

MCC Warrior Basketball Team wins its first NLCAA National Championship

The Michigan Christian College Warrior Basketball Team left for the National Little College Athletic Association (NLCAA) National Tournament on March 5. In the opening game, the Warriors beat Draughons College, of Knoxville, Tennessee, 95-86. MCC then entered the quarter finals against Dyke College, of Cleveland, Ohio. Trailing by a point with 9:46 left in the game, the Warriors moved ahead to beat Dyke, 120-97.

Entering the semi-finals against the tournament's number one seeded team, Mt. Senario, the Warriors found themselves in a defensive struggle. The half-time score saw Mt. Senario with a 46-32 lead. The Warriors' intense style, however, enabled them in the final minutes to take a 69-58

MCC entered the final game of the tournament, on March 10, against St. Scholastica, of St. Paul, Minnesota. The Saints started off with a quick 8-0 lead, and, just before the half, the Warriors found themselves trailing 21-17. In the next six minutes, MCC's team pulled ahead to take a 34-24 half-time lead. During the second half,

the Warriors moved into a 20-point lead, finishing the Championship game with a winning score of 88-56.

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"The MCC Men's Basketball Team set four goals for the 1988-89 season," stated Coach Garth Pleasant. "The team wanted a 20-win season, a conference championship, a district title, and a national championship." In February, the Warriors beat Jordan College, of Detroit, Michigan, 95-83, gaining the North Central District Tournament title and a berth in the National Finals. Having now completed their 25-3 season with a National Championship, the Warriors have realized each of the goals they set for themselves.

Providing leadership and continuity throughout the entire season were co-captains Eric Vaughn and Troy Rusnell. Vaughn, a 6'1" sophomore guard from Saginaw, Michigan, led his team in rebounding 7.4 points per game. He averaged 19.9 points, and 8.2 assists. He also shot 48% from the three-point range. Vaughn was selected to the NLCAA All American Team for his performance during the year, and was voted MVP of the National Tourna-

ment. "Eric is a bright young man who has a very good understanding of the game," stated Coach Pleasant. "He has the best hands of any player I've ever coached. I believe Eric will be a fine Division I or, II player during the next two years."

Troy Rusnell, a 6'2" forward from Lake Orion, Michigan, also played a key role in guiding the Warriors toward their first National Championship. Rusnell averaged 15.7 points per game, with 5.7 rebounds. He also shot 57% from the field, and was an NLCAA Central District 1st Team selection. About this player Coach Pleasant stated, "Troy was an integral part of our success this season, with an intense style of play. Certainly he was an outstanding player and leader, but more importantly he is an outstanding citizen."

Dwayne Tubbs, a 5'10" freshman guard from Ypsilanti, Michigan, led the team in scoring. Tubbs displayed outstanding skill with 26 points per game for the National Tournament, and a 22.7 points-pergame average for the year. He also averaged 5 assists and 3.4 steals per game. "Dwayne is one of the best scorers I've ever coached," stated Pleasant. "He has excellent defensive skills that are overshadowed by his scoring ability." Tubbs was an NLCAA North Central District 1st Team selection, and was chosen for the All Tournament Team.

The third player in an explosive three-guard offense, besides Vaughn and Tubbs, was 5'8" freshman Willie Maull, of Romulus, Michigan. Pleasant stated about Maull, "He's one of the most intense players I've ever had. There's no way you can measure the size of a kid's heart." Another freshman, 6'2" Anthony Foster of Valdosta,

Georgia, rounded out an aggressive starting line-up.

Additional players on the Warrior Team were sophomores Chris Bies, of LaSalle, Michigan; and Keith Strickland, of Detroit, Michigan. Completing the team were the following freshmen: Jeff Hardeman, of Mt. Clemens, Michigan; Scott Raby, of Pontiac, Michigan; Todd Speaks, of Lake Orion, Michigan; and Dan Wallace, of Rochester, Michigan.

The Warriors, a team comprised of sophomores and freshmen, faced many four-year col-

leges with older, more experienced players. Consistently playing on their great strengths of extreme quickness and the ability to shoot three-pointers well, however, the team was able to realize a dream Pleasant has had for Michigan Christian College since he began coaching 11 years ago. Coach Pleasant best summed up the excitement at Michigan Christian, following the National Tournament, when he stated, "Whoever wins the NCAA won't be any more thrilled than we are right now. We know we're not the NCAA, but this is ours."

