's Partnership Dinner XV May 3.

Over 2,400 "good people" purchased tickets for this year's dinner at Cobo Hall in Detroit and enjoyed an evening of fellowship with others who are interested in the continued success of Michigan Christian College.

The featured speaker was Gene Stallings, head football coach for the St. Louis Cardinals and former defensive backfield coach for the Dallas Cowboys. Coach Stallings and his wife Ruth Ann are the parents of four grown daughters and one son.

He spoke of the importance of a Christian education, mentioning the fact that three of his daughters met their husbands at a Christian college and that hopefully his fourth daughter would also.

"If you were to ask me what I want out of life, I would say I want my daughters to be good Christian girls and I want them to be married to good Christian boys because if they're not, then it just doesn't matter...," Coach Stallings said.

He also spoke of the importance of having good friends, citing the example of those he visits in prisons who tell him they got into trouble, saying, "Because when I was a kid, I chose the wrong friends."

Coach Stallings mentioned the success of several famous people, such as the blind Tom Sullivan, who became an Olympic wrestler and today is a famous pianist and singer.

"Somebody taught him to
think right," Coach Stallings
said. "We never know—the
things we do and the things
we say are going to influence someone, somewhere,
somehow."

When Mrs. Pat Pleasant, president of the Alumni Association, introduced Mr. Stanley Day as the Alumnus of the Year, he, too, spoke of the importance of the influence of others.

"I got a lot of great things out of MCC," he said. "At MCC, I was taught to major in the greatest—Jesus Christ.

"It was the Bible classes, the devotionals, and chapel, but it was also things much greater than that. It was the people in whom I could see Jesus every day.

"At 18 years of age, you still need some godly influence and a pattern to follow in life. MCC provides that."

Mr. Day, originally from Flint, graduated with an Associate of Arts in 1965 and then attended Harding University. An outstanding evangelist, he was selected as Alumnus of the Year because of his work with the Lord's church and with Christian camps.

Mr. Day and his wife Pamela have worked with the church in Marshall, Michigan, since 1975. During that 10-year period, the congregation has grown from 25 to 110 members.

The Days have two daughters, Sheri, 15, and Laura, 17. Laura will attend MCC as a freshman in the fall.

Plans are already under way for Partnership Dinner XVI, which will be held at Cobo Hall May 16, 1987.

Mr. James G. Shelton will begin work in the fall as a full-time business instructor and will also sponsor the MCC Business Team, which travels to Searcy, Arkansas, each year to participate in the Harding-LOMANCO Invitational Business Games Conference.

He received a bachelor's from Harding University in 1982 and a master's in economic development from the University of Southern Mississippi in 1986. Before coming to MCC, Mr. Shelton was assistant manager of the Sedalia/Pettis County Development Corporation, an agency responsible for the industrial and economic development of the Sedalia, Missouri, area.

Mr. Shelton and his wife Lori will live in MCC's Campus Center, serving as dorm supervisors In the Music Department, Mr. Joe R. Bentley will join the faculty as a full-time music instructor and director of Chorus and Autumn.

He received a bachelor's in music education from Harding University in 1979 and a master's in music education from Northeast Louisiana University in 1984.

While at Northeast, he was assistant conductor of the Concert Choir, Chorale, and Chamber Singers, and gave private and class voice lessons.

The following day included a performance at Great Lakes Christian College in Beamsville, Ontario, and time for exploration of the Canadian side of Niagara Falls.

Six dozen linen napkins are the latest addition to a long list of items "purchased" by the Associates of Michigan Christian College through the Bill Knapp's Community Support Program.

Since the spring of 1985, the Associates have encouraged those who eat at a Bill Knapp's restaurant anywhere in the United States to ask for a Community Support Program receipt each time they dine. Among the items the Associates have already received free of charge are a 33mm camera, a projector and screen, a Pana-

sonic vacuum cleaner, six white table linens for the Gold Room, a Royal desk calculator, and two file cabinets.

