Fall applications reach near-record levels

"Michigan Christian College's residence halls will be full this fall!" That's the message Toby Osburn, dean of enrollment services, relayed to the Board of Trustees at their June meeting.

According to Osburn, applications have continued to arrive in the Admissions Office on an average of twenty-nine per month since September. Not since the early 1980's has the college maintained such a high rate of applications.

"The last time we saw this kind of activity. our student body grew at a phenomenal rate, and that growth was built around two-year degree offerings. With thirteen bachelor's degree majors being offered this fall, the possibilities seem almost endless for a substantially larger student body," Osburn added.

Preliminary enrollment projections indicate that over 200 new students will be enrolling at Michigan Christian College this fall, with around 175 students expected to return for sophomore, junior, and senior-level studies. That projection places the student body size very close to that of the college's record year of 1977.

Dr. Johnson notes several reasons for the increase in student interest. "We've worked hard over the last year or so to focus our recruiting efforts in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, New York, and Ontario. Not that we're not interested in students from outside this area, because we are! Our history simply reflects a strong student pool in these specific areas, and that's where we're experiencing our most successful recruiting right now."

The president also noted a significant increase in institutional scholarships for students. "We're planning to award in excess of half-a-million dollars in scholarships this year alone. That's more than twice our scholarship budget from just a few years ago," said Dr. Johnson.

"I believe our greatest strength for growth lies in the increase in four-year majors.' reflected Dr. Johnson. "With thirteen bachelor's degree options, the college has once again affirmed it's commitment to providing quality Christian education for students in this part of the country.'

"Many students will discover that they no longer have to consider transferring to complete their bachelor's dearee. They can stay in this region of the country and receive degrees in business administration, management, human resource management, vocational ministries, counseling, psychology, sociology, social work, Biblical studies, Christian ministry, youth and family ministry, and missions and evangelism. That helps everyone. Students, families, employers, and churches in the North will be strengthened. That's excitina!" said Dr. Johnson.





Toby Osburn, dean of enrollment services, said, "Dr. Ken Johnson has authorized us to administer over one-half-million dollars in institutional scholarships during the 1993-94 academic year. Debi and I want to be sure that students and parents know exactly how to go about applying for those funds, in addition to federal and state financial aid programs."

Osburn continued, "One thing we hear time and time again from families is 'If only we had known this earlier.' We hope to help them know and understand, from the very beginning, what resources are available to help them pay for college. That's one small way we can serve."