In recognition of such a provision, the College awards a beautiful wall plaque to the donor. Also, Heritage Club members are invited annually by the President to a dinner honoring them on Wednesday evening of the annual Bible Lectureship. At this writing, we have identified 69 family units as members of the Michigan Christian College Heritage

Club.

MCC charters first Phi Beta Lambda business club in Michigan

Along with other signs of growth and development on the campus of Michigan Christian College, a group of students have formed the first Phi Beta Lambda business club chapter in Michigan. The group, officially chartered in March of 1989, comprises 25 Business students, and is supervised by an Advisory Board of Business faculty which includes Mrs. Barbara Cole, Ms. Maureen Foglesong, Dean Birgie Houston, Dr. John Todd, Mr. Kent Wieb, and the club's sponsor, Mrs. Katheryn Wilkins.

Billy Blake, a junior Accounting major from Littleton, Colorado, serves as President of the new club. Jim Craig, a junior Finance major from Morenci, Michigan, fills the position of Vice-President. Additional officers include Lisa King, a Computer Information Systems major from Southgate, Michigan, serving as Secretary; Dereka Smith, a Marketing/Management major from Dayton, Ohio, serving as Treasurer; Randy Haynes, a General Business major from Bellwood, Illinois, filling the position of Historian; and Debbie Workman, a Computer Information Systems major from Ashland, Ohio, serving as Parliamentarian.

Members of Phi Beta Lambda meet weekly to discuss activities involving each of the organization's committees. Tony Burns, a General Business major from Lake Orion, Michigan, is Chairman of the Membership Committee. He organizes chapel announcements and presentations, and controls the club's Information Board. In charge of the Program Committee is Ronda Black, a Legal Assistant major from Flushing, Michigan. She plans special programs for the organization's meetings, and she was in charge of organizing the March 28 formal Chartering Ceremony. Mark Johnson, a General Business major from Union City, Michigan, is Chairman of the Community Services Committee. Students Serve Seniors at community facilities

MCC students, in a practical sense, are finding many opportunities in which to share the spirit of the College with the Rochester Hills community. Rapid growth in the area surrounding the school has resulted in the opening of several new senior citizen facilities. Three of these unique housing complexes are visited regularly by student groups.

Each Monday evening a group of 15-20 students, employees, and other Christian adults meet at the Avondale Convalescent Home to sing with the "Seniors" well-loved hymns such as "The Old Rugged Cross," and "Amazing Grace." Many Seniors, unable to leave the nursing center, enjoy this contact with the students. Separated from parents and grandparents, students benefit from the contact with the Seniors. One 78-year-old male resident of Avondale, who is confined to a wheelchair, is a talented musician. Following a devotional, he wheeled himself to the piano and entertained students with a concert of ragtime and jazz. Students usually receive a hug from each nursing center resident present at a devotional, before leaving.

hotel, is a senior housing complex made up of independent apartment living, assisted care, and total care units. Through a program sponsored by the Rochester Church of Christ, students attend a Sunday afternoon worship service with the Seniors. Male students are encouraged to lead and assist in the service. In conjunction with a mid-week morning Bible class, the program has grown from five participating Seniors to over

25. Mr. William Crane, a resident of the Inn, was baptized through this outreach effort, and has been able to worship with his Christian family at the Rochester Church. Officials at Peachwood were so encouraged by this weekly, inspirational program for their residents that they asked leaders of the Rochester congregation to begin holding services at Cherrywood Inn, a similar facility managed by the same organization as is Peachwood.

Directly across the road from the College is a new multi-care facility called Mercy Bellbrook. Executive Officers of the Student Body Association are encouraging participation in a weekly visitation program they've begun at this facility.

Service and community responsibility are taught in the classroom at MCC. Students themselves, however, have shown the concern and willingness it takes to make theory a practicality.

MCC students help spread the gospel in foreign fields and at home

Michigan Christian College has been a participant in the mission effort to provide Christian education for the Midwest, since late 1959. On a daily basis, administrators, faculty and staff renew their mission to train young people academically in a spiritual atmosphere. In keeping with this spiritual emphasis, a club exists on campus which provides students the opportunity to share their faith in a practical way. The Mission Emphasis Team, a group of ten to twenty college students, organizes weekend campaigns in areas of Michigan where the Lord's Church needs additional support and encouragement.