"You can't believe the thousands of dollars people have spent eating at Bill Knapp's," Mrs. Hadfield said. "I've already turned in \$44,800 in receipts and have another \$4,000 in receipts to use toward our next purchase.

"People even send us receipts from Florida and other places in the United States, or give them to relatives they know are Associates so they can turn them in

Mrs. Hadfield asked that her thanks be expressed for the tremendous cooperation she has had in the program. Speakers include Mr. Buck Dozier, Mr. Jim Moss and Mr. Garth

Mr. Dozier, Family Life Minister at the Madison, Tennessee, Church of Christ, will lead four sessions. He is well-known and respected throughout the brotherhood for his ability to communicate with teens and is in great demand as a speaker for youth programs throughout the United States.

Mr. Dozier has also produced a series of tapes on sex and sexuality, with frank, Biblical answers to questions teens ask most often.

Mr. Dozier and his wife have two children.

Also leading four sessions will be Mr. Jim Moss, youth minister of the Hendersonville, Tennessee, Church of Christ. Mr. Moss is editor of *Teen-Age Christian Magazine* and has 20 years' experience as a youth minister. A graduate of David Lipscomb College, he also teaches youth ministry courses at Lipscomb.

Mr. Moss has written How to Build a Youth Ministry, a book aimed toward smaller churches who have no full-time youth minister. The book is being printed by Sentinel Book Store in

Lubbock, Texas, and will be released in August. Mr. Moss and his wife have a year-old child.

Leading two sessions on creating a positive self-image in teens is Mr. Garth Pleasant, minister at the Lake Orion, Michigan, Church of Christ. Mr. Pleasant has taught and coached basketball at MCC for 10 years and has recently been named Dean of Students for the

1986-87 school year. He and his wife have three children.
All sessions of the Youth Leaders' Workshop will be held at the Rochester Church of Christ, 127 East Avon Road, except for the Friday chapel service, which will be held on the campus of MCC.

As he has done for the past 23 years, MCC's piano instructor, Mr. Bernard Leshley, opened the Commencement with the processional.

Following the invocation by Al Bugg, one of the graduates in the BRE program, and congratulatory remarks by Mr. Royce Dickinson, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, three students addressed their fellow

WINSTON SCHLOOT gave the Bachelor of Religious Education address. He began by talking about the differences between most MCC students and himself: the fact that he is decades older, is married, and has three grown children. Mr. Schloot has also been the minister for the Redford Church of Christ for more than 10 years.

He then went on to discuss the similarities between all MCC students, regardless of age or walk in life.

"The important thing we've received here is an education that sets us apart from the rest of the world. We'll all be different if we practice thrift, hard work and honesty," he said, quoting from one of McGuffey's readers.

Mr. Schloot, 58, first came to MCC in May 1983 with a desire to finish a degree he had begun 40 years previously at Indiana University. The Navy and then marriage and a family intervened, but he never gave up his desire to graduate.

"I'm really proud of him," his daughter Julie said. "He really loved being at MCC and has often said how much he is going to miss it. He felt he learned so much from his Bible professors."

Following Mr. Schloot's remarks, valedictorian Vickie Lynn Liebzeit addressed the audience. Vickie, a graduate

from Avondale High School, earned a 3.94 average while at MCC. She was vice president of production on the awardwinning Business Team and plans to further her business education at Walsh College.

THE THEME of Vickie's speech was "Every end is a new beginning," taken from material by Norman Vincent Peale who said: "Not what is finished, but what yet remains to be achieved is the emphasis on graduation day. Invitingly ahead lies a wonderful future, and opportunity lures one onward."

Salutatorian Candace Lynn Washburn, from Westland, then spoke. Candace, who decided to attend MCC because her mother is an alumna, earned a 3.93 average while participating in chorus, student government, Company and Celebration. When asked about her experience at MCC, Candace's first remarks always include the fact that she met the man who is to be her husband. She and Paul Carpenter, who received a Bachelor in Religious Education from MCC in 1985 and now works as a recruiter for MCC, will marry in December.