Members of this year's Mission Emphasis Team met on a weekly basis to discuss plans for their mini-campaigns, and to prepare materials necessary to work with children, ranging in age from three to twelve. During the first of their doubleweekend campaigns, these students helped members of the sponsoring congregation advertise the events which would take place the following weekend. Returning to the same congregation the next weekend, MCC students taught classes, supervised Bible Learning Centers, and led devotionals for the participating children.

Under the supervision of Dean of Students, Garth Pleasant, Miss June Hendrick, a 1983 graduate of MCC, was asked to coordinate the logis-tics of the Mission Emphasis program. During the summers of 1984, 1985, and 1987, she worked with German campaign efforts using the "Let's Start Talking" study series. Designed by a missionary, this series enabled teams of four to six people to work with foreign congregations of the Lord's Church in reaching the lost. "Missionaries to Germany found doorknocking, and similar methods, to be ineffective in a country where people highly value their privacy," stated Miss Hendrick. "Europeans are easier to get to know and share the gospel with on an individual basis. What we offered them directly was the opportunity to practice speaking their newly-learned English. What we offered them indirectly was a look into God's Word."

Campaign team members worked with two to three German natives each day, for a period of six weeks. Daily lessons consisted of conversations with a student, using the Bible as a text. "As a general rule, Germans see religion as a form of social interaction, and not as

a personal relationship with a divine being," stated Miss Hendrick. "We told our students, beforehand, that the Bible would be the text in these conversational classes, but they didn't think it would really have an effect on them. They simply wanted to better their English-speaking skills. Many Germans have no concept of a God, or of the eternal life He offers. Evolvement of this concept in their minds is a slow process. Germans will not quickly commit to something they don't really understand. Once German natives can be convinced of the reality of God's word, their whole lives are changed and they are very zealous and committed to their Saviour.

Miss Hendrick is currently part of a team of six individuals, some of whom participated in the College's Mission Emphasis program, who will teach the "Let's Start Talking" series in Germany, this summer. Team members Victor Bliss, Laura Day, Linda Sattison, Pete Sexton, and Karen Owen are presently undergoing twenty weeks of training to prepare them for their mission. Throughout these weekly sessions, they are learning how to converse with people of varied religious backgrounds, receiving instruction on how to solicit financial support, and filing for necessary documents such as a visa and a passport. Group members are also familiarizing themselves with the "Let's Start Talking" study guide method, becoming more aware of German cultural differences, and learning to better react to each other as a group.

As this year's Mission Emphasis Coordinator, Miss Hendrick wished to expose students to a variety of mission efforts taking place both in the United

States and in foreign fields. In August, 1989, she will join a mission effort in Catacamas, Olancho, Honduras, for a period of two years. In addition to assisting in the delivery of medical supplies to people in outreaching areas, she will maintain records and statistics on a computer system at the campaign's headquarters office. Miss Hendrick sees this mission as an opportunity to use talents the Lord has given her to spread the message of His saving grace throughout various parts of the world. "The most important lesson I wanted to teach members of the Mission Emphasis Team," she states, "is that every Christian has at least one talent which can be used in meeting the needs of people, both from a different culture and from one's own neighborhood."

With the possibility of four returning starters next year, and the potential for outstanding, new talent, we could turn this year's record around."

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
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MCC business majors compete in national stock market game

Front cover headlines of Inc. Magazine referred to the First Annual AT&T Collegiate Investment Challenge as "the hottest business game in town." Changing Times described the program as "an education that often costs would-be millionaires a lot more in the hard-knock school of in-

Some 11,000 college students participated in the Challenge on a nationwide basis, including two MCC juniors, Billy Blake of Littleton, Colorado and Jim Craig of Morenci, Michigan. Each student received a fictitious \$500,000 brokerage account, a toll-free number to a brokerage firm, and the challenge to maximize the value of their portfolio by buying and selling from the stocks of over 5,000 publicly traded compan-

At the end of each month, participants received a personal account statement, newsletter, and ranking of participants. Of the 11,000 participants, twenty-two increased their portfolio by a million dollars or more during the four-month Challenge. Both MCC students increased their portfolio by some half-million dollars!

Months of planning and preparation evolved into a delightful evening of colorful

Kappa Tau/Alpha Tau, the final club to perform, illustrated a ship of sailors who hailed from Northern states.