TO HER CLASSMATES, Candace said: "At MCC, I've realized something very important. As a Christian, you have the greatest force on earth on your side. You don't have to be weak to be meek."

Then referring to the year's theme of "Excellence," Candace ended with the thought: "If there's only one thing you remember about MCC, remember the encouragement to strive for excellence and to do your best, and remember that through God, you can do it."

Why attend MCC instead of a local community college?

Choosing a college can be confusing, and the number of community colleges often makes that choice even more difficult. Yet, a tremendous difference exists between the college experience at a community college and a college like MCC.

ACADEMICS: Students in the community college often begin course work in technical fields and find that such work does not fit in well with other programs when a change in majors occurs. All degrees at MCC share a common core of courses that are applicable to most programs. After beginning work at MCC, students may choose from transfer or occupational degree programs.

STUDENT RELATIONSHIPS: The average community college student is 27 years old. Many are part-time students, while most attend classes and then return home or go to work.

At MCC, students can build strong relationships in a setting where the majority of students are recent high school graduates, attend full time, live on campus, and share the experiences of each day. Such interaction between students not only builds stronger friendships but also provides a better selection of life-long mates.

PARTICIPATION: The community college setting does not lend itself to participation in such activities as intramurals, choral groups, drama and student government. The size of the student body at MCC combined with the availability of many activities encourages everyone to participate.

SPIRITUAL LIFE: As public institutions, community colleges may not promote spiritual growth. At MCC, students learn from instructors who teach from a Christian viewpoint, worship with those instructors and with friends, and grow from being surrounded by people who encourage others to become better Christians.

COST: Naturally, tuition at the community college is inexpensive. Yet, in figuring budgets at the community college, many fail to consider the cost of owning and operating a car on a daily basis, the usage of extra utilities at home, and the cost of groceries.

The College Board reports an average annual cost of \$3,627 at the community college. In a large number of cases, the extra cost in attending MCC can be covered by the availability of more financial aid.

Before making a final college choice, weigh the differences between MCC and the local community college. A good education can be acquired at the community college, but a good education and a lot more can be found at MCC.

Church leaders gain much at June workshop

"A great two days"; "Wonderful program"; "A good experience": these comments and others as favorable were heard often during the Church Leaders' Workshop held on the campus of Michigan Christian College June 6-7.

This year's program was dedicated to Jim Wood, a deacon for eight years and an elder for 13 at the Royal Oak Church of Christ before his death October 6, 1985. He had been injured in an industrial accident at the Ford Motor Company, Wixom, Michigan, plant August 30, 1985.

Mr. Wood's wife Helen (Gentry) participated in the funding of this year's workshop.

"Mr. Wood was an outstanding leader with a burning desire to see extensive training take place for leaders of the church of our Lord in the Midwest," MCC President Milton B. Fletcher said.

General sessions of the workshop were conducted by representatives from the Center for Church Growth in Houston, Texas. These men also conducted the major part of the workshop in 1985.

Featured speakers included John W. Ellas, Tim D. Matheny, and Dr. Joe D. Schubert from Houston and Dick Marcear from Amarillo, Texas.

Also involved in the workshop were Sherrill Cox from the West Chicago, Illinois, Church of Christ; Doyle Davis from Shults-Lewis Child and Family Services in Valparaiso, Indiana; Stan Day from Marshall, Michigan; Jack Duty from Clawson, Michigan; MCC President Milton B. Fletcher from Rochester, Michigan; and James Snow from the Wyoming Church of Christ in Detroit, Michigan.

Approximately 175 men and women from Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Wisconsin, New York and Canada attended the workshop.

Next year's workshop is scheduled for early June again on the MCC campus.

MCC coach directs summer basketball camp for youngsters

Dozens of potential stars swarmed over the MCC campus the weeks of July 14 and 21 for the annual Lake Norcentra Basketball Camp directed by MCC Coach Garth A. Pleasant.

The 20 girls and 73 boys ranged in age from 8 to 17 and came from all areas of Michigan to listen to lectures and concentrate on both the fundamentals and the skills of the game.

Coach Pleasant is nationally known as the successful coach of the MCC Warriors, who have gone to the National Little College Athletic Association National Finals four out of the last five years. This year the team entered the finals as the #1 ranked team in the country.

For the fifth year, Detroit Piston's forward Kent Benson appeared as a guest at the camp. Benson is a former All-American from Indiana and in 1977 was selected college basketball player of the year. He was the first player drafted in the 1977 NBA draft.

Benson talked to the players about the three "D's": dedication, determination and desire. He spent time with every camper working on offensive moves. He also answered questions and then posed for pictures with the campers.

Besides the fundamentals and skills, Coach Pleasant stresses how vital it is that a young player develop a positive attitude.

"I've seen many talented players who never met success because of their attitudes," he said. "Fundamental skills' and 'a positive attitude' are the key words at the camp."

Camper Dan Reddan, a 10th grader from Rochester High School, echoed Coach Pleasant's words.

"This is my second year at this camp and my seventh week

of basketball camps this summer, and I've learned a lot," he said. "The lectures stress ways to improve yourself, and I've learned to always be positive."

Another camper, Andy Shanks, an 11th grader from Rochester Adams High School, said he likes the camp because "You get a lot more playing experience here."

Andy, who is in his sixth week of basketball camps this summer, said that even though this is his third year at Lake Norcentra, he is learning a great deal that will help him in playing this winter.

"If you take what they give you at this camp, like the drills we learned to practice for the rest of the summer, then the amount of work you do will show what kind of player you'll become."

Besides concentrating on improving his game, Andy also works the 7 p.m. to 1 a.m. shift washing dishes at the Elks Club and is taking a college algebra class this summer. He, too, agrees that keeping a positive attitude and working hard are the keys to success.

Coach Pleasant and Benson were also joined by several high school and college coaches who served as guest lecturers. Various contests were held daily, and games were played at the end of each day. Instructional films and video tapes of each player also helped the campers see what areas of their game needed the most concentration and work.

New fall courses finalized

Michigan Christian College will be adding five new courses for the fall and will be offering a sixth, General Organic Chemistry I, for the first time in several years.

History of Judaism will be taught by Dr. Stephen Eckstein of the Bible Department. The course covers Judaism from ancient Israel to contemporary times. Topics will include the growth of Jewish tradition, sects of the Jews, Messianic concepts, destruction of Jerusalem, Jewish immigration to the New World, rise of Zionism, and the future of Judaism.

Dr. Melvin Storm, a Bible instructor from Pepperdine University, will join the MCC faculty in August and will be teaching Introduction to Greek

Studies. The course is designed to develop an understanding of the Greek language sufficient to enable a student to use Bible helps to study the New Testament in its original language.

Varsity Volleyball for women and Varsity Soccer for men will be coached by Mr. Kent Wieb. Students desiring to participate on these MCC teams must register for the classes, for which they will receive one credit toward the physical education requirements.

Business instructor Maureen Foglesong will be teaching a computer course that will fulfill requirements under both the business and math programs. Business Mathematics on Computers covers computer-based systems and financial mathe-

matics including historic development; elements of computer systems; computer terminology; application programming; microcomputers and commercial software for WP, DBMS, and statistical packages; and advanced financial spreadsheets.

Finally, Associate Professor David Cole will be teaching General Organic Chemistry I. The class will meet for three hours of lecture and four hours of laboratory weekly. Material covered will include classification, nomenclature, synthesis, properties, and uses of the compounds of carbon, including chemical reaction mechanism, stereo-chemistry, and isomerism.
